'O Lord, I have heard of your renown, and I stand in awe, O Lord, of your work.' (Habakkuk 3:2) This year, in line with the International Climate Conference that is going to be held in Glasgow in the Autumn, the Church of England is encouraging all of its churches to dedicate some time to reflecting on creation, environmental issues and all the things we can do to try and do our bit to slow Climate Change, both as individuals and as a church.

As Christians there is a lot that we can do to help climate change: small actions may seem like they don't make a difference but they really can add up, as the Roman poet Ovid once wrote 'Adding little to little, you end up with a big heap'. So, trying to use less plastic by having a refillable container, or making sure you don't fill a kettle up when it isn't needed, or making sure that computers and televisions are not left on standby, will make a difference, even if we don't notice it. While aspects of climate change can have an impact on our local areas, the effects of many developing countries can be catastrophic; places such as Bangladesh have seen more damaging weather that is a result of climate change. Very often, poorer countries struggle to respond to the impacts of climate change, so we need to respond both with charitable giving to organizations like Christian Aid, but also by changing the things that we do to help limit climate change.

Thinking about creation, though, is not simply about environmental issues – although they are certainly an important part of how Christians should engage with the created world. The Bible often describes the awe and wonder of creation, and at time we can lose that sense of awe and wonder. It does us good to remember how beautiful and amazing the world is and to think about what we can all do all to help protect it.

As part of our response, we are planning some events and services to celebrate God's creation. At the end of July we will be holding a Messy Church in the grounds of St. Mary's Eaton Bray, where children will be coming to learn about creation. We have a number of activities planned, like making a "bug hotel", a place where solitary bees and other insects can make a home and lay their eggs. The children will also be decorating an altar frontal with things found in the churchyard. We will be following this with an Outdoor Eucharist (weather permitting), where we will worship outdoors using the altar frontal the children have made. This will be held on **Sunday 8th August at 10am**.

followed by a bring your own picnic in the churchyard. All are welcome! Although we will be able to supply a few chairs, we are encouraging people to bring a blanket or their own chairs to sit on.

We will also be welcoming Rev'd Canon John Payne-Cook on **Sunday 5th September, at 10am** who will be preaching during our normal Sunday service. Canon John has done a lot of research into environmentalism in Christian thought and has a wealth of knowledge and insight into the issues, so we are really looking forward to hearing what he has to teach us.

This month I encourage you all to think about the created world and about



the changes that you can make to help protect our environment. Above all, I hope that you manage to take advantage of some of the summer sun and stand in awe and wonder at the beauty of the created world.

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

Planning Applications in the Parish

Each month EPC considers planning applications for Edlesborough, Dagnall and Northall that have been submitted to Buckinghamshire Council for approval.

Parish Councils are statutory consultees and as such EPC is invited to comment on most planning applications within the Parish. When the Council is advised of a new application, Cllr Wilkinson reviews it against the current national, local and neighbourhood planning policies and then makes a recommendation to the other councillors. The Parish Council then consider that recommendation and either agree it or amend it, before it is sent off to the local planning authority as EPC's formal response.

The planning officers are obliged to consider EPC's comments but they do not have to agree with them. If their assessment differs from EPC's, it is their view that prevails and not the Parish Council's.

When commenting on an application EPC has three options. 'Support', 'Oppose' or 'No Objections'. If EPC considers that a proposal is contrary to any of the relevant planning policies the Council will usually oppose the application. If EPC considers that the proposal conforms to the relevant policies and is for the benefit of the general community as a whole, the Council will usually support the application. For most other proposals (which are the majority), EPC sends in a no objections response.

Parishioners need to understand that because EPC represents the Parish as a whole, the Council has to view applications on their impact on the general community and not individual parishioners. Where parishioners have differing views over planning matters, EPC cannot take 'sides' because the Council represents both parties. EPC also confines its comments to issues that are material planning matters and not such things as, loss of views, the possible intentions or reputation of an applicant etc. Some planning policies are quite definitive and it is relatively clear cut whether or not a proposal complies. Other policies however are somewhat general and it is very subjective whether or not they comply. Where a judgment is very subjective, EPC usually draws attention to the possibility that it might not comply, but leaves it to the planning officers to make that final decision.

