



Buckinghamshire Council elections

Following the elections on May 6th The following councillors were elected to serve the Ivinghoe Ward that includes our parish. Cllr Peter Brazier, Conservative Party; Cllr Chris Poll, Conservative Party and Cllr Derek Town, Conservative Party. Edlesborough Parish Council looks forward to working with the newly elected councillors.

Parking Issues

During the past month the Parish Council has been contacted several times about inconsiderate and dangerous parking in the Parish, in particular in the village of Edlesborough.

Council reminds all parishioners to consider how their parking affects others. When leaving your vehicle:

 Does it restrict access of the pavement so as to force a pedestrian, pushchair or wheelchair user on to the road?

• Does it restrict the view of other drivers exiting a junction or their driveway?

Council reminds all drivers that they should avoid parking on the white lines near the shops and school.

Edlesborough Parish Council does not have any enforcement powers over parking in the Parish only the police (Thames Valley Police for Edlesborough, Dagnall and Northall) have powers (outside of London and Wales) to enforce against pavement parking and they can do this where there is an obstruction (including to a buggy/ wheelchair user) or a safety issue, such as parking within 10m of a junction.

The recent issues at the top of the High Street in Edlesborough have been drawn to the attention of both Buckinghamshire Council and Thames Valley Police.

Thames Valley Police have advised the Council that if a vehicle is parked with 10m of the junction of the High Street and the B440, regardless of who it is visitor, workman, or resident then Thames Valley Police will start issuing tickets.

Parishioners wishing to report dangerous or



obstructive parking should do so to Thames Valley Police.

Grass & Hedge Cutting in the Villages

Grass Verges

Now that the growing season is in full swing my Council requests that drivers do not park cars on the grass verges in the villages. Parking on the verges causes damage to them and makes it difficult for the Council's contractor to cut the verge.



Hedge Cutting

The Council contractor is scheduled to cut the Pastures hedge in the **last week of June/ first week of July.**

The hedge will be cut to the recommended height of 8ft.

The Council is aware of concerns about nesting birds and endeavours to do all it can to protect them. However the Council are also duty bound to ensure that the hedge does not overhang the footpath so as to:

- 1. Endanger or obstruct the passage of pedestrians
- 2. Potentially causes danger to the footpath.

EPC asks all parishioners whose hedges border the pavements to ensure that their hedges are kept well-trimmed ensuring that the maximum pavement width is available for pedestrians, pushchair and wheelchair users.

Edlesborough Pavilion

At the time of writing this report the construction of the Pavilion car park is taking place. Work to complete the building continues to progress. The project is now in its final stages and the Council is working closely with ECSC to help ensure the building is ready to open to the parishioners and sports clubs shortly after the green hoarding is removed (opening will need to be in line with any Covid-19 restrictions that may be in place).

New Play Area on the Bellway Development

As part of the planning application for the Bellway Development in Edlesborough, the developers were required to provide a children's play area. Council and residents are pleased to see that the new play area is under construction. Once completed this play area will be open to all parishioners. The play area will be maintained by the management company responsible for the development not the Parish Council.

The Annual Parish Meeting

The minutes of the short Annual Parish Meeting held on 15th April 2021 can be viewed on the Council website. A new meeting format for parish organisations and parishioners to attend is under development. It is hoped that this can take place in July, subject to Covid-19 guidelines. Further information will be published in Focus and on our website when finalised.

Allotments

All Allotments in the Parish are let and the Council now holds a waiting list for anyone wanting an allotment plot.





The June Solstice

In the Northern Hemisphere, the June solstice (aka summer solstice) occurs when the Sun reaches its highest and northernmost points in the sky. It marks the start of summer in the northern half of the globe. (In contrast, the June solstice in the Southern Hemisphere is when the Sun is at its lowest point in the sky, marking the start of winter.) The word solstice comes from Latin solstitium from sol (Sun) and stitium (still or stopped), reflecting the fact that on the solstice, the Sun appears to stop moving in the sky as it reaches its northern or southernmost point (declination) for the year, as seen from Earth.

