I am writing this article for *Focus* enjoying the sun that has been beating down on us for the last couple of weeks. It has seemed like a long time coming, but now it is here I have been trying to make the most of it: doing all those jobs that have needed doing in the garden, enjoying some walks in the local countryside, as well as just sitting and enjoying simply being able to relax in the garden without the fear of a sudden cold, wet wind.

The recent sun reminded me of an animated version of one of *Aesop's Fables* that I was shown when I was young. In the *Fable of the Wind and the Sun*, the wind and the sun decide to have a competition to see who is the strongest. To prove this feat they agreed that the winner will be whoever can get a man walking in the countryside to take off his coat. The wind goes first and blows and blows, but to no avail - however hard the wind blows, the tighter the man holds on to his coat. The sun then has his go, and the sun makes the weather warmer and warmer, until the man eventually takes off his coat. The moral of the fable is that *persuasion* is better than *force*.

In the Bible the sun is sometimes used as an image of God. In the *Book of Psalms* its says 'For the LORD God is a sun and shield; he bestows favour and honour. No good thing does the LORD withhold from those who walk uprightly.' (Ps 84:11) And in the less well-known prophecy of Habakkuk, the prophet describes the glory of God by saying: 'The brightness was like the sun; rays came forth from his hand, where his power lay hidden.' (Hab 3:4). Before the electric lightbulb, the sun provided light for people to see and to work; the dark of the night was, in contrast, something to be feared. The sun also provides warmth – something that is particularly important in the Near East, where the contrast in temperature between night and day can be incredibly large. The feeling of warmth is one that is also associated with comfort and security, which is what I think the prophet Habakkuk is also alluding to, God's power is not simply forceful like the wind, but it also provides us with comfort and security. Indeed, God, like the sun, lights the path for us showing where we should go; God, like the sun, provides us with the light of hope that dispels fear and worry; God provides us with the light of the spirit that brings us comfort and security.

There is also a question and a challenge for us too. Are we like suns to those around us? Do we provide others with warmth, direction, and security? Or are we like the wind in Aesop's fable? Do we try and get out own way, at whatever the cost? In one of his parables Jesus calls us to be like a

bright city on a hill, and like candles, providing people with hope, with guidance and with love. Then, and only then, can we 'shine like the sun in the kingdom of our Father' (Matt 13:43). I hope that over the summer, as we all enjoy some nice sunny weather, we can all take some time to think about how 'sunny' we are to others, and about those things that we can do to provide warmth, security and confidence to all those around us.



Edlesborough Parish Council News Including Edlesborough, Dagnall and Northall

Annual Meeting of Edlesborough Parish Council

On the 20th May Edlesborough Parish Council held its Annual Meeting of the Parish Council in Edlesborough Memorial Hall. This was the first time Councillors had physically attended a meeting in over a year. Thanks to modern technology Councillors who were unable to attend in person and parishioners were able to join the meeting via the social media platform Zoom.

At this meeting Councillors unanimously voted for Mr Alan Williams to continue as Chair and Mr Kevin Cubbage to continue as Vice Chair to the Council.


In order to minimise the time spent together in an enclosed space, Council worked their way through a short agenda addressing Councillor responsibility, finance and planning matters. A copy of the minutes can be viewed on the Council website.

Parking Issues

During the past month the Parish Council has been contacted several times about inconsiderate and dangerous parking in the Parish, in particular in the village of Edlesborough.

Council reminds all parishioners to consider how their parking affects others. When leaving your vehicle:

• Does it restrict access on the pavement so as to force a pedestrian, pushchair or wheelchair user on to the road?



Council reminds all drivers that they should avoid parking on the white lines near the shops and school.

Edlesborough Parish Council does not have any enforcement powers over parking in the Parish. Only the police (Thames Valley Police for Edlesborough, Dagnall and Northall) have powers (outside of London and Wales) to enforce against pavement parking. They can do this where there is an obstruction (including to a buggy/ wheelchair user) or a safety issue, such as parking within 10m of a junction.

The recent issues at the top of the High Street in Edlesborough have been drawn to the attention of both Buckinghamshire Council and Thames Valley Police.

Thames Valley Police have advised the Council that if a vehicle is parked with 10m of the junction of the High Street and the B440, regardless of who it is, visitor, workman, or resident then Thames Valley Police will start issuing tickets.

