There are many different traditions associated with Christmas and lots of ways of celebrating the festive season. One of the customs which emerged during the Middle Ages was that of the Yule Log. Today we often have a chocolate cake shaped like a log which represents the Yule Log. In Medieval times, they used a real chunk of wood. After the harvest, the workers on the great estates would go into the woods to find a great, thick tree trunk. Then they would cut it down and take the very widest part away with them. This was taken to the house of the estate owner and then soaked in water to make it as wet as possible.

On Christmas Eve, the log would be put in the fireplace by the workers who lit a small fire under it, ensuring the fire didn't go out. Because the log was huge and also very wet, it would take a long time for it to catch fire and burn. As long as part of the log had not yet burned, the workers didn't have to go back to their work. This would usually take about a week and give them a week's holiday!

We too have many Christmas traditions. Some are ones which we share, such as Carol services and present giving. Others will be special to our own family or our particular community. Christmas 2020 will be very different as we are unable to gather together in the way that we usually do. There is information in the centre of this Focus about how the churches will be offering ways to worship this Christmas within the Covid-19 restrictions. But for many of us, this Christmas will be unlike any we have known before. There will be a sense of loss as we reflect on the loss of so much of our normal life, those who have lost jobs and all who have been bereaved. Sometimes it can feel overwhelming. We can also reflect on the ways that our communities have offered care for one another in these challenging times and the way the Christmas message of goodwill to all has been embodied in many acts of kindness.

The first Christmas was also a time of great uncertainty and upheaval. Joseph was summoned to register as part of the Roman Census and had to travel over 70 miles from Nazareth to Bethlehem. There was no transport other than a donkey and Mary was heavily pregnant. To make matters worse, by the time Joseph and Mary arrived in Bethlehem all the rooms were taken. So the Christ child was born in an animal shelter, probably a cave under the house. Once King Herod found out about the new king from the Magi, visitors from the East, Mary and Joseph had to flee for their lives with their son and escape into Egypt where they stayed until Herod died. It was not an ideal start in life for the baby who the angel told Mary was to be the Son of God.

Jesus said he came to bring light in the darkness and hope in troubled situations. As we prepare for a Christmas like no other our celebrations may be very different to usual. But the heart of Christmas remains the same. Jesus, God's Son came into the world to

bring us into relationship with God. He came to show how much God cares for each one of us. He came to bring peace and hope. May you know that peace and hope this Christmas.





# Friends of the Church on the Hill



#### What a Year......well, actually, what a last three months.

Like all of the Voluntary Groups in our villages, The Friends of the Church on the Hill (FotCotH), had to virtually hibernate through the Spring and Summer. A maximum of six of us at any one time were able to do a limited amount of grounds maintenance in the Churchyards. With the building closed we had to postpone EdleFest2020 until 2021, and visitors were not allowed entry to the Church.

Now for the good news. Since we were able to re-open we have been very busy.

St. Mary's, Edlesborough is by far the most popular of the Champing Churches under the auspices of the Churches Conservation Trust (CCT). There are wonderful comments in the visitors book, and from July 25th until October 31st we had about 80 Champers. In the current "staycation" scenario, and a need to have something to look forward to, the enquiry line for next year is already running hot.

In October, a touring group of actors, "This is my Theatre", produced a sold out performance of Macbeth. We are delighted to say that they are returning with "A Christmas Carol" on 17th December; see their website for socially distanced tickets, subject to......

Also in October, after many meetings and applications to the CCT, we played host to a sixty strong film crew using the Churchyard for a full day, as a film location, set in rural



Ireland. They were completely self-contained, building stages, tracks for cameras and



smoke machines snaking through the grounds. Their own caterers provided breakfast and lunch, which were very tasty! The crew loved the location with the Church providing a magnificent backdrop to the shooting of the scenes. The film, a horror movie titled "The Little People" is set for general release in 2021. Watch out for the leprechauns!

