#### **Easter Brownie Bites**

Tucked inside these scrumptious brownie bites are mini eggs - they're a perfectly sized sweet treat that's fun to make with the kids in the Easter holidays

#### **Ingredients**

175g butter, chopped
150g dark chocolate
250g light brown soft sugar
85g self-raising flour
50g cocoa powder
3 large eggs, beaten
100g milk chocolate chips
24 mini chocolate eggs, plus extra to decorate

#### Method STEP 1

Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Line 24 holes of a mini muffin tray with paper cases. Put the butter, dark chocolate and sugar in a pan and heat it very gently, stirring all the time until the butter and chocolate have melted. Remove from the heat and leave to cool for a few mins.

#### STEP 2

Meanwhile, sift the flour, cocoa and a good pinch of salt into a large bowl. Stir in the warm, melted chocolate mixture and the beaten eggs, then add half the chocolate chips and mix until just

## combined. **STEP 3**

Divide the mixture between the cases and place a mini egg into the middle of each muffin, pushing down gently. Bake for 12-15 mins until cooked but still gooey in the centre – they will continue cooking a little as they cool down. Leave to cool for 10 mins in the tin before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.

#### STEP 4

Melt the rest of the chocolate chips in short bursts in the microwave, or in a bowl set over a pan of simmering water, stirring frequently. Leave to cool until it is quite thick, then dot a small amount on each cake and stick on some more mini eggs.

April traditionally begins with a day of jokes and pranks. The origins of April Fool's Day are uncertain. However, many different cultures have had days of foolishness around the start of April. The Romans had a festival named Hilaria on 25th March. The Hindu calendar has Holi and the Jews celebrate Purim. Perhaps there is something about the time of year, with the change from winter to spring, that lends itself to lighthearted celebrations. April Fool's Day is marked in some form or another throughout Europe. In France, 1st April is called 'Poisson d'Avril' or 'April Fish'. French children sometimes tape a picture of a fish on the back of their schoolmates crying 'Poisson d'Avril' when the prank is discovered.

The past twelve months have been very difficult for us all. Many people have suffered illness, hardship and bereavement. All of us have seen our way of life impacted by restrictions and lockdowns. In the midst of it all, it has sometimes seemed hard to find things to laugh about. But humour is an important aspect of our lives as human beings and finding ways to have fun can help to cheer us up in challenging times.

Some people think that Christianity is so serious and important that there can be no room for fun. Christians are caricatured as solemn and sombre people who frown on having a good time. Yet if we look at how Jesus is presented in the Gospels, we see a man who enjoys himself and who likes a good meal and a party. In fact, some of his contemporaries criticised him for socialising too much, particularly with unsavoury characters.

It is believed that some of Jesus' teaching was in the form of jokes, which admittedly get a bit lost in translation. For example, Jesus astonished his disciples by telling them that 'It is much harder for a rich person to enter the Kingdom of God than for a camel to go through the eye of a needle.' (Mark 10:25) The image of the camel, which was the largest animal found in Palestine, trying to get through the eye of a sewing needle is obviously ridiculous. Jesus goes on to say that 'This is impossible for human beings, but not for God; everything is possible for God.' (Mark 10:27)

So Jesus was a man who knew how to tell jokes and have a good time. In the church, the Christian year is punctuated by celebrations. All the major festivals are accompanied by feasting. Think of Christmas, Easter, Whitsuntide and Harvest. In the past, these were holidays and occasions when the whole community would come together to celebrate and have a party. Both the Christian calendar and the Bible show that being a Christian is not about being serious all the time. It is about enjoying life, celebrating all that is good and rejoicing in all God's gifts to us.

As we look forward, we hope for better times to come and for a return to meeting with

one another, to being able to celebrate significant events together and to having more fun.



Spring is here and we are, hopefully, about to be let out of our Winter Lockdown. Being in lockdown, with McDonald's still very much open for take-aways, didn't deter the morons who think it is OK, or funny, to open their car and van windows and lob their refuse and cans into the

A big thank you to everyone who has been helping in this way.