We have been asked by Buckinghamshire Council Highways Department to encourage Parishioners wishing to report dangerous or obstructive parking, to do so to Thames Valley Police.

Edlesborough Parish Council is open to proposals on possible solutions on a range of issues regarding traffic of any kind. During May and June EPC delivered two flyers to all homes in the Parish informing them about Buckinghamshire Council's Ivinghoe Freight Zone Strategy Consultation.

EPC strongly believes that Buckinghamshire Council should reconsider their position not to include the B440 (Leighton Road) in the Freight Strategy. If the B440 is not included in the strategy EPC believes there will be a 50-70% increase in HGV vehicles using the B440.

Grass & Hedge Cutting in the Villages

Grass Verges

Now that the growing season is in full swing my Council requests that drivers do not park cars on the grass verges in the villages. Parking on the verges causes damage to them and makes it difficult for the Council's contractor to cut the verge.

Hedge Cutting

The Council contractor is scheduled to cut the Pastures hedge in the last week of June/first week of July.

The hedge will be cut to the recommended height of 8ft.

The Council is aware of concerns about nesting birds and endeavours to do all it can to protect them. However the Council is also duty bound to ensure that the hedge does not overhang the footpath so as to:

1. Endanger or obstruct the passage of pedestrians

2. Potentially causes danger to the surface of the footpath.

EPC asks all parishioners whose hedges border the pavements to ensure that their hedges are kept well-trimmed ensuring that the maximum pavement width is available for pedestrians, pushchair and wheelchair users.

Edlesborough Pavilion

At the time of writing this report EPC is expecting Edlesborough Pavilion to begin opening sometime in July, hopefully.



"Treasure Island" was set for June 23rd. "Jane Eyre" arrives on August 4th and the Summer season closes on August 25th with "The Secret Garden". No doubt there will be a Christmas production.

From September 10th we are participating in Heritage Open Days, as is St. Mary's Eaton Bray. The theme this year is "Edible England", so there could be some treats in store.

We are constantly approached by artists wanting to perform at the Church, and we are hopeful that by September we may be able to host a modest event.

The Church is open to visitors every day, as indicated on the sign. Exceptions are when Champers have exclusivity from 6pm to 10am. Please sign the Visitors Book and consider a donation to CCT via the Wall Safe or by text. Details in the Church.

The fallow deer are an integral part of the landscape at Ashridge and a much-loved feature of this historic estate.

Medieval Origins

In 1283, Edmund Earl of Cornwall (grandson of King John of Robin Hood fame) founded a monastery on the site where Ashridge House now stands. It was named 'Assherugge'.

times, a deer park was created, surrounding the monastery. Fallow deer were brought in, kept within this fenced enclosure, and hunted for venison. This is the origin of the fallow deer that live at Ashridge today.

Following the dissolution of the monasteries, the estate passed into the hands of the Earls of Bridgewater. The park was expanded, but the deer were always kept within the fenced parkland and managed by the park keepers.

The Great Sale – The Deer Set Free

In 1925, the owners of the Ashridge Estate decided to sell up. By this time the estate comprised not only the park, but large areas of woodland and commons surrounding it. The estate was broken up and Ashridge House was sold, but the magnificent landscape that surrounded it passed to the National Trust to look after.

At the time of the sale, the fences enclosing the park were removed. The deer that had lived behind fences for 600 years were set free to roam across the countryside. They now travel widely in the landscape, crossing land owned by many landowners, and are truly wild animals.

How to Recognise a Fallow Deer

Fallow deer bucks (males) have distinctive palmate antlers with a broad flat centre. Younger males are called 'prickets' and their antlers are shorter and pointed. The antlers are shed every year, and each year they grow back bigger, until around the age of eight

when the males have reached their maximum size. Antlers are made of bone which can grow at a rate of 2.5 cm a day. A soft velvet covering helps protect newly forming antlers as they grow, but this is shed once the antlers are fully grown.

Fallow deer come in a variety of colours. You're most likely to see the dark, or melanistic, deer at Ashridge, but tan, spotty, or even white individuals also can also be seen. They were originally brought to England from the Mediterranean area but are now considered to be naturalised in Britain.