Christine Yates and her team have decorated the War Memorial not only as a magnificent tribute and an act of Remembrance, but this



year also to celebrate a birthday. The Memorial was inaugurated in March 1920, by Lord Brownlow, on one of his last appearances before his death.

Our best news concerns the storm damaged stained glass window in the Tower. Over the last three years, visitors will have seen how dark the Tower area is, with the window space being boarded up.

We have finally received estimates for the expert repair and installation of the window, so that it can be returned to its rightful place and being west facing, illuminate the Church once more.

Like most of our national cultural institutions, the CCT has suffered a dramatic fall in income, and has felt the

effect on its resources and capabilities. In a nutshell, the project to restore the window will have to be funded locally. The Friends Group is looking to put together a financial package involving all parts of our community. We will be able to provide more

information in due course, but in the meantime, anyone interested in supporting this effort please contact: wyn.johns.gmail.com (Treasurer FotCotH).

We have received confirmation from the CCT that through lockdown the Church can remain open for "Independent Prayer". Covid Safety Notices are placed inside the building and there is a reminder that the Church is not cleaned on a regular basis. The Churchyards are also open. We wanted to do this for our community as we go through difficult times together. This beautiful building has witnessed many life-changing episodes in the history of our villages. #### Feedback from the Ivinghoe & Wing Freight Strategy Survey

Graham Hillary (Buckinghamshire Council Transport Strategy Officer, Freight) attended the October Council meeting and provided the Council with a comprehensive presentation detailing the process and decision made following the Ivinghoe & Wing Freight Strategy Survey carried out at the start of 2020.

EPC continue to have serious concerns about traffic being displaced onto the B440 and have raised this with Buckinghamshire Council. EPC informed Mr Hillary that there is evidence that vehicles will be displaced onto the B440 and that EPC had been trying for many years to have the issues on the B440 addressed and that requests had always been refused by Bucks Council as the Highways Authority.

Mr Hillary advised the EPC that if the Council could provide a solid rationale with supporting evidence for the B440 to be included in the proposed zone it would be considered.

EPC confirmed that the compelling, qualified and robust reason for including the B440 between its junctions with the B489 and the A4146/A505 in the proposed freight zone is because the justification and principal benefit of the zone will be to relieve the

number of through HGVs using the B488 between Ivinghoe and the A4146. If the B440 is not included, most, if not all the HGVs displaced from the B488 will simply transfer to the B440, which is an equally unsuitable road.

Mr Hillary confirmed that the next steps will be to finalise the proposal early in 2021. They will then create the necessary Traffic Regulation Orders (TROs) and hold a statutory public consultation. The consultation is a final opportunity to comment on the detail of the zone. Subject to consultation feedback, Buckinghamshire Council expects the Ivinghoe Area Freight Zone to be in effect by the spring of 2021. Please ensure that you participate in the public consultation when it is announced.

The pavilion is now watertight and the contractors are almost finished on the internal first fix partitioning and electrics. At the time of writing it is expected that the underfloor heating with the floor insulation and screed will commence the week beginning 9th November.

Fortunately work is allowed to continue on construction site but supply problems make it heavy going! There isn't an exact date when the new Pavilion will open but you will know if you become a member. The process for membership will be announced soon by Edlesborough Community Sports Club.

# Be a real lifesaver for your community

Whilst not an employee of South Central Ambulance Service, you will be a valuable member of the team and make a life-saving contribution to patients in the community who dial 999. As one of the over 1,000 Community and Co-Responders who support SCAS. Our numbers are made up of members of the public, fire service, police community support officers, coastguards and military responders. We are all volunteers and undertake training to be able to help the people in our community with the support of SCAS.

SCAS is always on the lookout for more community and co-responders across the four counties in the South Central region. So if you are physically fit, have access to a vehicle and want to make a life-saving difference to your community, why not think about becoming one too? You'll need to be able to give a minimum commitment of 20 on call hours a month and all training and support will be provided.