This year Bucks County Council won the "Great British September Clean Award" from the Keep Britain Tidy Network Awards 2021. The award recognises councils who helped promote and deliver the Great September Clean through supporting local communities, town and parish councils, environment groups and residents to take part. It won the award because of efforts in the south of the county where nearly 600 bags of refuse were collected. Our area was not mentioned as we did not officially take part. More importantly, our amazing "Men in Orange" at Streetscene, who turn out without fail when there is fly tipping reported in the area, did not get a mention either. I am sure that

Central Beds also has its team of "Men in Orange" who must have been extremely busy recently! These people should be recognised for being there when we need them.

There are many who say that they shouldn't have to do litter picking. I agree, but unless there is a complete sea change, and folk start taking pride in their surroundings, clearing up the pavements around their properties, and taking their litter home when out and about, it will continue to be necessary. So be grateful to those who are prepared to give up their time on your behalf to keep our villages tidy. And next time you see someone out with a litter picker and black bag, don't just go past, say "thank you"!!

#### **Clive Cohen**



## **Edlesborough Parish Council News**

#### Including Edlesborough, Dagnall and Northall

#### **Ivinghoe & Wing Freight Strategy**

Graham Hillary CMILT. Transport Strategy Officer (Freight) Buckinghamshire Council has informed EPC of the following:

"As you may recall that due to the TRO audit and moratorium we had planned to start the Statutory Consultation phase of the Ivinghoe Area Freight Strategy midlate February. I wanted to bring you up to speed on where we are.

Part of the identified freight zone covered an area that falls within the Hertfordshire County. During the project we, of course, kept officers from Herts CC engaged, taking time to consult with them in the 'informal engagement' phase and keeping them in the loop since. In planning the Statutory Consultation phase we are required to advertise in local press the Traffic Regulation Order that provides the 7.5 tonne weight restriction with access by exception. To be able to do this we needed legal authority from Herts CC, unfortunately this was not been given in time to allow us to move into the Statutory Consultation at this time. In normal circumstances this would not be a problem and the consultation would be simply delayed until the authority was given, this year we have to consider the planned local elections in May. We are not able to run the consultation for the minimum amount of time prior to Purdah which starts on March 22nd, and as you can appreciate it is not appropriate to conduct the consultation during the Purdah period.

However, had we been able to get the Statutory Consultation in prior to Purdah we would still have had to wait until after the election and for Cabinet Member

had taken place. This would have given a potential 'green-light' for implementation around the middle of June.

Not being able to start the Consultation until just after the election effectively means we would have this complete and be in a position to take the proposal to Cabinet Member for approval around mid-June and hopefully be able to look at implementation near the end of June / beginning of July, losing around 2-3 weeks only had we been able to get the Consultation started in February.

I appreciate that delays are not something any of us would like to see; that there is great support within the communities for the Freight Strategy to be implemented at the earliest opportunity; and to see unwanted Heavy Goods Vehicles taken out of the area. My colleagues and I will continue to strive to make this happen as soon as we possibly can, subject of course, to there being no insurmountable objections during the Statutory Consultation. I am aware that we have seen an increase in HGV movements around the area, these may have something to do with construction projects nearby however, once allowed, I will try and get out to investigate."

Cllrs Mrs Booth has held an initial meeting with the residents who have expressed an interest in being involved in the project. She has met with three companies/suppliers who have been asked to submit three proposed site plans, suggested equipment and quotes for the working party to consider.

#### EMH Toilet Refurbishment

#### - led by Cllr Mrs Thomas

EPC are currently working to establish who holds the lease to gain approval for the improvements to EMH. A consideration is the relatively short term of the lease. EPC representatives will hold talks with the local Parochial Church Council to establish the way forward before committing a substantial sum on the toilet refurbishment project.