After the solstice, the Sun appears to reverse course and head back in the opposite direction. The motion referred to here is the apparent path of the Sun when one views its position in the sky at the same time each day, for example at local noon. Over the year, its path forms a sort of flattened figure eight, called an analemma. Of course, the Sun itself is not moving (unless you consider its own orbit around the Milky Way galaxy); instead, this change in position in the sky that we on Earth notice is caused by the tilt of Earth's axis as it orbits the Sun, as well as Earth's elliptical, rather than circular, orbit.

Does the Solstice Always Occur on the Same Day?

The timing of the June solstice is not based on a specific calendar date or time; it all depends on when the Sun reaches its northernmost point from the equator. Therefore, the solstice won't always occur on the same day. Currently, it shifts between June 20, 21, and 22.

The Year s Longest Day

The Summer Solstice is the day with the longest period of sunlight. Notice how the Sun appears highest in the sky at the solstice; its rays strike Earth at a more direct angle, causing the efficient warming we call summer. Because the Sun is highest in the sky on this day, you ll notice that your shadow (at local, or solar, noon, not clock-time noon) is the shortest that it will be all year. [Local noon is when the Sun crosses the local meridian (an imaginary line between the North and South poles) and is highest in the sky for the day.] For those who live in the Southern Hemisphere, this is the shortest day of the year and marks the arrival of winter.

Village Parking Matters

The Parish Council has noticed an increase in the number of cars parking on pavements and wholly obstructing the path. It is in contravention of the highway code to park a vehicle on a pavement so that it fully obstructs the use of the pavement and forcing the pedestrian into the road or onto private property to pass. Any vehicles that are seen to be parked in this way will be subject to a notice that the vehicle details will be passed to both Central Bedfordshire Council Enforcement Team and Bedfordshire Police.

Village Gateways Your views on the gates' future.

Eaton Bray Parish Council are exploring the future of the white wooden gates at the entry point of the village at the top of Bower Lane and Totternhoe Road. The idea behind the gates came originally from an initiative some years ago to add both character to English villages but also mark a village entry point with an aim of subconsciously slowing the traffic. The gates are made from wood and each year require maintenance. More recently, they have suffered from damage and are also starting to decay. The Parish Council is exploring the possibility of removing the gates all together as we are looking at a repair cost of up to £2000 this year and with a view to replacing them with something else that requires less maintenance but equally providing an 'entry point' for the village. With this in mind, it makes sense to seek the community's view and so we have created a simple poll to garner a consensus. Once we have the result of the poll, we will then be in a position to determine whether it is to repair them or remove them (with a view to replacing them with something else in the future).

If you would like to provide your view anonymously by selecting one of the two options and submit this to us, the Parish Council will then discuss the result at the next suitable Council meeting. The closing date for entries is Friday 18th June 2021.

Greenways

The Parish Council has again raised with CBC the parking problems being experienced by residents in Greenways. Cllr Spicer is to raise the Parish Council's concerns with CBC regarding this location to try and raise capital for improvement works.

Harling Road

CBC will be installing 40mph signs in Harling Road, to slow down vehicles on the dangerous bends.

 UPDATE 10/05/2021: 40mph signs have now been fitted.

The Rye/Totternhoe Road

Due to concerns raised regarding the crossing of this road by pedestrians at the Totternhoe Road/The Rye junction, the Parish Council has asked Cllr Spicer to put to CBC the option of changing the currently 'triangle' into a mini roundabout, which would make this junction safer for road users and slow down traffic.

$Sewage\ Pump\ Station-The\ Rye$

Cllr Spicer and the Parish Council are still

waiting to hear back from CBC/Anglian Water regarding sewage overflowing from the pump station.

- The Rye Fitness Rig: The Parish Council are waiting for confirmation of a delivery/installation date from the supplier.
 - UPDATE 10/05/21: The possible planned delivery/installation of the Fitness Rig is w/c 7 June 2021.
- School Lane play equipment: The Parish Council have looked at designs/ quotations from four playground suppliers, reducing to their two preferred designs. They are now meeting with the final two suppliers on site to look at the proposals before a final decision is made.
- School Lane the Parish Council has approved the purchase and installation of new benches:
 - Two picnic benches, together with ground works, for seating within the recreation ground.