#### Become a Community First Responder

If you want to be able to help us in emergency situations, then become a Volunteer Community First Responder. You will be trained by SCAS to be able calmly and professionally to deal with medical emergencies, providing sometimes life-saving first aid to a patient in the crucial minutes before an ambulance arrives. Once the ambulance arrives, you will continue to support the SCAS staff treating the patient.

After attending an initial five-day training course (spread over a couple of weekends and evenings) and an annual 1 day refresher course, the commitment we ask of you is to make yourself available at least 20 hours each month. You can choose the times to fit around your other commitments and you 'respond' from home or perhaps your workplace.

We will provide you with all the training, (

equipment and support you need to do something amazing for your community: become a real lifesaver.

#### The CFR role

We have Community First Responder (CFR) Schemes across Berkshire, Buckinghamshire, Hampshire and Oxfordshire, in both urban and rural areas. Our CFRs are trained to deliver life-saving skills such as the use of an automated external defibrillator (AED), basic airway management and oxygen therapy, and cardiopulmonary resuscitation, or CPR – and we always need new recruits.

Because CFRs only respond to emergencies in the area where they live or work, they can arrive at the scene shortly before an ambulance gets there. By being able to start life-saving medical treatment earlier, CFRs really do help save more lives.

The types of emergencies you might attend You will only be sent to 999 emergency calls we receive during the hours you have agreed to provide emergency cover, if you have had the relevant training and if the incident is local to you (usually within three to five miles). You will be trained to help in cases of:

Cardiac arrest Heart attack Stroke Choking Chest pains Diabetic emergencies Serious injuries (not road traffic collisions) Breathing difficulties Patients suffering a seizure Unconscious patients Traumatic injuries

In a year when all the charities are suffering, it is lovely to think that our village will still be able to show its generous support for the British Legion and the important work it carries out, especially at this time. Thank you for your generosity. &Lorna Cubbage. When I wrote the article above in order to



meet the Focus deadline, I had only just collected the full tins from Edlesborough Newsagents, and I had to leave them a couple of days before I could open them and count the collection. This evening I opened the two tins and was completely overwhelmed by the amounts in them. The first tin held £273.35 and the second tin, which was only there over the weekend, held £ 165.48. In addition, I found a donation of £6.68 in a plastic bag hidden among the poppies left in the box. So, the total collection for this year is an incredible £445.51!! 

## What To Do in the Garden in December

December can be a quiet month in the garden, but there are more things to take care of than you might think. With limited daylight hours as we approach the shortest day of the year, this month's crisp wintery weather can be strikingly beautiful and bitterly cold in equal measure.

#### **Timely Tips**

- 1. Dig over empty borders and prepare your soil for next year's planting.
- 2. Group potted plants together in a sheltered spot in the garden to protect them from the harshest winter weather.
- 3. Get pruning wisteria, fruit trees, roses and Japanese maples are just some of the plants that benefit from a winter prune.
- 4. Look after the birds clean feeders, stock up on fat balls and make sure they have access to fresh water.

#### In the flower garden

- Start to winter-prune wisteria, cutting back summer side-shoots to 2 or 3 buds.
- Prune climbing roses now, removing diseased or damaged growth and tying in any new shoots to their support. Prune older flowered side shoots back by two thirds of their length.
- Prune Japanese Maples (Acers) and vines if needed, as they will bleed sap if pruning is done any later.
- Leave the faded flower heads on your hydrangeas until spring, as they provide frost protection to the swelling buds further down the stems.
- If any of your rose bushes suffered from blackspot or rust this summer, gather up and remove any fallen leaves to reduce the

chance of infection next year.