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
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
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
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Methodist Lay Worker's Letter

Dear Friends,

It has been a long time since I last wrote to you, and this will be my last letter as a Lay Worker in the local Methodist churches, as my contract ends in August.

The long pause has been because I had a diagnosis of cancer in November, and have been undergoing chemotherapy, which while horrendous, has been successful in controlling the disease. I am now on a 3-month break from treatment, and looking forward, as we all are, to enjoying the summer!

This last period of my life has taught me a few lessons which I have found invaluable – the first is that angels are everywhere. People I expected to help have offered, but others who I never expected – one particular lady has undertaken to cook our Sunday lunch every week, which has been a real blessing – and she's a great cook too!

The other lesson is that we must never underestimate the power of prayer. There have been people praying for me from as far away as Sweden and Argentina, as well as friends from Nigel's and my respective home churches, and local Christians too. I am convinced that, together with the chemotherapy and the amazing scans the

NHS have at their fingertips these days, all this has worked together to make me as well as I am today.

I would encourage you, if you are struggling either with health issues or maybe work-related problems, family or mental health difficulties – ask your local Christians to pray for you. We don't need to know all the details, your first name is quite sufficient – God knows all the issues and cares deeply about you. I can vouch for this from my own experience – when I have been too ill to pray, the prayers of others have held and supported me.

St. Paul writes in the Bible that God said to him, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness. . . I will boast all the more gladly (says Paul), about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me . . . for when I am weak, then I am strong." (2 Corinthians 12: 9-10)

My prayer for you is that you will know God's strength in your times of weakness too, as I have.

Down the Lane

2021 has been a glorious year for roses, except when they were lashed by the winds and rain in June. I grew some patio roses from seed a few years ago. They are now growing in a raised bed and flower their socks off all summer. I remove the dead heads and back they come, as you can see in the photo. The bed hums with bees as I grow lavender with the roses. I trim it back at the end of the summer and prune in the spring so that the plants stay a good shape. I must remember to cut some lavender flowers to dry to make lavender bags.

I planted some new, bare-root roses in the spring but a muntjac has taken a fancy to them, eating the new foliage, so they are rather small with very few flowers. I have decided that companion planting deters muntjac so the roses are now surrounded by catmint (nepeta) which seems to be working and attracts lots of bees.

Last year I bought a hanging basket of strawberry plants, thinking that would be an easy way to grow them. Unfortunately, it's difficult to give them enough water in a basket so there was a very poor crop. I then planted them in the ground for this year and netted them to protect them from the birds. When they were growing

in strange shapes, during a dry spell, I gave them lots of water and we had some lovely fruit until, one day, all the ripe fruit disappeared! I blame that on mice. I have dug up the plants and consigned them to the compost heap and won't bother growing strawberries again; life is too short! I grew raspberries last year and they are producing a good crop this summer. They're much easier to pick and also freeze well. I also have a standard gooseberry bush which doesn't take up much space. The bush has vicious thorns but short branches so the fruit is easy to reach.

After all the rain we have had, everything is growing like mad, including the weeds. At least they are easy to pull out when the soil is damp. There's always something to keep me occupied in the garden!

Local summer surprises

What heralds summer for you? Is it flaming June? Is it the meteorologists telling us that summer is here? Is it the well-kept gardens and hay fever? Sunstroke then thunderstorms? Are you looking forward to holidays? There seems to be a whole flurry of summer sport - Wimbledon, the Olympics, the Euros.

The farmers begin a very busy period, planting, spraying, watering and then harvesting. We see that the fields start to show signs of considerable growth. Each year we wonder what has been planted in the field next to us. It's often wheat or barley, sometimes rapeseed. One year was com on the cob.

This year it was a mystery for quite some while. Following considerable flooding, leaving huge puddles, there was little to show for weeks apart from some wispy stems around well-watered weeds. Was anything actually growing there? Very gradually the crop began to materialise. But what was it. Certainly not wheat! We waited some more until we noticed a subtle blue sheen over

the field.