- Two benches next to the skate park.
- UPDATE 10/05/21: The possible planned delivery/installation for all benches is w/c 14 June 2021.

Watercourse/Mill End Close

- The Parish Council met with two representatives from IDB who carried out an analysis of the bank and to discuss the necessity for the work. The Parish Council agreed to commission IDB to carry out the necessary work, however due to high costs have asked IDB to support the council. A decision by IDB will be made at their board meeting in May. Following high levels of winter rainfall, there has been further erosion of the island and the Parish Council agreed that urgent remedial work was necessary and advised IDB accordingly. The Parish Council are waiting to hear back from IDB with their recommendations.
 - UPDATE 10/05/2021: The Parish Council has arranged for emergency repair works - to go onto the island, repair the gaps, weak sections and mend the breach.
- The Parish Council are in the process of obtaining quotations for new fencing to be fitting along the bank in Mill End Close.
 - UPDATE 10/05/2021: Temporary safety fencing is to be erected along the bank, with the permanent fencing along the bank planned to be erected w/c 21 June 2021.

St. Mary's Church Trees

The Parish Council have put in a planning application (CB/TCA/21/00187) for maintenance work to trees in the churchyard, including the removal of Leylandii trees which have become exceptionally large/unsightly. These will be replaced by a mix of

native hedging. Awaiting CBC decision.

 UPDATE 10/05/2021: Planning Application CB/TCA/21/00187 has been approved by CBC. The Parish Council are looking for the works to commence September/October 2021.

Photography in Focus

CHURCHES

This month I am going to explore another theme, following on from 'trees' last time, using a few of the design elements you might want to incorporate in your photography. For this month I have chosen 'churches'.


LIGHT

Mostly, we photograph churches during the daytime but occasionally there is the chance to take a picture at night. This shot was taken when the 'church on the hill' – i.e. St. Mary's Edlesborough, was newly lit with floodlights. You may need to experiment with flash and exposure to get what you want but as it is so unusual, it usually turns out satisfactorily:




VIEWPOINT

This is the church at Streatley, not far from Luton, taken through the gothic arch of the churchyard gate. Hopefully it gives an unusual viewpoint and did require squatting down to frame the building, but that is a small price to pay to gain a more creative picture.



COLOUR

Sometimes the insides of churches can appear a little drab, but where there is bright stained glass this can lift the whole inside of the building. This is a window at Belton House church in Lincolnshire and those of you who know I have an interest in Heraldry will understand why I was taken by this most interesting coat of arms, having a link to Ashridge with the Brownlow family:





STORYTELLING

Above is a wonderful piece of decoration in St. Matthias church in Budapest. I could have placed this in the section on colour as the hues are quite complimentary, but the opportunity to tell a story won out. The way the artist has drawn the deer drinking near the streams that run from the offset circles of the window is just magical.

TEXTURE

LOCAL HERALDRY BY JOHN HOCKEY

In this series, we take a look around local towns and villages to find interesting and unusual heraldry.

ST GEORGE'S CHAPEL, WINDSOR

No doubt many of watched in awe as the funeral of His Royal Highness Prince Philip took place in St George's Chapel, Windsor.

There is much heraldry there as it is the church of The Most Noble Order of the Garter, the premier British Order of Chivalry, instigated by King Edward III in 1348.

One notable knight honoured there is Sir Reginald Bray, of Eaton Bray fame, who was responsible for the redevelopment of the chapel in the reign of Henry VII. He was made a Knight of the Garter in 1501. Here are his arms with the encircling garter:




The description or *blazon* is 'Argent a chevron between three eagles legs erased* Sable'

*'erased' here means 'torn off'.

Incidentally, in the last article I mentioned the Grosvenor family and how they lost their 'Bend Or' and instead were given a golden wheatsheaf in its place. Well, if you look at the banners shown here, about half way down on the right hand side you will see the banner of the Grosvenor

family, 'Azure a garb Or' (blue with a golden wheatsheaf).

Additionally they are Dukes of Westminster, and the design also includes a portcullis as Westminster takes precedence over their own coat of arms.