Muntjac deer also live at Ashridge, they are small and stocky, and are sometimes mistaken for wild boar. Muntjac are native to Asia and are thought to have escaped into the countryside from Woburn. They are now widespread across England and Wales.

How to See Deer on the Estate

Deer are naturally cautious animals that move in small groups and avoid humans. They are surprisingly hard to see within the tree canopy and it's possible to pass very close to them without seeing them – you need to keep your eyes peeled. Peer though the trunks of the trees into the darkest places, looking for the give-away flick of a tail or the glint of a bright eye. If you want to photograph them you will need a long lens and a steady hand.

We recommend walking quietly and keeping dogs on a short lead. Choose parts of the estate that are away from roads and well used tracks. The best time of day to see deer is at dawn and dusk when they are most active.

The Rut

The breeding season for Fallow deer, known as the rutting season, begins once the weather turns cold, usually in October. At this time of year the bucks can be heard making loud, deep, groaning calls in order to attract a doe (female). The sound of the groan is directly related to the size of the male, although it's not possible for us to hear the difference. For other bucks, however, this is

very important – it can help them know how strong another buck is likely to be and whether it's worth the risk of challenging them. If they are closely matched in size bucks may test their strength against each other by pushing and shoving each other with their antlers.

A Forest Feast

Fallow deer graze in open grasslands as well as browse on trees and shrubs in woodlands. Much of their diet consists of grasses and flowers but they also eat the fresh young shoots of trees, shrubs and brambles. Some tree species are clearly favoured over others with ash, hornbeam, sweet chestnut, hazel and sallow amongst the favourites. Silver birch is one of the least palatable species.

Like most herbivores their diet depends on the season, and during autumn they will eat the fruits of the forest such as acorns, beech nuts, and sweet chestnuts, which they can remove from their prickly casing using their front hooves. During winter, when food is harder to find, they'll take the juicy buds from trees. When really pushed, such as in snow or severe winter weather they'll strip the bark from trees.

All deer are ruminants and often spend time 'laying up' in quiet areas during the daytime while they chew the cud.

MODIFYING IMAGES

In this article I am going to talk about changing the image you may have captured on your phone, tablet or camera, by using built in software as you take the shot or by using options later to modify what your eye actually saw.

Every village in Bedfordshire was given a sign following the Festival of Britain in 1951. In addition to the village name, the Festival logo (designed by Abram Games) is at one end and the Bedfordshire County coat of arms is at the other. Here is a photograph of the village sign for Eaton Bray, but not in a way you would normally see it!




One setting on my camera allows for a 'fish-eye' lens to be brought into play, so the centre of the photograph is swollen relative to the outer edges. It makes for an interesting picture which would probably make you sit up and take notice if you saw it in a magazine.

Turning to my tablet, there are various options in what it calls the 'Photo Booth' app. Thermal Camera is one such and it enables you to turn a humble fruit bowl

into a psychedelic exercise in chromatic extravagance – radioactive banana anyone? Turning back to my camera there is the ability to change the colour of particular elements, using 'Colour Swap'. With this option you can select an unusual colour for an object and alter just one part in a picture. Here I have turned the copper vase at the top of the Bridgewater Monument in Ashridge





from its normal verdigris shade of blue-green to deepest pink. Quite an interesting colour on an otherwise grey day, though I'm not sure whether Francis, 3rd Duke of Bridgewater 'The Father of Inland Navigation' would approve!

Using online software such as PhotoShop to alter what you and your camera or phone saw is a well-established technique allowing a myriad of artistic possibilities. Personally I don't tend to use such devices but just for fun, I installed a free program called FotoSketcher

to see what I could do. Here is a picture I have used before of some Sorbus berries on

a tree after rain. To the left is the shot as taken and to the right is the picture manipulated with a filter allowing it to look like I have painted it in an impressionistic style. I am grateful to fellow photographer Andy Wood for pointing me in the direction of this software.



Well folks, I feel this series on photography has almost run its course but I will end next time with a piece on captions, which can make or mar an otherwise interesting picture.

OHEN'S

LOCAL HERALDRY BY JOHN HOCKEY

In this series, we take a look around local towns and villages to find interesting and unusual heraldry.