After some investigations a delicate blue flower became apparent but only when the sun shone. When the sun went in the blue hue

disappeared and it returned to a green glow. The blue carpet though looks amazing. It is flax! So what is flax used for. Well linen is made from it as well as linseed oil. How long has flax been around? Is flax mentioned in the Bible? I was reminded that in Joshua the two spies were sent to spy out the land around Jericho – the land that they were later to report was flowing with milk and honey. A prostitute, Rahab hid the spies on the roof of her house under some drying flax.

Rahab was rewarded for her faith in this by being saved, along with all her family, when Jericho was captured. Later at the beginning of Matthew's gospel, Rahab is named in the genealogy of Jesus as the great, great grandmother of King David. Jesus is known as King David's greater son many generations later. Rahab's faith was therefore significant and the flax pivotal.

Linen was a symbol of purity in Biblical times, and it is recorded in the prophets that angelic beings appeared, wearing fine linen garments (Ezekiel Chapters 9 and 10; Daniel Chapters 10 and 12; and Revelation Chapter 15).

It still seems that flax was and remains very useful today.

We are holding our Sunday services in Church at 11 am. If you would like to join in the worship, music and song, you'll get a very warm welcome. 

- · Bedfordshire Archives and Records Service



Sometimes, a caption can be almost unnecessary but can bring a smile to the onlooker. This is a bench I came across on a walk in the Lake District with my own pithy comment:


At other times, you may want to give the viewer more detailed information about, say, prominent a building. This example is in Toddington and Listed **British** the **Buildings** site web provided detailed information. backed up by a local printed guide:



Coming closer to home, I'm sure we are all aware of the delightful door in Eaton Bray parish church:





Information may be found in guides but also online in websites such as British History Online, which is effectively a digital version of the Victoria County History. Here is a page from that website:



The Listed Buildings web site tells us that the ironwork is by Thomas Leighton and that he was responsible for the scroll ironwork above the tomb of Eleanor of Castile, d.1290, at Westminster Abbey.

Another local building is Poplar Farm, Eaton Bray and the first picture was taken from an estate agent's web site some time ago. The next web page can be found at the 'Bedfordshire Archives and Records Service' web site:





The site continues: Poplar Farmhouse is a prominent building in the High Street. It is a 19th century red brick building with a hipped slate roof and some timber detailing. There is a single storey range of pantries, sheds and outbuildings attached to the rear. The house is not listed. [Though the outbuildings are].

Study boards at nature sites often have a wealth of information, such as this one at Studham Common:

Without such boards, I certainly would not have known that the Common is one of the few breeding sites for the Hazel Dormouse – and how lovely to have it depicted in the heading at the top of this most interesting board. Finally, a word about detail, which is important. Here is part of a picture of a well-





known building in a nearby village down the 'A5'.

Again from the Chiltern Society PhotoGroup web site: "Saunder's Almshouses Flamstead. Grade II* listed. erected in 1669 for poor pious widows and widowers: built of narrow brick in Flemish bond with chamfered brick recessed doorways and window jambs." It would have been so easy to have just recorded this building as "A typical old building in the

High Street" or some such, but a little research brought out a bit more interest and maybe sparked the quest for more information.

LOCAL HERALDRY BY JOHN HOCKEY

In this series, we take a look around local towns and villages to find interesting and unusual heraldry.

JOHN OF DUNSTABLE

John Dunstable (or Dunstaple, as there are more manuscript references with a 'p' rather than a 'b') was a celebrated 15th century musician and composer who was buried in St. Stephen's, Walbrook, London. It is thought he was born around 1390 in Dunstable.

He appears to have been in the royal service of John of Lancaster, 1st Duke of Bedford and was also an astronomer and mathematician (indeed his epitaph records that he had 'secret knowledge of the stars') as well as being a prolific composer, though only about fifty of his compositions survive. He was keen on music for religious masses and was one of the first to compose such works using a single melody. He is widely known for his expertise in the transition between mediaeval and Renaissance music.

Heraldically, he was granted a coat of arms in the fifteenth century by the College of Arms. As was quite common, the design is simple and geometrically appropriate for a pointed shield, with a chevron dividing the shield so two charges (in this case staples, a pun on his name) are in the top half of the design and a single staple in the base. It is thought the chevron, which means rafter in French, may have been a bracing piece on the back of the shield.