Down the Lane

Let's hope that we have a flaming June after the cold and wet of April and the beginning of May! My tulips have enjoyed the cool weather and are having a long flowering season, except a few planted in a flower bed which a muntjac deer fancied. In the pots by my front door I decided to be bold and planted 3 different varieties of tulip with clashing colours which, the labels said, flower in April. The orange ones have been amazing and had three large flowers per stem. These have been followed by deep red

ones and the pink ones are just beginning to appear — not quite what I intended but they are giving a long display. They should keep going until I can replace them with geraniums for the summer.

It's been too cold for most bumble bees but when they are around they love lamiums (dead nettles) which come in

several colours and some have variegated leaves. The wild ones are thugs and are banished from the flower beds.

There has been a lot of frost damage in the garden but most plants have survived. The autumn raspberry canes have brown tops, all the flowers and some of the foliage on the bergenia died but new growth is coming from the bases of the plants. A lot of my herbs were looking very sorry for themselves but when I cut away the dead growth new shoots were appearing. I also realized that I need to trim them during the summer to encourage new growth. This contains more concentrated oils which will give a much stronger flavour to the herbs for cooking.

My perennial meadow has cowslips and heartsease flowering. There seem to be lots of buttercup plants but I have left them to grow because the leaves are a different shape from wild buttercups. They are now flowering and I have discovered that they are globe flowers (trollius) which I'd never heard of before. There are lots more seedlings growing so no doubt there will be several more plants that are new to me!

90 Years of Adventure

Celebrate the UK's largest Zoo's 90th birthday at ZSL Whipsnade Zoo

Anyone who feels they have missed out on their share of celebrations over the past year needs look no further, as ZSL Whipsnade Zoo is about to pull the streamers on its 90th birthday.

The UK's largest Zoo is about to turn 90 years old, and, although there will be no blowing out of candles this year, it is marking the date with eleven days of special activities, that can be safely enjoyed by families, across its 600-acre site.

Throughout May half term (29 May - 6 June), the Zoo will be running a fun, birthday treasure hunt. Any child that finds a treasure token hidden somewhere in the huge Zoo will win a prize! Families can also follow the birthday trail around the Zoo and collect a free sticker when they have completed it.

Back at the Event Hub, visitors can create birthday-themed crafts including origami elephants to celebrate one of Whipsnade's most iconic animals, as well as take a look at how the Zoo's keeper uniforms have changed over the decades. Visitors looking to learn more about the Zoo's fascinating

history as a centre for conservation, as well as a glimpse into the quirky Whipsnade of yesteryear, can sign up for a "What makes a Whipsnade?" family-friendly tours, running throughout half-term (advance booking required).

Even the animals will be getting in on the fun, with keepers giving some of the Zoo's 3500 animals special 90th birthday treats, from colossal snacks for elephants to the kind of party food that a bear likes to get its paws on.

ZSL Whipsnade Zoo, or Whipsnade Park Zoo as it was then known, first opened to visitors in 1931 as the first "open zoo" in Europe to be easily accessible to the visiting public. The Zoological Society of London was founded in 1826 with the



aim of promoting worldwide conservation of animals and their habitats, and, while London Zoo was already part of their work, there was a desire to expand the charity's remit to include an "open zoo" in





A derelict farm on the Dunstable Downs was purchased by the Zoological Society of London in 1926 for £13,480 12s 10d and building work began immediately. Animals began arriving at Whipsnade in 1928, with pheasants, llama, wombats and skunks among the first to arrive.

When Whipsnade Park Zoo opened on 23 May 1931, it was an immediate success and welcomed tens of thousands of excited visitors in its opening week. The Zoo's distinctive, chalk, hill figure of a white lion, which measures a gargantuan 147m from nose to tail, was completed in 1933. During the Second World War, the Whipsnade White Lion had to be camouflaged with green paint, turf and netting. The Zoo also acted as a refuge for animals evacuated from London Zoo during the war years.