- Lift and store dahlia tubers once their leaves are blackened by frost.
- Move containers of shrubs or bedding planters to a sheltered spots; clustering them together them together helps protect the root systems from suffering frost damage
- Check climbers are securely attached to their supports with ties.
- Harvest holly with berries for making Christmas garlands and wreaths. Stand them in a bucket of water until you're ready to use them.
- Take root cuttings of oriental poppies and grow them on in cold frames.
- Take hardwood cuttings from suitable trees and shrubs.
- Spread fresh gravel or grit around alpine plants.

#### In the vegetable garden

- Lift your last leeks and parsnips before the soil becomes frozen, and heel them in to a trench beside a convenient path. They'll keep for several months like this and can be easily brought indoors when required.
- Remove yellowing leaves from your winter brassicas they're no use to the plant and may harbour pests and diseases.
- If you haven't already, cut down dead asparagus foliage and the top growth of Jerusalem artichokes. Order your asparagus crowns now for planting in spring.
- Dig over empty borders and pile manure on top let the worms and frosts break up the clods of soil.

- Dig a trench for next year's beans, fill it with compostable kitchen waste (not cooked food) and re-cover with soil. This will rot down and dramatically improve the growing conditions.
- Cover winter brassicas with netting to protect them from pigeons.
- Keep fleece to hand to protect hardy salad crops such as Lettuce 'Winter Gem', winter land cress, purslane, and corn salad on cold nights.
- Protect any remaining celery plants left in the soil by covering with straw or fleece.
- Cover heavy clay soil with polythene to keep it drier and allow winter digging.
- While many parts of the garden and allotment are cleared, use this opportunity to install a permanent network of hard-wearing paths.

### In the fruit garden

- Now is the perfect time to prune fruit trees to maintain an open, balanced structure and encourage quality fruit production. The exception is plums, cherries and other stone fruits that should not be pruned until the summer to prevent silver leaf fungus. Use clean, sharp secateurs to avoid damaging your trees.
- Prune grape vines.
- Protect wall trained peaches and nectarines from wet winter weather which spreads the peach leaf curl fungus. Construct a screen of clear polythene over the plant, but not touching it.
- Lift and divide established clumps of rhubarb to renew the plant's vigour. Sections taken from the outside of the plant are better than those from the centre.
- Protect the tips of fig tree branches. They will carry the fruits for next year and are susceptible to frost. Cover with fleece or straw.
- Apply glue bands or grease bands to the trunks of fruit trees to prevent wingless female winter moths climbing the trunks

and laying their eggs in the branches.

• If your strawberry plants are over 3 years old, order some new strawberry runners to replace them. Old strawberry plants can harbour diseases and tend to lose vigour and productivity.

### In the greenhouse

- If you haven't already done so, clean out the greenhouse thoroughly. Wash the glass, the floor and the staging with horticultural disinfectant to kill any overwintering pests and diseases.
- Wash and disinfect capillary matting before storing it away.
- Brush heavy snow off the tops of greenhouses and cold frames to prevent the glass getting damaged.
- Insulate outdoor taps or turn them off at the mains. Pack away hoses that are not required.
- Ventilate the greenhouse on warmer days to reduce humidity and the risk of disease.
- Work in some manure to greenhouse borders to prepare them for next spring. Leave enough space to add compost later on.
- Propagate perennials from root cuttings including phlox, oriental poppies and mint.
- Water plants sparingly to maintain as dry an atmosphere as possible.
- Keep an eye out for aphids over-wintering on your plants, remove them by hand or use a pesticide.
- Protect your poinsettias from cold draughts and allow them to dry out slightly between waterings to make them last for the whole Christmas period and well into January.

### Looking after your lawn

- Avoid walking on your lawn when it's blanketed by heavy frost or snow, as this damages the grass.
- If it's a mild winter, continue to cut the lawn if it's growing, but raise the height of the mower blades.
- Spike lawns with a garden fork to improve drainage and aeration.
- Keep clearing leaves off the lawn to let the light in and prevent dead patches appearing.
- Send your lawnmower and shears to be serviced and sharpened while they're less in demand.