#### Dagnall School Forest School

At the February Council meeting EPC agreed to pay to clear the rubbish/fly tipping from the copse/wooded area at Dagnall Allotments in readiness for Dagnall School to use the area for a Forest School. The clearance work will take place in late March/early April.

Buckinghamshire Cllr Anne Wight and Cllr Chris Poll attended the February Council meeting and reported on the following items:





# Puppies, Puppies Everywhere

So, in case you have been on another planet, as well as there being a global pandemic, there has been a huge rise in people buying man's best friend: The Puppy! This in turn has led to puppy prices rising massively, intake of rescue dogs increasing hugely, and a disturbing rise in dog thefts and puppy farming.

For many people this has been perfect timing, with many of us working from home. This is great as I personally encourage new puppy owners to take a week off work to help puppy settle in. However, plans will need to be put in place when things return to 'normal' and this should start today.

I am fortunate in my profession as a Dog/Animal trainer, and have been very busy, helping owners, often first-time ones, give their puppy and their relationship the best start including juggling their training in their busy lives. So what I thought I would do is give you my top tips if you have recently got a puppy or are thinking of getting one:

### 1. Get your puppy used to being left alone gradually.

I have seen so many puppies this year, and last, with severe Separation Anxiety. It is a form of panic attack and they don't just get over it. If you continue to leave them it will get worse. Start now; Leave them alone in a different room when you're working or take the whole family for a walk leaving puppy at home. Install a camera so you can check in or ask a neighbour to listen out for you.

### 2. The 'dreaded' first night

Think of it this way. Puppy is dragged away from everything it has known (Mum, siblings, human family), taken in a scary, bumpy thing to meet strange new people (that's you!).

They are then given endless attention all day and then suddenly they are then shut in a cage and left all alone...scary!

I would recommend the first week someone sleeps downstairs with the puppy, so they are not alone. Alternatively, you can have the crate upstairs with you. Most people use crates mainly because puppies won't mess in them. However, this doesn't mean they don't need to go to the toilet. Set an alarm a few times during the night so a.) puppy



doesn't learn that crying makes humans come to me and b.) no accidents and your toilet training is on to a great start as they are always doing it in the right place every time...the garden. Also do not bother with puppy pads, it just teaches them going inside is OK. Don't assume they know the difference between the pad & your carpet.....

### 3. Ditch the Bowl

Sometimes we forget that most breeds are working dogs. They have been selectively bred to have a job to do. Although being a pet dog looks like an easy life, they still feel these needs. Walks should take care of their physical needs (remember the exercise rule:

5mins per walk per month of age!) but what about their mental needs? Imagine having the same meal in the same place, at the same time everyday.... zzzzzz! I have a solution for you & it is called 'ditch the bowl' Work out your dog's daily food allowance and split it into lots of smaller feeds. Save some for training (dogs learn whether you train them or not, the training makes sure they learn the RIGHT stuff!) and rest can be used in food toys such as



Kongs (not just for peanut butter!), licki mats, snuffle mats, treat balls and scatter feeds in the garden. No set times and lots throughout the day to stop them finding their own entertainment, inhaling their food & perfect for zoom calls!

### 4. Socialisation

So, this is definitely a Puppy owner's favourite word, but this doesn't necessarily just mean other dogs. If socialised properly it should be everything you want them comfortable with during their lives.....sheep, traffic, car journeys, high-vis wearing people etc.

One of the biggest mistake's puppy owners make is letting their dog say hello to everyone. I have lost count of the clients I have seen after their initial Puppy 121 whose dog will now run (usually 2 fields!) to see another dog. They don't know there are distance rules not that's what I've always been allowed to do? So, it is nice and simple and will make your lives so much easier; For every dog you see make sure your dog does a recall and comes back to you even if it's Fido from next door who they've played with 100s of times before. It is all about consistency. Once pup has come back then you can send them to say hello. Added bonus, you made the good thing happen therefore they are more likely to do it again.