JOHN O'GAUNT

In normal times I have been known to play a bit of golf and there is a splendid golf course near Sandy in Bedfordshire called John O'Gaunt GC. The course was so named because at one time John of Gaunt, third son of Edward III, owned the land on which it was constructed. By coincidence I have recently finished a new book called The Red Prince – John of Gaunt, on the cover of which is a famous sixteenth-century portrait containing his coat of arms.

A more modern representation of the arms is shown here:

We can learn a lot about a person from looking at such arms on a portrait. The main shield is quartered with the first

and fourth quarters picked out in what is called 'France Ancient'. That is a *semé* or large number of fleur de lis, representing the kingdom of France. In 1394 the king of France changed the design to the simpler (and less costly in terms of gold thread) *Azure three fleur de lis* Or and this practice was followed by Henry IV in 1405. The other two quarters are of course the three lions of England. At this time, France was the premier kingdom so it is depicted in the first quarter.

In the centre is another shield and that is known as an *inescutcheon of pretence*, usually a representation of the arms of a wife, here Constance, of Castile and Leon (= Castle and Lion).



The *label* or horizontal bar with other bars hanging from it with ermine spots is a symbol used to denote the son of the sovereign.

Around the outside of the shield is the representation of the Garter with its well-known motto '*Honi Soit Qui Mal Y Pense*', instigated by Edward III in 1348.

Atop everything is a coronet and again, these are different depending upon who is entitled to wear them. For royalty, the coronet for a son of the sovereign is as shown, with crosses and fleur de lis around the rim.

So, without knowing anything about the man in the portrait we can tell he is a son of the sovereign, a member of the Order of the Garter, that he was married to an heiress of part of a foreign land and that the painting was depicting a time before 1405 but after 1348! Pearl Barley and Vegetable Bake

My grandma was an expert in feeding a large family for next to nothing. She could throw together a stew for pennies. Her favourite ingredient was pearl barley, and eating it today immediately takes me back to her kitchen. It is so cheap and so easy to cook. But don't for a moment think it's boring. It brings a lovely soft nuttiness to any dish and is, I have read, easier to digest for some people than gluten based products like pasta. This bake is a throw-it-all-in job, totally foolproof and absolutely delicious. If you want to add meat or fish, simply mix in finely sliced chicken breast for the last 15 minutes of cooking, or salmon cubes for the last 10 minutes.

This will serve 4 people

350g pearl barley
1 courgette, finely diced
1 red onion, finely diced
2 leeks, finely sliced
3 garlic cloves, chopped
1 red pepper, finely diced
850ml vegetable stock
Good pinch of salt
Ground pepper
Finely grated zest of a lemon
Glug of good quality rapeseed oil

To finish off The juice of the lemon Rapeseed oil A bunch of basil, chopped

Preheat the oven to 180C/ Gas Mark 4

Chuck all the ingredients (except the lemon juice and basil) into a large baking dish.

Give it all a really good stir and cover tightly with either a lid or silver foil.

Simply bake in the oven for around an hour. The stock should be fully absorbed and the pearl barley soft.

Give it a good mix then pour in a little glug of oil, a good squeeze of lemon and throw in the basil. Mix once more, season and serve.

My background and experience is as follows, I qualified as an S.R.N. In 1963 in 3 years and a I took a further year to receive the hospital badge at the Luton and Dunstable University Hospital. In 1985 following a Spinal Fusion and 5 months later a diagnosis of Fibromyalgia, I learnt that the most important treatment for the condition is Daily Exercise. In order to enjoy my life, to feel personally fulfilled and able to interact with my family, action was required. I had already known of The Woman's League of Health and Beauty and its commencement in the 1930s when these avant-garde ladies in London had seen young German men fit and exercising and felt that they needed to be competitive too. I have met elderly ladies who have been members of the League and they definitely demonstrate mobility and fitness.

When I was fitter and able to drive again, I joined 'Extend', based on the League movements using seated or standing exercises. Being qualified I had no difficulty finding work in Care homes, Colleges and Day Centres and I worked every day of the week helping out.

In 2006 my long time friend Fran (an Art Therapist) and I started a business together as a Social Enterprise. I had experienced work in Care Homes and recognised that exercise and meaningful activities were very limited in the 8 years that I had been involved working in care. We named our company VIVALO which means Nourishing Aliveness. For 6 years we trained carers in Care homes so that they could increasingly engage more with their residents. Sadly with Care homes struggling and a shortage of carers we were unable to continue with the training, although I had seen some evidence of confidence and meaningful activities prior to Covid-19.