### Other jobs about the garden

- Wash down all of your garden tools and give them a wipe of linseed oil on the wooden and metal areas to help prevent rusting.
- Choose a dry day to clear out the garden shed in preparation for the spring.
- Check the security of your shed. This is particularly important in winter when you visit it less often.
- Repair fences and apply a wood preservative to prevent them from rotting.
- There's still time to clean out water butts before they fill with fresh rain water over winter.
- Get rid of slimy patches on the patio and paving by scrubbing with a broom or blasting with a pressure washer. For an easy alternative try a liquid patio cleaner.
- Check tree ties and stakes to ensure that trees are still secure following strong autumn winds. Tighten or loosen ties as necessary.
- Wash and disinfect bird feeders and bird tables. Clean out bird baths too.
- Hang fat balls and keep bird feeders topped up to attract birds, who will in turn eat pests in your garden.
- Build or buy a compost bin.
- Continue to collect fallen leaves and add to leaf bins or compost bins to rot down.
- After pruning fruit trees use the twigs for pea sticks or shred them for your compost bin.

- Turn your compost heaps to mix the ingredients and help the contents to decompose.
- Cover compost bins with a piece of old carpet or some plastic sheeting to prevent the compost becoming too cold and wet to rot down.
- Make a pile of old logs in an undisturbed corner of the garden to provide shelter for toads and other wildlife.

- Collect brightly coloured stems and berries for your Christmas decorations.
- Did you know the colourful wrappers of Quality Street sweets are compostable? They're made from cellulose, derived from wood pulp, so rather than chuck them in the bin, add them to your compost heap!

### From your armchair

- Carefully plan your vegetable garden for next year so that you ensure good crop rotation to avoid a build up of pests and diseases.
- Order your flower seeds and vegetable seeds for next year reflect on what worked well this year and what didn't, and don't be afraid to try new ideas.
- Take an inventory of tools and equipment that you need for next year. Add them to your Christmas list!
- Order apple trees now for planting in early spring. If space is limited, try growing dwarf fruit trees.





## **Photography in Focus** In this series, John Hockey shares some tips

### CROPPING

There are three main reasons why you would want to crop a picture:

- 1. To get rid of an unwanted item in your photograph
- 2. To zoom in closer to reveal more detail
- 3. To improve composition

This can easily be accomplished on your computer, usually using software that comes with the camera, or by a more sophisticated program such as Photoshop. If the thought of manipulating pictures scares you, then the best way to avoid it is by being careful not to have telegraph poles or unwanted fences in your picture (!), by going in closer to your subject than you first thought (either physically or by zooming in) and by really thinking about the composition of the finished shot, all before pressing the button.

Here is how pictures can be manipulated to improve the finished photograph:

1. Losing an unwanted item.

Here is a shot of a horse in a field down Cow Lane, Edlesborough. It's not a great shot for all sorts of reasons, but I include it to make a point. The fence doesn't add much to the shot (and is out of focus), so cropping it out seems to make sense. Also, if we lose a bit of sky the proportions are improved as the picture becomes landscape rather than portrait. These two actions automatically magnify the remaining picture. Also, if you look closely at the second picture, there is an invisible curve which goes up the horse's neck, skirts the edge of the golden tree and leads the eye onto the horizon and up to the church on the hill. The old orchard tree then captures our gaze and drops us firmly back in the field...and so back diagonally across to the grazing horse. A good balance if not a great picture - maybe it would be improved by a fence in the bottom right hand corner?!



2. Zooming in for more detail. These beech leaves in the sun at Whipsnade Park Golf Course are pleasant enough but cropping to zoom-in really shows the detail and you can almost feel that silky texture that doesn't come through in the original photograph.



Here is a second example of zooming in. The wonderful golden gates at Hampton court Palace are almost too fussy. Concentrating on the horned creature in the centre certainly makes for an interesting shot, but maybe the two together make a better visual 'story'. One way to do this is to copy the original picture, then crop to zoom in and show the detail.