If you are unsure if they will do this either give yourself more space & set your puppy up to succeed or use a longline (only ever on a harness for safety reasons) so they can't get it wrong. Then that day when there is a dog on lead who really doesn't want an 'it's OK he's friendly' puppy bouncing in his face because he has recently had an operation and the owners is trying to keep him calm, you can be the smug owner with the recall, lead on and strut away no drama!

I hope this has been useful. I'm always happy to help dog owners trying to do the best for their dogs. Dog training isn't easy. That's what we are for so if you are struggling, get a qualified professional to help you.

Remember they are part of the family so enjoy each other!

### He is risen, Hallelujah!


Easter is here. What do you celebrate at Easter?

## A RECENT GRANT OF ARMS

The College of Arms, based in London, is the body in England that grants arms. Compared to early coats of arms, recent examples are quite complicated, but some are also intriguing. Here is a grant from 2010 for a Peter John Hocart Tooley, LL.M., M.B.B.S., M.R.C.G.P., D.M.J.




The main shield looks for all the world like a strange combination of a set of rugby posts with some serpents – perhaps hinting at a medical association.

The description or blazon is as follows: Per pale Gules and Vert two Endorses conjoined in base by a Barrulet Argent each Endorse environed by a Serpent head outwards Or langued counterchanged of the field.

That is just a complicated heraldic way of describing what you see here, the endorses and barrulet making up the 'posts' with the serpents winding around them. It all seems a little strange until you read that Doctor Tooley is a member of the Court of Assistants of the Worshipful Company of Apothecaries and was for thirty years a medical officer for rugby teams in Oxfordshire and London!

In addition to the grant of arms, he was also granted a *badge*:

As yet, I have not been able to work out the reasoning for the incorporation of this beast, maybe he needed a thick skin in his job!. It reminds me that heraldry can be an amusing and entertaining discipline!

# Down the Lane

By the time you read this it will be April! As I write this at the beginning of March, there are so many enjoyable jobs to do in the garden. I'm sowing seeds indoors. The aubergines have germinated. I tried them last year for the first time but only picked 3 fruit before it was too cold for more to develop so I've started much earlier this year. I lost some of the sweet peas I started last autumn so I've germinated some more on damp kitchen paper. I then pot them up to plant out later.

A few days ago several large bumble bees, which I assume are queens, were flying around the garden and enjoying the few flowers in bloom, especially a mahonia, which was covered with flowers, and



Christmas roses. Bumble bees make me smile; the way they move around, and their Latin name Bombus! It's important at this time of year to grow flowers for these early bees so I have Winter Aconites, Snowdrops and small irises. My violas flower all winter and have a real growing spurt in the spring. Christmas Roses are lovely for giving subtle spring colour. They grow happily in shade and seed themselves, even next to walls where I would never plant them. In January I remove all the leaves and I can then see the flowers. After they have finished flowering new leaves appear, which look attractive for the rest of the year and provide cover for wildlife.

One of my favourite vegetables is purple sprouting broccoli which had a very good crop a year ago. According to the seed packet, if you sow the seeds in the spring and plant them out after the frosts you can have an autumn crop. I had some wonderful plants in the autumn, which became very top heavy, but no purple sprouting. I left the plants over the winter, by which time they were shrubs and too large to net, and as soon as the purple shoots appeared the pigeons devoured them. I shall just plant them out in the autumn this year and protect them from pigeons!

I have re-potted my houseleeks in fresh compost and rearranged the pots in their hanging basket as you can see from the photo. The plants will soon fill out and flower in the summer.

The frosts have damaged some plants. I'll wait until the weather warms up and then cut out the damage. At the moment that is protecting growth underneath. Most of

my verbena bonariensis has succumbed to the cold. Although it's not fully hardy it usually survives the winter. It always seeds itself but the flowers may be later this year. Bees and butterflies love them. A garden between Good Intent and Edlesborough shops has a 'forest' of verbena during the summer.

Next month I will write about my attempts to grow a small flower meadow.