Eaton Bray Wesleyan School




Elevations of the school and the master's house about 1860

The Wesleyan School in Eaton Bray probably had its genesis in the Sunday School run by Wesleyans in the village. In 1833 the government made £20,000 per annum available in grants to help build schools. It also prompted a questionnaire asking for details of local another educational provision. The Eaton Bray return noted: a Sunday School "in which are from 40 to 100 of both sexes, supported by collections among the Wesleyan Methodists". In those days a Sunday School was just that,

a school which met on a Sunday, usually in the church or nonconformist chapel or other similar building, teaching more than the religious topics with which they are associated today.

About 1860 plans were drawn up for a purpose built school, complete with a house for the schoolmaster and in that year the trustees of J. Pedley conveyed the site of the intended school to Wesleyan trustees. The school stood in Gammons Lane (which came to be called School Lane), close to the junction with the High Street on the south-east side.

The cause of the Wesleyan school seems to have been aided, presumably unintentionally, by the vicar. On 3rd March 1875 a letter attacking the vicar was published in the local press. It was from the Lord of the Manor, Arthur Macnamara, a notoriously difficult character himself. He alleged that the vicar, who had been appointed in 1871, had: "peremptorily closed his school, which caused the Wesleyan school to be enlarged at an

expense of £550". In fact the National School seems to have limped on for another five or ten years before finally closing some time between 1880 and 1885.

The first Education Act was passed in 1870 (more correctly it was known as the Elementary Education Act). It was a milestone in the provision of education in Britain demonstrating central government's unequivocal support for education of all classes across the country. It also sought to secularise education by allowing the creation of School Boards. These were groups of representatives, elected by the local ratepayers and the Board had the powers to raise funds to form a local rate to support local education, build and run schools, pay the fees of the poorest children, make local school attendance compulsory between the ages of 5 and 13 and could even support local church schools, though in practice they replaced them, turning them into Board run schools (known as Board Schools). Naturally, and luckily for local historians, the Act required a questionnaire of local schools in 1870.

The return for Eaton Bray read: Existing: Wesleyan Day School. Accommodation for 112 boys and girls and 32 infants. Required: A school for 108 boys and girls and (A) a school for 68 infants, both at Eaton Bray. If the Eaton Bray National School be at once made efficient by supplying school furniture and appointing a certificated teacher, the accommodation required will be reduced to the item marked (A).

A School Board was formed in Eaton Bray on 13th July 1893. It took over the premises of the Wesleyan School the following year and the school was thereafter run as a Board School.



Don't we all just love the Repair Shop programme on TV? After several years of our throw-a-way society, it's refreshing to know that there are people out there who value things, for sentimental reasons, over many years despite them not being usable. Things that seem way beyond repair become as new!

What is your favourite repair? What is so interesting are the stories that go with each article brought in? Things that are so dilapidated, they should have been thrown away years ago but have been treasured because of those stories. The people who had owned them were very special and the tales are sometimes distressing, very moving. The final results never fail to astound those who brought them in.

My favourite one was the 2 storey toadstool night light – Bunnies Cottage. It was broken into hundreds of little pieces and when it was repaired it was amazing. The lady told the story that her Father bought it for her when she was born and as a child she was afraid of the dark but it was always already lit when she went up to bed. It formed the basis of nightly bedtime stories about the bunnies that her Mother made up and which she can still remember and values.

The presenter, Jay Blades tells in his autobiography that he was broken and the program helped to repair him. He said that 'the biggest repair job done in the Repair Shop is me' following his mental health problems. He went on to say that 'it's wonderful to know that nothing's so broken it can't be mended'. That's so true. But how are things mended? Who repairs broken souls?



Bunnies Cottage

The bible is full of stories about folk that were broken and were mended. Mended by what or who? Jesus healed the blind, the lame, those with leprosy and those with mental health problems. What to do in the Garden in July

July brings long, warm days that continue late into the evening perfect for pottering in the garden after work, hosting barbecues, and enjoying your beds and borders as they reach their peak.