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Love Your Boiler

Hello, my name is Wayne Bettess, Managing Director of YourNewBoiler. com. I have recently moved my family to the beautiful village of Eaton Bray and would like to introduce myself and my business to you all. We have settled quickly into village life, and our four children are loving it too.

We, as a society, have just come through the most challenging 18 months most of us have ever experienced and likely ever will; the last thing many will need right now is an unreliable or, worse still, an unsafe boiler in your home.

In this article, I'm going to share a few tricks of the trade that could stop you from being left in the cold this coming winter. To give you some context about me, I have been in the heating industry for nearly two decades. Most of which has been running my own local, family-owned and operated business installing new boilers across Herts, Beds & Bucks. We recently achieved Worcester-Bosch Partner status (very prestigious in the industry) & of course; we are Gas Safe Registered.

Homeowner Step 1-

The first & most crucial step to ensuring your boiler is working correctly and safely is to get your boiler serviced. Servicing a boiler has to be done by a gas safe registered engineer. Boilers must be serviced every year. The best time for this is in July / August / September time.

Most likely, your boiler has been running to provide you with hot water during the summer months, but the central heating side of the system has been off. Now this is where you can do some basic but essential checks to help ensure you're not left in the cold when winter hits.

Homeowner Step 2-



commonly known as bleeding radiators. You will need a radiator bleed key (send me a message on 07970 333999, and I will drop one off to you) and some kitchen roll. With the heating and hot water turned off, you simply go round all the radiators and, using the kitchen roll and radiator key, you slowly open the air release valve on the top left or right of each radiator. You then leave open until the hissing stops and water starts to eject from the area: that's what the kitchen roll is for

Homeowner Step 3-

Turn your central heating on once or twice a month for a 45 min period. A great way to do this is to set a reminder on your phone or write it into your calendar. Doing this will ensure that no component on the system is left idle for long periods and significantly reduces the risk of a component failure.

Homeowner Step 4-

Most people will have thermostatic radiator valves. A prevalent problem we have around autumn time is seized valves. To combat this, you simply turn them on and off a few times can stop this problem from escalating into a repair be required.

Homeowner Step 5 -

Check for sludge build-up in your system. Sludge gets produced in the radiators due to a chemical imbalance within the system, Time to get the air out of your system, and It is a major cause for breakdowns to boilers and system components. To check if you have a sludge build-up, go round your radiators when they are on (do this when carrying out Step 2 above). With your hand, feel the entire face of the radiators; if you notice a drop in temperature from the top (hot) to the bottom (noticeably colder), this is a warning sign that you have a sludge build-up.

Homeowner Step 6 -

Failing to prepare is preparing to fail. Every home will have what is widely known as stop cock. This is a water valve designed to turn the incoming mains water off to your home. So firstly, make sure you know where your stop cock is; more than likely, there will be one outside in the driveway area and one in the house itself. It can generally be found under the kitchen sink. Once you have located it, you need to turn it off and open the cold kitchen tap until the water stops. This

will prove that the stop cock is working correctly. If the water doesn't stop, or you can not turn the valve or worse still can not even find it, it will be time to call in a professional to assist you.

I would like to end this article by saying a massive thank you to everyone who has warmly welcomed us to the village. I look forward to getting to know you all over time, whether through my work or the social side of life. 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Eaton Bray History

Eaton Bray School 1904 County Survey courtesy of the Bedfordshire Archives

Bedfordshire County Council became Local Education Authority for the county in 1903, following the Education Act 1902. In 1904 the County Surveyor reported on the condition of all the council and voluntary schools in the county under LEA control, excluding those on Bedford and Luton Boroughs which had their own executive arrangements. The surveyor's report took the form below.

EATON BRAY COUNCIL SCHOOL

GENERAL WORKS £74 9s. 11d. SANITARY WORKS £105 HEATING & VENTILATION £43 12s. 0d. [TOTAL] £223 1s. 11d.

House

GENERAL WORKS £19 13s. 6d. SANITARY WORKS £10 NEW WORKS £60 0s. 9d. [TOTAL] £89 13s. 6. [TOTAL] £312 15s. 5d.

Eaton Bray School and House (Council)

This is a large block of brick built and slated buildings, fairly strong, but not apparently provided with proper damp courses.