# Life in the Hive - The Colony

There are about 250 species of bees living in the UK. The vast majority of these are solitary bees that do not live in colonies but are extremely important as pollinators. We have about 24 species of the familiar bumblebee and one species of honey bee Apis Mellifera.

Honey bees live in colonies which are often termed superorganisms because the individuals work together to behave as a single very effective unit. A honey bee cannot survive alone and if it becomes separated from its parent colony it will try to join another by begging entrance to the hive usually with a gift of pollen or nectar.

The colony is made up of a queen, worker bees, drones and a nest of brood (eggs, larvae and pupae). The colony makes and lives on a structure made from beeswax which is secreted by glands on the workers abdomen to form an efficient strong arrangement of hexagonal cells that we call honeycomb.



Usually there is just one queen in a colony. She can live for up to five years and is the only female bee that can lay fertile eggs. So the queen is the mother of the colony and is a little

larger than the worker bees with a longer pointed abdomen and longer legs. Her job is to lay eggs, as many as 2000 in a day if conditions are favourable. She controls activities by producing pheromones which are chemical messages passed around by the worker bees touching each other.

The vast majority of bees in a colony are female workers produced from a fertilised egg laid by the queen. In the summer there may be as many as 60,000 workers in a strong colony but the individuals only live for about six weeks. This is perhaps not

surprising because, as their name suggests, they work hard all their lives carrying out the tasks necessary to maintain the colony.

After the worker emerges from her cell she generally progresses as she gets older through a series of jobs. To begin with she is a "house bee" or "nurse bee" cleaning the hive and polishing the cells, feeding the larvae and the queen, making wax, building honeycomb, receiving nectar from the foraging bees, converting it to honey and storing it in the cells. When she is about three weeks old she may spend some time as a "guard bee" defending the entrance to the hive from robber bees and wasps before starting the really hard work as a forager.


Before setting off to forage a bee makes special orientation flights around the hive so she can find her way home. Most people know that the bees collect pollen and nectar but they also collect water and propolis which is a resin from certain types of trees. This sticky substance has antiseptic properties and can be used to make natural health products. The bees use it to polish the cells prior to eggs being laid and for sealing up detritus and gaps in the hive.

Drones are male bees produced from an unfertilised egg. They are bulkier than the worker bees, have huge



compound eyes and no sting. They live for about 40 days and their primary job is to mate with queens. More drones in the hive suggests that the colony is about to swarm. They do not keep house, guard the hive entrance or do any foraging. So they are forcibly ejected from the hive in the autumn when their usefulness is over and die within a couple of days. There are no males in the hive over the winter eating up the stores.

The brood nest is at the heart of the colony where the temperature is kept constant at about 34°C and the humidity at around 40%. Here the queen lays single eggs in the base of each cell and the larvae develop being fed by the adult bees until they form a pupa. Queens, drones and workers all have slightly different development times before emerging as an adult. Mostly the brood nest has worker and drone cells but in the spring from April to June the colony may begin to make preparations to swarm and start to build queen cells which look quite different. ## **April Showers Bring Forth May Flowers**

People often talk about April showers and there's an old English folk rhyme that states: "March winds and April showers bring forth May flowers." Showers can occur at any time but there are specific reasons why April might be more associated with clear, sunny mornings and stormy afternoons.

During spring, the Azores high pressure system and the polar jet stream tends to move further north. However, as the jet stream moves away from the UK, it leaves the country more open to weaker bands of rain and more days when showers are likely to develop.

The sun is also higher in the sky at this time of year and therefore stronger. Consequently, temperatures rise and the ground heats up. As the warm air rises, it cools and condenses,

forming clouds.

During April the air higher up in the atmosphere can be much colder than the air at ground level. This causes the air to be unstable and clouds soon start to bubble up after a fine and sunny start to the day. While these clouds may be nothing more than 'cotton wool' clouds, they can sometimes develop into large cauliflowers of cumulus and towering cumulonimbus clouds - capable of producing

heavy showers, hail and even thunder. During an April shower, the temperature can also vary widely. When it's sunny, the temperature in the shade can easily reach a warm 20°C. However, a heavy shower with hail can see the temperature drop sharply to around 10°C. As the sun sets the shower clouds will often fade away leaving a clear and chilly night.