3. Improving composition.

In the picture shown here the succulent to the left of the auricula doesn't really add anything. If you crop the small plant out I hope you will agree that the picture has much better balance and just seems to work as a square format image (see the second picture on right):





So, three reasons to crop – lose what you don't want, zoom in for more detail and lastly improve composition. Next time: Portraits

## LOCAL HERALDRY BY JOHN HOCKEY

In this series, we take a look around local towns and villages to find interesting and unusual heraldry.

## BRITISH HISTORY ONLINE

I first became interested in Heraldry when, many years ago, I went to the library and looked up the volumes called the Victoria County History (VCH). Founded in 1899 as a national project to write the history of every county in England, at its inception the project was dedicated to Queen Victoria, which is how it derived its name.

These tomes were a sort of Domesday Book updated in Victorian times, in that they recorded information about the history, archaeology and landscape of many villages, towns and cities in the UK. In recent times, all this information is to be found on British History Online (https://www.british-history.ac.uk/). The heraldic interest came from the village histories, where ownership of manors were recorded, together with accompanying coats of arms of relevant people.

As an example, take Edlesborough. In a section called 'A history of the county of Buckingham, volume 3', there is an interesting piece about a chap called Spigurnel. This is the sort of text you find:

...In 1199 a certain Richard Spigurnel (Esspigurnell) held a virgate of land in Northall, which was possibly the nucleus of Dagnall Manor, ...Rights in this manor, now called **Edlesborough** Manor, were conveyed about 1440 by Sir John Cheyne...etc. etc.

The thing is, there was also printed a coat of arms and description or blazon as we say in heraldry, as follows:





Spigurnel. Gules fretty argent a chief or with a lion passant gules therein.

It didn't mean very much to me then but now I know that Gules means the colour red and Argent means silver, always shown white, so we can show the main part of the shield with its fret pattern as it would have been seen in practice. The top third or chief is Or, meaning gold (always shown yellow) and on top of this we have a red lion passing through which gives us the complete, so much more colourful, coat of arms (please excuse hand colouring): There are plenty more coats of arms of those who held land in this area, such as Brownlow (Cust), Zouche etc., so do have a look on the web site, look up your village or parish and even use the blazon to imagine the colours. ## Which Animals Hibernate in the UK? And How You Can Help Them

Most of us tend to slow down in winter, as the cold weather and icy frost creeps into our bones, but some clever species avoid it all together by spending the darker months in a process known as hibernation. For some, hibernation is the only way to get through until spring.

### How do animals hibernate?

Various animals living in or near wetlands hibernate to conserve energy through the winter, when their natural food sources become scarce or impossible to find. To do this, they first need to ensure that they fatten up during summer to provide a source of essential energy.

Once they're ready to hibernate, they instinctively start slowing their metabolism down to use as little energy as possible; their heart rate drops, as does their breathing, and they enter a state of deep hibernation or 'torpor' - where the metabolism slows down to less than 5% of their normal rate. The difference between hibernation and torpor is that hibernation appears to be a voluntary state, whereas torpor is usually for a shorter time period and appears involuntary.



We describe this state as 'hibernation' rather than 'sleep' because the brain cycles that the animal goes through are so drastically different from sleep

patterns - it's more of an extreme slowing down. What kind of animals hibernate?

Reptiles and amphibians are cold blooded, and so if they remained active would not be able to perform their bodily functions. None of our wetland bird species hibernate, and have instead developed adaptations to deal with the cold – such as migration. Only three British mammal groups truly hibernate. All of our bat species, hedgehogs and the dormouse retreat to their cosy boltholes from around October/November

until March/April the following year.