Infants' Room. 56 feet 9 inches by 16 feet by 12 feet 6 inches to 16 feet

Lighting by six windows, all of which open. Ventilation by windows named above.

The bottom sashes should be blocked up three inches, and an Exhaust

Ventilator provided.

This room needs thoroughly renovating.

Class Room. 20 feet by 13 feet by 12 feet 6 inches to 16 feet.

Lighting by four windows and ceiling openings.

Ventilation by open sashes. Bottom sashes should be blocked up three inches, and an Exhaust Ventilator provided.

Heating by an open fire.

This room needs thoroughly renovating.

Lobby. 13 feet 6 inches by 12 feet 6 inches by 8 feet 8 inches to 12 feet.

The window should be made entirely to open, the walling repaired, and the Lobby renovated.

Lobby. 15 feet by 8 feet by 9 feet.

This needs similar treatment to above.

General School – 37 feet by 19 feet by 13 feet 6 inches to 16 feet 6 inches.

Lighting by seven windows.

Ventilation, as before. These windows should be altered also to admit air past meeting rails of sashes, by blocking up bottom sash 3 feet. An Exhaust Ventilator is necessary.

Heating by Stove. This needs repairing and making sound.

A 28 foot Cooking Stove is provided for lessons in cooking.

All in this room needs renewing.

The walls are damp and the floor rotting. The ground should be taken out, and the cause of the damp ascertained, and further damage prevented.

Room N. E. of Main Room. 29 feet by 19 feet by 12 feet 6 inches to 16 feet 6 inches.

Lighting by seven windows, as before.

Ventilation by window sashes; these should be treated as before named. An Exhaust Ventilator to roof should also be provided.

Heating by a Shorland's grate and hot air flues.

This room needs entirely renewing.

Class Room. 15 feet by 15 feet by 12 feet 6 inches to 16 feet 6 inches.

Lighting by four windows, as before.

Ventilation by sashes. These should be treated as before suggested, and an

Exhaust Ventilator provided.

Heating by an open fireplace.

This room needs thoroughly restoring.

General. The sashes in some parts are

looking very much like decay; new ones should therefore be provided, where necessary, before painting.

All the Stoves need thorough repair; the inside cones are burnt through.

Porch. 13 feet by 4 feet by 9 feet 6 inches. Lighting by windows is fair; these are made to open.

Lobby. 15 feet by 8 feet by 9 feet 6 inches; windows as above.

Both these need renewal and repairs.

School Offices

Boys' – These are close up to the School windows; the range starts with a Lavatory, next a Urinal, and then three pail Closets.

Girls' – In next yard, very near to the Infants' windows, is a block of six pail closets.

These receptacles, without a proper deodorant and cleansing, smell as offensively as pits, and as they are exposed to the full Sun in Summer, are dangerous to health.

They should be converted into proper earth Closets, with the needful dry earth shed, etc. **A Coal Barn** is provided at rear, next to girls' open shed.

N. B. A large moat and pond, full of water, lies alongside [one] of the two Main Rooms, East of the block, which keep the buildings very damp. Permission should be obtained to put a clay puddle wall, 3 feet wide and 12 inches down into the solid clay, the whole length of the building, and as much beyond as may be affected, and for the laying of a 6 inch subsoil drain to the outfall which passes under the main road, to the village water course.

Playground

This needs a spring water drain at S. E. corner, and the general surface readjusting.

Master's House

This is a small House, containing: Hall and Stairway 9 feet 3 inches by 5 feet 6 inches.

Two Living Rooms each 12 feet by 12 feet. Kitchen only 8 feet 4 inches by 8 feet 3 inches. The latter has no chimney flue. The smoke pipe from the stove used here goes through floor above into the Bedroom flue. This is very questionable, and most unwholesome.

There are three bedrooms over first named.

A detached Scullery is on the other side of small yard; this, and the lobby space, might be occupied for a good kitchen, by extending the front into yard to allow a room 10 feet wide and 14 feet 9 inches long for a Kitchen, which could be coupled up to the house by a passage, about six feet long, covered by a flat under school window, with a doorway therefrom to yard.

Such a provision is really necessary for the comfort of the occupants of the house.