Earthworms are made up of many ridged segments. They are covered in minute hairs, which allow them to grip the soil and move. They usually live in the soil's top few



centimetres, but will burrow deeper to find essential moisture if the earth dries out or freezes. Worms are vital in maintaining soil structure and fertility as they aerate the soil, improve drainage and bring nutrients to the surface.

Although worms have both male and female reproductive organs (hermaphrodite), they still need to find a mate and exchange sperm before they can reproduce. They make a cocoon in which they deposit both eggs and their partner's sperm – live worms emerge later. Earthworms are an important source of food for plenty of creatures, including hedgehogs, foxes, moles, many birds, slow worms and amphibians.

It is a common misconception that if you cut a worm in half it makes two new worms. Although they can regenerate to a small degree, usually both halves die.

Earthworms eat decaying organic matter and measure up to 30 cm in length. Their natural habitat is the flower borders, herb gardens and lawns/grassy areas and can be found whe digging soil and sometimes at night in damp weather they can be found on the surface of the lawn and borders.

## Don't be a Lockdown Statistic!

It's reported that we have been 40% less active during this last winter lockdown period. We are now seeing more neck and back injuries often associated with increased sitting. There is now no walking to the office, just to the kitchen instead! So, if you don't want to be a statistic, here a few tips from St Judes:

- Take regular breaks, get up and move away from your desk. Do another task, rather than just waiting for the kettle to boil, load the dishwasher, the washing machine, fold up the washing. Move little and often.
- 2. Consider if you can work at different heights think of your kitchen worktop or chest of drawers as your new standing desk.
- 3. Set your alarm on your phone to schedule regular breaks and move!
- 4. Try some simple stretches at your desk:
  - · Sideways neck stretches.
  - Stretching up and lifting the breastbone up whilst bringing your arms out to your sides, bent at the elbows, palms facing forward to stretch across your chest muscles.
  - Twisting from the waist (NB never push into pain or pins and needles.)
- 5. Get up and walk around during a phone call.
- 6. Get out of the house walking, running, even if it means wrapping up well, you will be pleased you did.
- 7. Consider some online fitness after work yoga, Pilates or a more aerobic workout. (St Judes offer online rehab Pilates classes.)
- 8. Household tasks such as sweeping, mopping, dusting, all get the heart rate up too.





# Paton Bray Librory

### Courtesy of the Bedfordshire Archives The Bedford Arms Beerhouse: 57 High Street, Eaton Bray



The Bedford Arms marked with a red dot in this postcard of 1915

The countywide licensing register of 1876 states that this beerhouse was first licensed in 1859. The owner, like most of the owners of licensed premises in Eaton Bray not a Bedfordshire resident, was William Brown of Tring [Hertfordshire]. By 1891 the owner was James Batchelor of Dagnall [Buckinghamshire], who also owned the Labour in Vain Beerhouse on Eaton Green.

By 1903 Fuller, Smith & Company of Chiswick [Middlesex] was the owner. That year's countywide licensing register described the beerhouse as "clean and in good repair" and noted that it was 59 yards from nearest licensed property (The Fountain Beerhouse). The beerhouse had one front and three back doors.

The Rating and Valuation Act 1925 specified that every building and piece of land in the country was to be assessed to determine its rateable value. Like most parishes in the county Eaton Bray was assessed in 1927 and the valuer visiting the Bedford Arms [DV1/C202/108] found it was now owned by Ivinghoe [Buckinghamshire] brewers Roberts and Wilson Limited and their tenant, Alfred William Brooks, paid rent of £10 per annum, the rent before World War One having been £8.