Now best known for its colossal beasts that graze enormous enclosures, like the Zoo's herd of endangered Asian elephants or its two species of

rhinoceroses, ZSL Whipsnade Zoo is home to 3,500 amazing animals, including brown bears, Amur tigers, spritely squirrel monkeys and adorable otters. Proudly helping to protect endangered species, Whipsnade has contributed to reintroductions of extinct-in-the-wild species, such as the Przewalski horse and the Scimitar Horned Oryx.

Baby Boom at ZSL Whipsnade Zoo

Spring has sprung at ZSL Whipsnade Zoo, where zookeepers are celebrating a baby boom, after a flurry of animal births. While visitors have been flocking back to the large, open spaces of the UK's largest Zoo, its keepers have also had an eclectic array of other new arrivals to welcome, including a baby saki monkey, a yak calf and a litter of woolly,

Mangalitsa piglets.

The as-yet-unnamed baby White-faced saki monkey (Pithecia pithecia) was born to mum Kaituma and dad Milagre on 10 March, but keepers are not yet able to tell the sex of the tiny primate. If female, the white-faced saki monkey will retain its brown and golden coat, but if male will go on to develop the distinctive black hair and white face that gives the species its name. In photos snapped by the Zoo's keepers, the tiny brown monkey can be seen poking out from between its mum's legs, as it hangs onto her belly.

Animal Manager Matt Webb said: "This week for the first time, the baby saki monkey has begun to move around onto mum Kaituma's back, where he or she will spend the next few months before venturing out on its own. The other female of the group, two-year-old Inca,



has also taken her turn babysitting, carrying the baby around for a while on her back to give Kaituma a break. That's how female saki monkeys learn about child-rearing – they get hands-on experience from a very young age."

A larger arrival delighted keepers on 20 March, when female yak (Bos grunniens) Hermione gave birth to a calf, named Snape by his keepers.



Matt continued: "Little Snape was up on his feet and bouncing around the paddock within hours of being born. He loves to play with the other young yaks, Fred, George and Ginny, and we can already see the very beginnings of his horns, which start growing from birth.

"Hermione is a wonderful mum. Yak mothers are very protective, as, in the wild, they have to protect their young from snow leopards and wolves. That's why they have such big horns."

Yaks grow long hair and store fat very efficiently in their bodies which enables them to withstand incredibly low temperatures in the Himalayas.

All across the Zoo, free-roaming animals, such as Red-necked wallabies (Macropus rufogriseus rufogriseus), which bounce all over the 600 acre site, have also been expanding their families in the spring sunshine. Visitors to the Zoo may spot wallaby mothers with joeys in their pouches. Female wallabies, unlike most mammals, are able to have a "conveyor belt" of babies,



sometimes simultaneously carrying an embryo in their uterus, a small joey nursing in their pouch and a larger ("toddler") joey alongside them.

Meanwhile, at the Zoo's farm, two large litters of woolly, Mangalitsa piglets (Sus scrofa domesticus) – a rare, Hungarian breed of pig – were born to mums Blanka and Marja, delighting the Zoo's younger visitors. Born stripey, the pigs are already beginning to grow

their strangely sheep-like woolly coats.



Matt Webb continued: "After such a difficult year, seeing the Zoo filled with people, as well as new life, feels like just what the doctor ordered. We're looking forward to safely welcoming back many more visitors and members over the spring and summer, so it's lovely that there will be brand new animals for them to discover upon their return."




April started mostly settled, but soon turned very cold, bringing frosty mornings. It was dry and sunny, which remained the pattern for the rest of the month. On the 7th, we recorded our lowest temperature of April, at -3.3°c, with a sprinkling of snow on both the 9th and 10th. By the 19th, it was slightly warmer, but at night it was still down to 2 and 3°c. Then temperatures dropped again as we moved into the end of the month.

April's stats: there were 21 frosty mornings and 68.5 hours when the temperature dropped below zero (compared to March with only eight hours). Rainfall was only 10% of the average at 4.4mm and it was a much sunnier month than normal. Altogether, it was an unusually dry, cold and sunny month.



Suffering today....