The large dust bin in the Master's yard, under the School window, should be cleared away, the yard floor made over the space and a sanitary dust bin provided, but set clear of the windows.

The closet, being close to school windows, should be converted into an Earth Closet.

Coal Barn for House

This is at the end of the scullery.

Water Supply

The drinking water, for the whole of the premises, is obtained from the House pump. Soft water from the Lavatory pump.

House and Offices – Internal repairs. Cleansing, whitening, painting and papering, generally are necessary, with a few exceptions regarding paper.

External Repairs and Painting

External repairs are needed throughout the whole of the buildings, viz: to chimneys, roofs, walls, fences, doors, windows, steps, sills, eaves troughs, down pipes and painting of all as previously done.

Drains

These should be put into good order.

N. B. The Lavatory sinks should be disconnected from direct contact with drain, by discharge on to a trapped surface gulley.



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
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
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A Raptor-ous Day Out

Incubated Flamingo Eggs Hatch at ZSL Whipsnade Zoo

Zookeepers at ZSL Whipsnade Zoo are celebrating the arrival of four, fluffy, flamingo chicks, after the eggs spent a month in an incubator to ensure their survival. The American flamingo eggs (Phoenicopterus ruber) spent 28 days in an incubator before being returned to their giant nests, where they have now hatched and met their parents.

Keepers found that some less experienced parents in the

"flamboyance", (a group of flamingos), weren't staying on their eggs for the required 28-32 days. In order to give the chicks the best chance of survival and the adult pairs some practice caring for eggs, the keepers carefully swapped their real eggs for "practice eggs", placing the real ones in an incubator, until it was almost time for them to hatch. Zookeepers made sure to return each egg to its parents at the nest-site, in time for them to bond with their newly-hatched chicks.

Gary Ward, Curator of Birds at ZSL said: "Flamingos are brilliant parents, working together, usually as a monogamous pair, to care for their eggs and chicks. However, sometimes younger birds haven't got it all figured out yet, and so we stepped in to give a helping hand. Now the chicks are growing and developing in their nests, watched over constantly by alternating parents. Both flamingo parents feed their fluffy, grey chicks with bright red crop milk, which is made in the linings of their digestive tract, and contains fat, protein and blood cells. You can usually spot the new parents in a group, because they give so much of their own pigment to their chicks that they almost turn white!"

Flamingos have one of the longest lifespans of any bird in the world, with an average life expectancy of 40 years and with some flamingos having lived up to 70.



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What to do in the Garden in August

The last official month of summer is the perfect time to enjoy your garden while it's still at its best. Children are on school holiday, lawns are in full use, and there's plenty of delicious fruit and veg to fill your dinner plate.

Timely Tips

August isn't the time to take your eye off the ball in the garden. Here are some of the main jobs:

- 1. Top up ponds and bird baths regularly.
- 2. Water fruit and veg plants daily.
- 3. Prune all summer flowering shrubs once the blooms are finished.
- 4. Keep on top of weeds as they compete with your crops for nutrients and water.

In the flower garden



- Water evergreen shrubs like camellias and rhododendrons thoroughly this month to make sure that next year's buds develop
 well.
- Keep patio container plants well watered and feed with a liquid fertiliser every fortnight.
- Stake tall or top-heavy dahlias and lilies to prevent wind and rain damage. Dead-head lilies for a better flower display next year.
- Dead-head annual bedding plants and perennials to encourage them to flower into the autumn and stop them self-seeding.
- Cut back faded perennials to keep borders tidy.
- As penstemon flowers fade, cut them back to just above a leaf to encourage more flowers.
- Cut back herbs now to encourage a new flush of tasty leaves you can harvest before the frost.
- Prune wisteria after flowering by removing

- all the whippy side-shoots from the main branch framework to about 20cm from their base (about five leaves from the main stem).
- Trim any lavender plants after they've finished flowering to keep them compact.
- Collect ripened seeds and store them for next year. Leaving some seed heads in place can be attractive and allows the plant to self-seed in the surrounding soil.
- Mow meadows now to help scatter established wildflower seeds.
- Take cuttings of your favourite tender perennials such as pelargoniums and fuchsia to propagate them for next year.
- Finish dividing clumps of bearded Iris now so they have time to form roots and flower buds for next year before the cold weather arrives.
- Prune climbing roses and rambling roses once they've finished flowering (unless they're repeat-flowerers in which case leave them).
- Spray ground elder (and other perennial weeds) with a glyphosate-based weedkiller, the plants now have plenty of leaf surface area with which to absorb it.
- Look out for symptoms of 'clematis wilt' including black discolouration on the leaves and stems of your clematis. Cut out any infected plant material and dispose of it in your household waste.