The valuer summed the place up as: "unattractive". It comprised a bar ("poor"), a tap room ("rather small"), a smoke room ("small") and a cellar "not used" as well as a kitchen and three bedrooms. The valuer commented: "Rather neglected inside". Outside stood a brick and slate WC and urinal, an open trap-shed, and stable, a brick and corrugated iron coal shed, a weather-boarded, asbestos and corrugated iron wheelwright's shop and forge measuring 34 feet by 13 feet and, behind the property, a weather-boarded and corrugated iron open cart hovel, a two bay hovel and four bay part open hovel. All these outbuildings were described as "poor".

Trade was hardly brisk, half a barrel of beer a week or less, as well as half a dozen

bottles of beer in the same period. In the same year as the valuation Roberts and Wilson was taken over by Benskin's Watford Brewery. Because all the brewing firms who owned the Bedford Arms were from outside the county Bedfordshire and Luton Archives and Records Service has no further records concerning the beerhouse, which was still in existence in 1956 but seems to have closed prior to 1974. The property was later demolished and replaced by a private house

### What to do in your Garden in April

#### **Flowers**

 Plant out your Autumn sown Sweet Pea seedlings or sow now direct in their final flowering position.



- Dependant on the variety hardy annuals can be sown either indoors or outdoors, following the instructions on the packet.
- Half-hardy flowers can be sown in trays and kept on a windowsill or in the greenhouse.
- This may be your last chance to order young flower plants as many will be delivered in May so have a look at your garden plan and check for gaps.
- Hanging baskets can be planted up and kept in the greenhouse while the plants grow on.

#### **Bulbs**

- Remove any faded flowers from earlyflowering bulbs, especially daffodils.
- If you want them to naturalise then leave flowers on snowdrops, crocus, muscari, scillas and other small bulbs.
- Begonia tubers can still be planted in pots and kept in the greenhouse remember that the concave part of the tuber needs to be uppermost.
- In mild areas dahlia tubers can be planted outside towards the end of the month.
- Stagger the planting of your gladioli corms and you'll prolong the flowering period.
- For filling gaps in the garden plant lilies in pots so that you can move
   them around.

#### Fruit

Mulch around trees with well-rotted

manure.

 Keep an eye out for any pests and take corrective action.



• Apple trees, pear trees, plum trees and cherry trees will start

plum trees and cherry trees will start flowering in April. If as few as 5 to 10% of the flowers set then you will have a good crop so don't worry too much about flowers dropping.

- If frost threatens then try to protect the flowers with fleece.
- Check tree ties to prevent rocking.
- In drying wind water all newly planted trees.
- Summer and autumn fruiting raspberries should be cut back to approximately 23cm from the base.
- To encourage early flowers cover strawberry plants with cloches.

#### **Vegetables**

Now is the time to sow direct carrots, peas, beetroot, winter cabbages, broccoli,



salad crops and much more.

- Marrows, courgettes, pumpkins, squashes and tomatoes can all be sown in a heated greenhouse or propagator.
- If frost threatens then pull some fleece over your potato foliage.
- Plant onion sets when the soil is dry.
- Make sure you've ordered your tomato plants.
- If any rhubarb flowers appear then cut them out near the base as otherwise they will steal food and energy from the plant.
- If your asparagus beds are at least 2-years old then any spears can be cut using a sharp knife or better still, a made-for-purpose asparagus knife.

#### **Lawn Care**

 Rake out any dead moss with a scarifier and then fork over to improve drainage.



- Apply lawn fertiliser.
- Mow growing grass but keep the blades fairly high still.
- Dig out any perennial weeds.
- April is a great time for sowing new lawns and repairing bare patches.

#### General

 Early sowings outside may prove difficult due to the cold and wet soil at this time, therefore,



by warming up the soil of prepared areas with cloches it will protect from frost and rain.

 It is ideal to leave the cloches in place for at least two or three weeks when the soil can be raked prior to seed sowing and planting out of young

- seedlings. Replace the cloches giving the young plants a good start.
- Keep an eye out for slugs and snails with the use of slug pellets if needed, of course, following directions on box.
- Slug Gone pellets get rid of slugs and snails without killing them

#### Herbs

 Sowings can be made of dill, fennel, hyssop, parsley and thyme.