You may have watched the Real Marigold Hotel on TV? It's all about elderly celebrities spending several weeks in India to research the best place to make their retirement pots go a little further. If you've seen it you will know about the busy city streets, the entrepreneurship to make a living as there is nothing equivalent to our NHS or state help to fall back on when sick or unemployed. We were there in 2014 and it struck as a country of extreme contrasts. One of my cousins was brought up in St Andrews Colonial Homes for children run by Dr Graham at Kalimpong near

What to do in the Garden in June

The longest day of the year falls on June 20th, bringing warmer temperatures and • extra sunlight. Flowers are blossoming, there's lots to harvest in the vegetable • garden, and keeping on top of bolting plants is a priority — particularly weeds!

Timely Tips



Keep on top of your watering

- 1. Check plants daily and water them if the soil is dry especially newly planted fruit trees and shrubs that are still getting established.
- 2. Harden off any remaining half-hardy bedding plants ready for planting out.
 To learn more about making your beds & borders look great across the seasons, head over to our bedding hub page.
- 3. Use blinds or apply shade paint to prevent your greenhouse from overheating. Remember to open vents and doors on warm days.
- 4. Keep on top of weeding. Your plants shouldn't have to compete for precious water, light, and nutrients.

In the flower garden

- Harden off and move hanging baskets and containers growing on in the greenhouse into their final position.
 If your hanging basket plants become leggy, trim off the excess to encourage bushy new growth.
- Continue to thin out drifts of hardy annual plants if they're overcrowded.
- Lift and divide clumps of snowdrops and bluebells once the leaves start to yellow.
- Lift and divide overcrowded clumps

- of flower bulbs and tubers.
- Wait for bulb foliage to die down naturally before cutting back.
- Pinch out the tips of fuchsias to encourage a bushy habit and more flowers. For more information about getting the most out of your fuchsias, check out our fuchsia hub today.
- Start to pick sweet peas as soon as they flower to encourage more blooms.
- Dead-head your roses if they're repeat-flowering types. Otherwise, leave the seed heads on for decoration.
- Dead-head and cut back oriental poppies after flowering. Cutting them close to ground level will stimulate new foliage.
- Stake tall perennial plants to prevent wind damage.
- As new shoots grow, use soft ties to train climbing plants such as honeysuckle and clematis to their supports.
- Prune out overcrowded or dead stems of evergreen clematis once they have finished flowering, to maintain a good shape.
- Towards the end of June, if your hardy geraniums have finished flowering, cut them back to encourage new foliage and flowers. For more information about growing your own gorgeous geraniums, head on over to our new geranium hub.
- Harvest flower heads from your lavender plants to use in baking, crafting, or as a garnish to your meals.

In the vegetable garden



Check and earth up your potatoes as they grow

- Continue to earth up potato plants as they grow. Read our potato growing guide for more advice on growing the best spuds.
- Keep the compost of newly planted container potatoes moist, but take care not to overwater, as this compacts the soil, squeezing out the oxygen, and prevents the developing tubers from swelling.
- Pinch out any side shoots from your tomato plants. You can pot these up to create new tomato plants. Start to feed once the first truss is setting fruit. For more information about growing your own delicious tomatoes, head on over to our new tomato hub.
- Harvest salad crops, and resow every 2 weeks for a constant supply of tasty leaves.
- When planting out cabbages, use brassica collars to prevent cabbage root fly attack.
- Harvest first early potatoes these are normally ready about 10 weeks after planting.
- Keep an eye on your onion and garlic.
 When the leaves start to yellow and die back, they're ready to harvest.
- If you haven't already, harden off and plant tender vegetables such as courgettes, squash, tomatoes and sweet corn.
- Protect crops from carrot fly by covering with horticultural fleece.

In the fruit garden

 Start to prune your plum or cherry trees now.

- Although fruit trees will naturally shed some fruit (called the 'June drop'), aim to thin out congested branches further for bigger and better fruits.
- Protect any developing fruits from birds and squirrels by placing netting around your plants.
- If you have plants fruiting in containers, remember to give them a high potash liquid feed to keep them healthy and productive.
- Top-dress patio dwarf fruit trees with fresh compost and a slow-release fertiliser.
- Peg down runners on your strawberry plants to create more plants for next year. If you don't need more plants simply remove the strawberry runners completely. Visit our strawberry hub to learn more about growing this quintessential summertime fruit.
- Always water potted blueberry plants with rainwater, as the lime contained in tap water reduces the acidity of the soil over time.