## Do hibernating animals stay 'asleep' all winter?

You may notice from season to season that the animals you see in nature seemingly vanish in winter, but they may not all be hibernating. You might also notice that some animals you thought hibernated are up and about! It's a myth that hibernating animals can't go back to hibernation after waking up - although ideally, they want to stay in hibernation to conserve energy. However, they sometimes get up for a bathroom break, because of a warmer spell of weather or because it's become dangerously cold (below freezing, they may wake up to top ice crystals forming in their blood).

### Who hibernates? Bats

As the only flying mammals, bats need to use a lot of energy, and to cope with this bats have developed

several energy saving tactics. They hibernate during winter when food is scarce and have a very low birth rate. Bats will often pick hibernation roosts in old buildings or even the eaves of your house, so watch out for them if you're moving things around or renovating

during this period. **Reptiles** 

Many reptiles can be found in wetland habitat - but they're hidden in winter. This group go into a version

of hibernation called brumation, a specific term that applies to reptiles, but it is similar to hibernation. This is because reptiles rely on the sun to regulate their body temperature, so hibernation is essential for their survival in

### colder climates. Amphibians

You'll probably have noticed a lack of frog, toad and newt activity in autumn and early winter, and they do in fact become dormant



Common toads tend to hibernate in damp leaf litter or anywhere dark and damp

during these months for survival. Frogs and newts will hibernate on the bottom of ponds, but if these ponds are full of leaf matter this can prove deadly to a hibernating amphibian if the pond freezes over.

Underneath that thick layer of ice, the leaf litter and plant matter starts to decompose, and that can release toxic gases that unfortunately can be fatal to the amphibians living below the surface.

### Insects

Some wetland insects hibernate in larvae form, stashed safely in reedbeds and tussocks of grass, or crevices in walls or bug hotels. Some insects like honey bees rely on their family to survive, huddling together and using their joint heat to combat the cold.

There's also a process called diapause which can occur at any stage of an insect's development, which could be as an egg, larvae or adult form. Simply put, this is a state of stasis where the insect's appetite and development is slowed right down, until temperatures warm up and they appear again.

### Who doesn't hibernate? Birds

Although there is at least one bird species in the world that does hibernate, birds in the UK at least do not use hibernation as a survival strategy. The two main threats to birds in

winter are a lack of food and extreme weather conditions. But instead of hibernation, wetland birds have certain adaptations that allow them to survive the winter. They use their power of flight to migrate to more suitable climes. They also perform social flocking behaviours to keep warm and escape predation. They rely on their hardy physiology to survive extreme cold.

### Water voles

You might assume that water voles are hibernators as they seemingly vanish from view, but actually they're active throughout the winter. Like us, they tend to spend a lot more time in their burrows. They store food such as tubers and rhizomes that they forage here as winter snacks.

It's not easy being a water vole, and numbers in the UK have dwindled in recent years, due to predation and loss of habitat. Luckily our reserves are a lifeline for them, and you stand a good chance of seeing one scuttle around the banks if you're patient and look closely.

### Otters

Otters are active throughout the year. European otter coats are waterproof and 200 times denser than human hair, so they are well insulated from the cold. This enables

them to breed all year round, as is shown with the surprising set of wild otter cubs arriving at Slimbridge in December 2018. Thanks to conservation efforts to reduce the amount of agricultural chemicals polluting the water, otter numbers are now on the rise from near extinction in England.

## What does climate change mean for hibernating animals?

Scientific investigations have indicated that rising temperatures in the UK and beyond are proving disruptive for hibernating species, as the warmer temperature spells are causing them to stay for longer periods in their 'active' breaks from hibernating, causing them to use up vital energy. If the cold snap returns and no food is around, their chances of survival are drastically reduced. This means that our gardens are becoming more and more important as refuges for wildlife.