Here's a list of jobs to keep on top of this July:

Timely tips

- Summer can still throw out a few surprises

 make sure tall plants and climbers are well supported in case of bad weather.
- 2. Water at dusk to reduce evaporation and use mulch to retain moisture around plants.
- 3. Terracotta pots are prone to evaporation so dampen the pot down to keep roots inside cool and damp.
- 4. Regularly deadhead bedding and perennial plants to encourage new blooms for as long as possible.

In the flower garden



- Cut back faded perennial plants to keep borders tidy.
- As your penstemon flowers fade, cut them back to just above a bud to encourage more flowers.
- Cutting back growth in hanging baskets can encourage new flowers and foliage and will revive the display. Make sure you feed your baskets well after doing this.
- Cut back hardy geraniums and delphiniums after the first flush of flowers to encourage new growth and further blooms.
- Continue to tie in and train new growth on climbing plants.
- Prune wisteria now. Just remove the whippy side-shoots from the main branch framework to about 20cm from their base (about five leaves from the main stem).

- Prune lupins to encourage more flowers.
- If you need to prune your deciduous magnolia, now's the best time to do it.
- Divide clumps of bearded Iris so they have time to form roots and flower buds for next year before the cold weather arrives.
- Take cuttings from your favourite tender plants for overwintering indoors. Cuttings can also still be taken from shrubs and border perennials.
- Deadhead bedding plants and perennial plants to stop them self-seeding and to encourage further flowering.
- Deadhead your roses to keep them looking tidy. Leave the flowers in place if your rose produces attractive hips (seed pods).
- Deadhead sweet peas regularly to keep them blooming. Water daily in dry weather.
- Capture seed heads from dandelions and other weeds. Collect them before they get a chance to release their seeds and spread throughout your garden.
- Keep an eye out for pests on plants, early treatment is best.
- Stop rust damaging hollyhock foliage by pruning out affected leaves and/or spraying with a fungicide.
- Look out for clematis wilt. Symptoms include wilting leaves and black discolouration on the leaves and stems. Cut out all affected material and dispose of it in your household waste.
- July is a good time to spray ground elder, bindweed and other persistent weeds with a glyphosate-based weed killer as the plants now have lots of leaf surface area with which to absorb it.

In the vegetable garden



- Pepper plants will benefit from being potted on into progressively larger pots.
- Train cucumber stems upwards to make the most of the space available. Simply tie in their long stems to vertical wires or use cane supports to create a wigwam of poles.
- If you're growing aubergines, pinch out the growing tip once they have 5 or 6 fruits. Pick fruits while they are young. You can expect to start harvesting mid to late summer.
- Nip off the growing tips of squash and courgette plants to encourage branching.
- Pinch out tomato side shoots each week. Cut off any leaves growing below the lowest ripening fruit trusses to improve air circulation and prevent diseases.
- Boost your tomato crop by regularly feeding plants with dilute tomato fertiliser once a week. If leaves look pale and yellow, feed more regularly.
- Feed crops with a general purpose fertiliser.
- Apply a high-potash fertiliser once fruits start to form on peppers, cucumber and tomatoes. You can use this on sunflowers too.
- Harvest garlic when the tops start to bend over and yellow.
- Pick your courgettes while they're young. Regular picking encourages more fruit.
- Encourage more marrows by harvesting regularly. Marrows that form in July and August should reach a good size by autumn. Let their skins harden in the sun before cutting them later in September or October. They can be stored into winter.
- Pick, dry and freeze herbs for using later in the year.
- Pick runner beans regularly to prevent them becoming stringy and to make room for developing pods. Leaving mature pods on the plant can prevent further flowers forming and reduce your crop.
- Harvest beetroot, peas, carrots, chard, potatoes, salad leaves, lettuce, and tomatoes this month.
- Resist the temptation to harvest more rhubarb

stems. Leave the stems in place; this will allow the plant to build up reserves for next year.

- Water your fruit and vegetable crops daily in warm weather. Try to ensure that they're consistently moist.
- Use grass clippings as a mulch around potato plants to stop tubers near the surface from turning green. Alternatively earth up your potato plants as they grow. If you're growing potatoes in bags, gradually add more compost until the bag is full.
- Control slugs to prevent them damaging your crops. Try using a natural pest control to reduce numbers.
- Tackle blackfly on broad beans by pinching off any affected growing tips.
- Check for cabbage white butterfly eggs under brassica leaves and squash any that you find.
- Clear away any diseased and spent foliage on and around your vegetable plants to keep them healthy.
- Clear weeds regularly, as they compete with your crops for nutrients and water.