In the vegetable garden



The vegetable garden comes into its own in August, with plenty of delicious home grown produce to harvest. Here are some tasks to keep you busy this month:

Water sweetcorn plants regularly and feed

- with tomato food to get the best cobs.
- Apply a high-potash fertiliser such as tomato food once fruits start to form on peppers, cucumber and aubergine plants.
- Continue to feed tomato plants with tomatofood and remove lower leaves to help with air circulation and prevent disease. Pinch out the top of tomato plants to concentrate the growth into the fruit that has already formed. Aim to leave 5 or 6 trusses of fruit per plant.
- Cut back herbs to encourage a new flush of tasty leaves that you can harvest before the first frosts. Dry or freeze excess herbs to use in the kitchen later on.
- Thin parsley to help it establish a good root system before winter. Leave 25cm between each plant.
- Pinch out the tips of your runner bean plants once they reach the top of their support. This encourages side-shooting and more beans at a manageable height for picking.
- Pinch out the growing tips of your aubergine plants once they have 5 or 6 fruits. Pick fruits while they're young and shiny.
- Limit the fruits on a squash plant to about three, but make sure these fruits are well established before pinching out the surplus.
- Spring-sown carrots and beetroot will be ready to harvest now although they can be left in the ground to keep growing.
- Continue to harvest second early potatoes now - perfect for salads!
- Start harvesting your main crop potatoes as the leaves yellow and die back. Store your potatoes in hessian sacks which exclude light but allow ventilation.
- Sweetcorn is ready to harvest when you can pop a corn with your thumbnail and the juices are milky.
- Lift and dry onions, shallots and garlic once the foliage has flopped over and yellowed.
 Store them in onion bags to prevent mould

- developing.
- Harvest French and runner beans little and often to prevent them from setting seed.
 Pick runner beans regularly to prevent them becoming stringy and to make room for developing pods. Leaving mature pods to set seed can prevent further flowers developing and reduce your crop.
- Keep harvesting courgettes before they become too big!
- Take cuttings of herbs such as rosemary, sage or mint now to bulk up supplies. Put cuttings in moist, well-drained potting compost (one part grit to one part compost) and place in a cold frame. Established clumps of chives can be divided now.
- On a sunny day, collect seeds of herbs such as dill, bronze fennel, caraway and chervil and dry in a warm spot out of direct sunlight. Chervil must be sown immediately.
- Keep an eye out for potato and tomato blight and remove and destroy any affected plants immediately to prevent its spread.
- Check for cabbage white butterfly eggs under brassica and leafy green leaves and squash any that you find. Alternatively use nematodes to kill the caterpillars.
- Clear away any diseased and spent foliage around your veg plants to discourage pests and diseases spreading.

In the fruit garden



Here are the main jobs to do in your fruit garden this month:

- If you have plants fruiting in containers, make sure you give them a high potash liquid feed to keep them healthy and productive.
- Remember to feed your lemon tree (and other citrus fruit trees) throughout summer

- with a special citrus fertiliser.
- Plant out any rooted runners of strawberries for a good crop next year.
- Keep birds and squirrels off your berries with netting or old net curtains.
- Protect your crops with a bird scarer made from CDs tied to strings.
- Harvest your fruit trees cherries, plums, peaches, nectarines and apricots should all be ripe now! Early varieties of apple trees will be ready towards the end of the month.
- If you have a glut of autumn raspberries, blackberries or loganberries, freeze them on trays for a couple of hours and then bag them up to use over winter.
- Tidy up strawberry plants and remove any old straw from around the plants to improve ventilation and reduce the risk of pests and diseases.
- Prune the fruited stems of your blackcurrant bushes after harvesting.
- Cut back the fruited canes of your summer raspberries, leaving the new green canes for next year's crop. Tie in next year's raspberry canes to support wires or fencing.