### Things you can do to help wildlife in winter

- Don't set fire to piles of leaves without first checking for small mammals burrowed under.
- In autumn, why not set up a designated haven in your garden to help hibernating animals? This could be a special wildlife pond, bat box or insect hotel that you know to leave there all winter. This helps lessen the risk of animals looking for hibernation spots in awkward or dangerous places for them. Our gardening for wetlands hub is full of things you can do to help.
- · Supply a source of un-frozen water for non-

hibernating birds to drink and bathe in.

- Clean out your pond before winter comes to make sure there's no plant matter that will decay and produce noxious gases that can poison amphibians. You could consider floating a ball in the water to create movement and offset freezing in all but the coldest of temperatures.
- Don't smash your pond if it freezes over, as this can shock the fish and amphibians that live there. Instead, make a small hole with the bottom of a hot pan.
- Why not rewild a small section of your garden to provide a shelter for hibernating insects? Logs, stones and old bricks can be piled up to make a makeshift insect hotel. Cover it up with leaves and branches, and you're good to go.



Doorstep scammers are taking advantage of the coronavirus emergency to con elderly and vulnerable people.

There has been a rise in the number of scam complaints related to the coronavirus outbreak, according to Buckinghamshire and Surrey Trading Standards team, who are urging members of the public to be aware. Since the beginning of the month the total number of scam complaints has increased by 40%.

Residents are also being urged to be especially wary of people offering or selling:

- Virus testing kits these are only offered by the NHS.
- Vaccines or miracle cures there is currently no vaccine or cure.
- Shopping or medication collection services that require payment upfront.
- · Home cleaning services.
- Overpriced or counterfeit products.

Residents must also be wary of emails, texts, telephone calls and messages via social media from scammers offering refunds on taxes or bills, as these are highly prevalent.

Trading Standards have provided some helpful tips to help prevent people from becoming victims of scams:

- Don't be pressurised into making a decision. If someone is trying to rush you or panic you, they are probably trying to scam you.
- Only purchase goods from trusted retailers.
- Be suspicious of requests for money upfront.
- Do not give your bank card or bank details to a stranger. Never write your PIN number down.
- Know who you're dealing with if you don't know the person who's offering you help then ask to be introduced by someone that you know and trust.

#### **Endings and Beginnings**

What a year this has been. As we move towards the end of the year and look forward to celebrating the birth of Jesus – a momentous happening that changed the whole world. It was an ending of one era and the beginning of 2,000+ years of Christianity.

We celebrate a small baby being born, into a small village, to what seemed to be insignificant people. However, there were some who realised that this event was significant. Mary, a young girl was visited by an Angel to tell her she was to have a baby, although not married. This would have been scary but develops into a song of praise. Joseph also needed a visit from an Angel in a dream to explain the importance so that he realised that this was something very special. It heralded a very important beginning that is the focus of our Christmas – or should be – all these years later!

The Church of the Nativity stands on the traditional site - Manger Square Bethlehem today


Jewish religious leaders held sway challenging his authority though others accepted the loving and healing they witnessed.


## Dagnall Weather Station (AONB)

#### Weather Conditions for October 2020 Elevation: 450 ft - Latitude: 51° 50' 13" North - Longitude: 0° 33' 34" West

October was a dull and wet month. The deluge started on the 2nd and it didn't stop raining for three days, in which we recorded 90.2mm (3.55ins) – I don't think I have ever measured so much rain in such a short time. In total, it rained 30 days out of 31, which has got to be a record. The total for the month was 167.6mm (6.6ins), which is 263% of the 12 year average. It was also windy with gusts reaching 37mph on the 31st. The temperatures were slightly down during the days but were warmer than normal at night with no frost. This meant I was still picking runner beans on the 31st, and I hope to pick more in November – I have never done that before!

We are now in another 'lockdown' and people are already wondering and panicking that 'Christmas needs to be saved!!' Politicians are currently discussing the measures they should take to 'save' Christmas. This is somewhat bizarre as Christmas does not need to be saved. Here are some examples why the true meaning of Christmas does not need 'saving'. So, let us go back to that first Christmas 2,000 years ago.