- Any sowings made in March may need careful thinning.
- If you have an established thyme plant then have a go at layering some creeping stems by covering them with fine soil. Once they've rooted you can separate them and plant them elsewhere. It won't take long thyme waits for no man (sorry!).


### Weather Conditions for February 2021

February started off on the milder side, but it wasn't long before it became wet. By the 6th, the temperature dropped; bringing snow over the weekend. We woke up on Monday morning to frost and a blanket of crispy snow which stayed for a couple of days. We had frost almost day and night for the next six days, with a low of 4.1°c on the 13th. On the 14th, the temperature rose to bring drizzly rain and fog for a few days. On the 19th, it became warmer and settled with these conditions lasting to the end of the month. This led to a false spring with sun and temperatures reaching 16.2°c, which made a welcome change from the dull and cloudy days we'd had so far this year. I was almost tempted to get out my shorts! Slightly windier this month and much drier than January with 90% of the February average rainfall.

# **Jewish Chicken Soup**

In these times of lockdown, let me tell you about my go-to pick-me-up. There is literally nothing better than a bowl of Jewish chicken soup. It's hard to explain why. It just wraps you up in the biggest cuddle imaginable. Or maybe it just takes me back to days at my grandma's. She could feed a family of 20 for less than a tenner, with chicken soup at the heart of it. It's such a simple soup to make - it just needs a little TLC and love. Trust me, it will reward you with every sip. When I made this, I served it with kneidlach - the Jewish dumplings. Recipes are easy to find online but space precludes me from giving you my recipe here. Replace them with vermicelli crushed into shorter strands - my other favourite way of eating this soup.

This serves... a lot

One large chicken. If your butcher has "boiler" chickens, all the better, as they are more flavoursome

A good handful of chicken bones from the butcher (optional, but worth seeking out) 2 large onions, peeled and sliced in half 4 celery sticks, sliced into 1cm pieces 3 carrots, cut in half One bay leaf A handful of black peppercorns

You'll need a large, deep saucepan.

Put the chicken (and bones, if using), into the saucepan.

Chuck in all the vegetables and the aromatics.

Cover with water and bring to the boil.

You may get a frothy scum at this point. Simply spoon it off and discard.

Turn the heat down to a simmer, loosely cover the pan and cook for a further 2 and a half hours.

Carefully lift the chicken out of the pan. It will fall apart and will be fully of boiling water. Shred the remaining chicken, separating it from the bone and cartilage.

Fish out the carrots and as much of the celery as you can. Pour the remaining broth through a sieve and discard any remaining vegetables and aromatics.

Slice the carrot up and put it back in the broth with the celery and all the chicken.

Chill the broth overnight. In the morning, pull off the layer of fat which will have formed (although my gran always left it, she said it added to the flavour).

Another day in the fridge will only serve to enhance the flavours. When you reheat it, season with salt if needed and serve with cooked vermicelli.

If I had been on the show I would have been able to name at least four or five presenters, but that is just showing my age.

I remember when a presenter made a Tracy Island from the show Thunderbirds. Both myself and my sister were inspired to make one from items that were in the house. This was to be for my brother who was an avid follower of Thunderbirds.

Our Tracy Island was not mass produced, it was a one-off and our brother played for hours with his models of Thunderbirds and the makeshift Tracy Island.

We were all made by God! We are one-offs! We are designed perfectly and are a unique expression of God's love. God never makes a mistake nor does he make anything out of junk. He does not mass produce and He never says, "Here's one that I made earlier".

We are all unique. We are all different, some of us maybe noisy, others shy- but each person is wonderfully made and wonderfully complex and exclusively made.

God knew us before anyone knew that you were there. God had plans for us before anyone planned our arrival in this world. We were carefully shaped by God- we are His craftsmanship. In The Bible the book of Ephesians 2: 10 tells us:-

For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.'