In the greenhouse

Here are the main jobs to do in your greenhouse this month:

- Check plants daily and water them if the soil is dry.
- Damp down your greenhouse on hot days to increase humidity and deter red spider mites.
- Open vents and doors on warm days.
- Use blinds or apply shade paint to prevent the greenhouse from overheating in sunny weather.
- Try hanging sticky traps to catch flying pests and help determine which pest control is needed.
- Tidy up fallen leaves and flowers to discourage disease.

Looking after your lawn

Here's how to look after your grass this month:

Don't worry if your lawn is looking brown,

- the autumn rains will soon make it green again.
- Don't feed your lawn with a high-nitrogen fertiliser now as this will encourage lots of lush new growth which is easily damaged by autumn weather.
- Lawn growth slows down in late summer so raise the cutting height of your lawn mower to help the grass cope.
- If you're planning on laying a new lawn this autumn, prepare the area now to give it time to settle.
- Recut any lawn edges. Install lawn edging to make future maintenance easier.
- If your lawn is infested by ants, brush out the nests on a dry day. Always brush them away before mowing.

Other jobs about the garden



Here are some other jobs to keep on top of during August:

- Use a hedge trimmer to give your hedges a final trim before they stop growing.
- Water plants thoroughly when needed, instead of small amounts every day. Thorough watering supports plants for up to 14 days, while merely wetting the surface wastes water, encourages weeds and can lead to surface rooting making the plants more vulnerable.
- Use water butts as much as you can to water your plants. Recycle your water inside the house - collect washing up water in a bucket outside for watering beds and lawns.
- Turn the compost in your compost bins every month to keep it well aerated and to speed up decomposition.
- Scoop floating weed and algae from ponds.
- Remove rampant pond plants like bulrushes or irises before they go to seed

and make the problem worse.

- Now is a good time of year to treat lawn chafers and leatherjackets with nematodes.
- Keep an eye out for white powdery mildew on plants. If possible, remove the affected parts and spray with a fungicide to prevent further spread.
- Look for aphids on the underside of leaves

 rub them off by hand or spray with an insecticide to prevent them multiplying.

 Alternatively try using a natural pest control such as Lacewing larvae.
- Keep an eye out for scarlet lily beetles on your lilies - remove and crush any you see.
 Also check for the sticky brown larvae on the underside of leaves.
- If your plants are wilting, check for vine weevils by tipping your plants out of their pots and looking for 'C' shaped creamy maggots amongst the roots. Treat with nematodes if vine weevils are spotted.
- Prevent slugs attacking your young plants by using slug control.
- Use boiling water as a weed killer on your paved areas. Weeds wilt and die within a

few days.

From your armchair

August is a great time to enjoy your garden, but also a good moment to cast a critical eye over your domain and decide what you'd like to change for next year. Here are some tips:


- Make rough sketches of your flower borders and vegetable plot to help plan for next year.
- Take lots of photos of your garden if you want to rearrange things over the winter

 it's much easier to do this if you have a reference point.
- Think about which bulbs you would like to see blooming next spring - now's the time to order ready for autumn planting. Think colourful drifts of narcissus and tulips in borders, beds, and containers.
- Order your perennial plants online now ready for autumn delivery.

Elevation: 450 ft - Latitude: 51° 50' 13" North - Longitude: 0° 33' 34" West




June started warm and dry and remained the same until the 17th when we had a few showers. On the 18th, it rained continuously for 24 hours, totalling 50mm (2ins) which is just under the 13-year average for June – all in the one day! It felt more like November as the wind and rain was coming from the NNE. It remained on the cool side for the rest of the month with temperatures dropping to 4.3°c on the 23rd. There was more of a contrast in June than normal between day and night temperatures. For example, it was 4.3°c early in the morning on the 23rd, but up to 22.1°c by 5.30pm.

The dominant NNE wind gave that cool feeling during the month when we would normally expect a south wind to bring Flaming June. The month's rain was 77.4 mm - 138% of the average rainfall. When the temperature reached 27.6°c at the beginning of the month, it looked like summer had come, but as it's England, we knew it wouldn't last.