Looking after your lawn



Make lawn maintenance easier by adding edging.

- If there hasn't been much rain, raise your lawn mower blades to reduce stress on the grass.
- Water your lawn during hot weather, particularly newly seeded or turfed lawns. Keep new lawns well-watered.
- Warm weather encourages rapid weed growth — apply specific lawn weed killer to tackle them.
- Feed your lawn with a special lawn fertiliser to encourage healthy green growth.
- · Recut lawn edges, or install lawn

edging to make future maintenance • easier.

Other jobs about the garden

- Use water butts as much as possible and water your containers and baskets well in hot weather. Start to feed them with a balanced liquid fertiliser every 2 to 4 weeks.
- Make small 'wells' around individual plants so that the water can soak the soil to about 25cm (10in). Merely wetting the surface wastes water, encourages weeds and can lead to surface rooting making plants more vulnerable.
- Keep removing blanket weed from your pond to allow the plants and fish room to breathe.
- Keep an eye out for white powdery mildew on plants. If possible, remove the affected parts and spray with a fungicide to prevent further spread.
- Look for aphids on the underside of leaves — rub them off by hand or spray with an insecticide to prevent them multiplying. Alternatively try using a natural pest control such as Lacewing larvae.
- Keep an eye out for scarlet lily beetles on your lilies — remove and crush any you see. Also check for the sticky brown larvae on the underside of leaves.
- Check for vine weevils by tipping your plants out of their pots and looking for 'C' shaped creamy maggots amongst the roots. Treat with nematodes if vine weevils are spotted.
- Invest in pest control to prevent slugs attacking your young plants.
- Clip evergreen hedges such as privet, box and yew while they're in active growth.
- Open greenhouse vents and doors on warm days.

- Check plants in your greenhouse daily and water them if the soil is dry.
- Damp down your greenhouse on hot days to increase humidity and deter red spider mites.
- Turn the compost in your bins every month to keep it well aerated.
- Keep bird baths topped up in hot weather.

From your armchair

Eaton Bray History

In 1846/7 the Church of England made an enquiry as to all its church schools. This was against the background of a new Whig government which championed secular education and the increasing importance of nonconformists, particularly Wesleyan Methodists, and Roman Catholics in providing schools.

The return for Eaton Bray recorded an Anglican Sunday School, which was attended by 46 boys and 40 girls and the church's daily school by 30 boys and 26 girls. The vicar (George Edward Whyley) wrote: "The vicarage is in the patronage of Trinity College, Cambridge, which subscribes £5 yearly, and the lessee £10, which subscription it is feared will cease next year, the lease expiring then. The former mistress had £20 per annum, but the sum was too much to be continued. The population is very poor". The daily school is elsewhere called a National School.

A note in a minute book of the church restoration committee from later in the century reads: "The National School opened April 1842, erected without any subscription from the Squire or any of the parishioners". The trust deed is dated 1841 and records that the vicar gave eight poles of glebe land as the site for the school. The first trustees were the vicar himself, his two churchwardens, James Gadsden and William Wood and the two overseers of the poor Wood Pearson and Sam Brown. The deed is endorsed with a statement to the effect that £20 was provided by the Department of Education in 1872 provided the school was not transferred to a School Board.

first Education Act was passed in 1870 (more correctly it was known as the Elementary Education Act). It was a milestone in the provision of education in Britain demonstrating central government's unequivocal support for education of all classes across the country. It also sought to secularise education by allowing the creation of School Boards. These were groups representatives, elected by the local ratepayers and the Board had the powers to raise funds to form a local rate to support local education, build and run schools, pay the fees of the poorest children, make local school attendance compulsory between the ages of 5 and 13 and could even support local

church schools, though in practice they replaced them, turning them into Board run schools (known as Board Schools). Naturally, and luckily for local historians, the Act required a questionnaire of local schools in 1870.