In the fruit garden



- Thin out the fruits on your fruit trees to produce good sized crops. This also helps to prevent brown rot.
- Protect any developing fruits from birds and squirrels by placing mesh around your plants.
- If you have plants fruiting in containers, make sure you give them a high potash liquid feed to keep them healthy and productive.
- Feed lemons and other citrus fruit trees throughout summer with a special citrus fertiliser.
- Treat apple scab with a fungicide. Always read the manufacturer's label to check the suitability for use on edible crops.

- Check the leaves of gooseberry bushes for sawfly larvae, which can completely strip the foliage in a matter of days. Jet them off with water or pick them off by hand.
- Peg down runners on your strawberry plants to create more plants for next year. If you don't need more plants simply remove the strawberry runners completely.
- Maximise your fig crop by pinching out the tips of side shoots after they've developed five leaves.
- Prune your stone fruit trees like plum, apricot, peach and cherry now. Pruning these species in the summer reduces the risk of silver leaf disease.
- If you've trained your apples and pears as cordons, fans or espaliers, give them their summer prune now to maintain a good shape.
- Prune the fruited stems of blackcurrant bushes after harvesting.
- Raspberries are shallow rooted so they'll appreciate being watered generously in hot, dry weather.

In the greenhouse

- Check plants daily. Water first thing in the morning or in the evening to reduce water loss through evaporation.
- Harden off and plant out any plug plants that you've been growing on.
- Damp down your greenhouse on hot days to increase humidity and deter red spider mites.
- Open vents and doors daily to provide adequate ventilation.
- Use blinds or apply shade paint to prevent the greenhouse from overheating in sunny weather.
- Try hanging sticky traps to catch flying pests to determine which pest control is needed.
- Tidy up fallen leaves and flowers to discourage the spread of fungal disease.

Looking after your lawn

- This is your last chance to feed your lawn with a special lawn fertiliser to encourage healthy green growth.
- Water your lawn during hot weather,

particularly newly seeded or turfed lawns. Don't allow new lawns to dry out.

- If you're experiencing prolonged dry weather, set your mower blades higher to reduce stress on the grass.
- Warm weather encourages rapid weed growth apply specific lawn weed killer to tackle this problem.
- If your lawn is infested by ants, brush out the nests on a dry day. Always brush them away before mowing.
- Recut any lawn edges if needed and install lawn edging to make future maintenance easier.

Other jobs about the garden



- Water the soil around the base of plants rather than the foliage. Make 'pools' around individual plants so that the water is directed straight to the roots where it's needed or use an auto-watering collar.
- Water containers and baskets thoroughly in hot weather. Continue to feed them with a balanced liquid fertiliser every 2 to 4 weeks.
- Use water butts instead of tap water as often as you can when watering your plants.
- Turn the content of your compost bin every month to keep it well aerated.
- Keep bird baths topped up in hot weather.
- Remove floating blanket weed from your pond plants by twirling it around a stick or garden cane. Before composting it, pile the weed close to the pond for a few hours so any displaced creatures can crawl back into the water.
- Keep an eye out for powdery mildew on plants. Remove any affected parts and spray with a fungicide to prevent further spread.
- Look after your aphid eaters ladybirds, hoverflies and lacewings feast on greenfly and blackfly so it's worth protecting them.

- Look for aphids on the underside of leaves - rub them off by hand or spray with an insecticide to prevent them multiplying. Alternatively use natural pest control such as Lacewing larvae.
- Keep an eye out for scarlet lily beetles on your lilies remove and crush any you see. Also check for the sticky brown larvae on the underside of leaves.
- If your plants are wilting for no obvious reason, check for vine weevils by tipping your plants out of their pots and looking for 'C' shaped creamy maggots amongst the roots. Treat with nematodes if vine weevils are spotted.
- Prevent slugs attacking your young plants by using pest control. For container plants apply

copper tape.

Elevation: 450 ft - Latitude: 51° 50' 13" North - Longitude: 0° 33' 34" West




Temperatures were down on the average for May with a low of 0.04° c on the 1st. We had to wait to the last day of the month to reach the warmest day, 24.1° c.

The rain that really dominated May was 208% of the 13 year average.