The return for Eaton Bray read: "Existing: Wesleyan Day School. Accommodation for 112 boys and girls and 32 infants. Required: A school for 108 boys and girls and (A) a school for 68 infants, both at Eaton Bray. If the Eaton Bray National School be at once made efficient by supplying school furniture and appointing a certificated teacher, the accommodation required will be reduced to the item marked (A)". This reference seems to imply that the National School was still in existence but was clearly not very well run.

It is impossible to say for certain when the National School closed. In 1875 Lord of the Manor Arthur Macnamara wrote a letter to the newspapers criticising the Vicar of Eaton Bray. One of the vicar's shortcomings was that: "He peremptorily closed his school, which caused the Wesleyan school to be enlarged at an expense of £550". The vicar in question was Rev. John Hall Doe who was appointed in 1871. This suggests a date between 1871 and 1875 for the closure of the school. Against this is the fact that the Post Office Directory for Bedfordshire for 1877 records Miss Priscilla Brown as mistress of the National School. This is the last directory in which the school appears (though the next Bedforshire directory is not until 1885). However, the building is noted - as "School (Boys and Girls)" - on the 1st edition 25 inches to the mile Ordnance Survey map of 1880. By the time of the next map, 1901, the building is marked as a Sunday School.

On 29th September 1887 a parish vestry meeting discussed education: "The matter of the future education of the Parish having been discussed it was intimated that it was impossible any longer to provide the same by means of a purely voluntary school unless such school were supported by a Voluntary rate. The suggestion therefore arose as to whether a Voluntary rate could be collected for this purpose or whether it was desirable to close the existing school and allow the law to take its course, which would mean a School Board. The majority of those present being in favour of an attempt being made to collect a Voluntary Rate it was proposed by Mr. George Shaw, seconded by Mr. H. Lane that the Parish be canvassed with a view to ascertain what number of rate payers were willing to pay to a Voluntary Rate in support of the Existing School and thus avoid a School Board". This existing school was probably the Wesleyan school since at the next meeting, 3rd November, it was noted: "That the names of Mr. George Shaw, Mr. Harold Buckmaster and Mr. William Groom be added to the Existing Committee of the management of the Wesleyan School".

All this evidence points to the National School finally closing at some date between 1880 and 1885. The building was still in existence in the 1940s, between 1945 and 1952 £43/13/- was expended on repairs to the large hall, small room, kitchen, entrance hall, main entrance and gents' lavatory. The buildings, however, are no longer extant. Today [2012] 7 and 9 High Street stands on the approximate location of the old school.

Recently on the television there has been a series of programmes where people have been introduced to the art of pottery using the potter's wheel to make pots. At school I loved the pottery lessons and learned a great deal about making pots, firing in the kiln, decorating, and being pleased with my finished article. I still have an owl that I made when at school and it holds pride of place with all my sentimental things that I have collected. When we look at finished pottery and china products we see things of beauty, but it is easy to forget the hardship and poverty faced by the early artisans who spent much of their time working in filthy and dangerous conditions and noisy factories returning home at night to appalling scenes of squalor.

Originally, the women who worked in the factories were given the menial tasks, and yet women today play a prominent part in production and design. Several years ago Moorcroft insured one of their designers for 1.5 million

pounds.

Out of dull, lifeless clay, things of great beauty and usefulness can be

shaped and formed.

In Florence in Italy in 1502 a large block of marble was given to the church in Santa Maria. The church immediately hired who they thought was a professional sculptor to work on this enormous piece of marble. The man was however not a professional sculptor and soon after commencing work on the marble drilled a large hole at the bottom of the piece of marble destroying it.

The church decided to drape a large sheet over it not knowing what else to do with it as it was damaged beyond recognition. A certain man called Michelangelo caught word of the stone and told the church authorities that he thought he could do something with the marble. After a time, the sculptor worked on the piece of marble and what was once thought a lost cause became one of the greatest statues of David ever sculpted.

We are all unique, but God can use us each day. Just the little things, the kindness shown to someone, the phone call, the card, or letter all can brighten up someone's day and we can be used by God in so many ways.
