On Sunday 6th February at 10am at St Mary's Eaton Bray, we will be marking Accession Day. This is not something we usually do, but this year is the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty the Queen. King George VI died on 6th February 1952 at Sandringham whilst Princess Elizabeth and her husband Philip were staying in Kenya. They returned home the following day and Elizabeth was proclaimed Queen aged 25. Her succession was proclaimed at an Accession



Council at St James' Palace attended by 175 Privy Council members in addition to the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London. One of the Queen's many roles is as Supreme Governor of the Church of England. As such, every Church of England clergyperson has to swear allegiance to the sovereign. The Queen is responsible for appointing bishops, archdeacons and deans of cathedrals.

To celebrate the Platinum Jubilee, there will be a number of events across the four nations of the United Kingdom. The Commonwealth Games will take place in Birmingham and there will be two additional bank holidays on 2nd and 3rd June for community celebrations. Another initiative for the Platinum Jubilee is the Queen's Green Canopy when people are encouraged to 'plant a tree for the jubilee.' The aim is to create a legacy in honour of the Queen's leadership of the Nation which will benefit future generations. We are all aware of the need to support the environment and this is one way of helping to do that. Throughout Bedfordshire the aim is to plant trees in every parish. That can be done by individuals as well as community groups. At St Mary's we will be planting a new hedge of native species on the boundary between the church yard and the village hall. We hope to involve people from the community in this initiative, so if you would be interested in helping please get in touch for more details. admin@stmaryseatonbray.org.uk

In addition to planting trees, the Queen's Green Canopy project will dedicate a network of 70 ancient woodland areas across the United Kingdom and Northern Ireland and also identify 70 ancient trees to celebrate Her Majesty's 70 years of service.

As we mark this important year in the life of our nation, we give thanks to God for the dedication, service and integrity of Her Majesty the Queen. Her life is underpinned by a deep faith which is evident in all that she does. Here is a prayer for the Queen.

God of time and eternity, whose Son reigns as servant, not master; we give you thanks and praise that you have blessed this Nation, the Realms and Territories with Elizabeth our beloved and glorious Queen.

In this year of Jubilee, grant her your gifts of love and joy and peace as she continues in faithful obedience to you, her Lord and God and in devoted service to her lands and peoples, and those of the Commonwealth, now and all the days of her life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



EPC Precept Increase for 2022/23

At the January Council meeting Councillors agreed the draft budget for 2022/23

Over the past few years the Council has allocated money to the Special Projects fund for various projects; predominantly the New Pavilion on Edlesborough Green. Now that this is complete the special Project Funds have been earmarked for other projects in the Parish. With this in mind the Council agreed to submit a precept request of £154,740 to Buckinghamshire Council. This means the Parish Council's element of Band D rate will increase from £9 per month to £9.45.

Salt Bins

Speedwatch & EDaN Traffic Management Traffic Calming

Buckinghamshire Council (BC) have for a long time refused to consider implementing 20mph speed limits. Buckinghamshire Cllr Peter Cooper has recently campaigned and with support from many Parish Councils successfully managed to change Buckinghamshire Council's policy on the introduction of 20mph zones.

At BC's meeting on 24th November 21 the



council agreed that Town and Parish Councils' sponsored 20mph schemes could now gain support from Buckinghamshire

Council. This gives councils the opportunity to improve the social environment of residential areas with lower speeds, safer pedestrian areas, lower pollution levels and enhanced possibilities for walking, cycling and enjoying your streets.

There will be criteria that must be followed for a scheme to be considered. These are likely to include:

- The scheme location should be in a residential area where the existing traffic constraints such as road width and layout, existing bollards, islands, parking or traffic volumes already restrict existing average traffic speeds to 24mph or less. It is hoped that in these circumstances sign only 20mph limits or zones can be installed at reasonable cost. Non-compliant schemes may need to include physical traffic calming, speed humps, pinch points etc. to help achieve the 24mph target.
- The scheme should be financed locally. Parish and Town Councils will be able to raise finance using a combination of their own reserves, \$106 agreements from local development or by making an application for Community Board transport funds.
- It is clear that Thames Valley Police are currently unwilling to enforce speed limits, particularly 20mph speed limits.

EPC is now waiting for confirmation of the application process so that it can consider if

and where to apply for 20mph zones.

Prior to the meeting Cllr Harpley proposed that EPC applies for a 20pmh zone on South End Lane, Northall near the children's play area and village hall once the application process has been confirmed and opened to Parish Councils.

What's the Point of Wasps?

You're having a few drinks in the garden with your friends, or a family BBQ, when a load of pesky wasps arrive to spoil the party. You haven't seen them all summer and then suddenly

they're all over the place, annoying everybody, causing panic and helicopter hands. Sound familiar?

August is the time of year when people start to ask 'what's the point of wasps?' The answer may surprise you.

Did you know that there are approximately 9,000 species of wasp here in the UK? These include the parasitic wasps, some of which are so diminutive they are like pin heads. Of the 250 larger wasps which have have a stinger, the majority are solitary and cause no upset to humans.

However, when we talk about wasps, we're almost certainly referring to the our nation's nemesis, the Common wasp (Vespula vulgaris). To understand why these wasps become really annoying this time of year, you first need to understand their life cycle. Common wasps live socially like bees and are pollinators like bees but, unlike honey bees, they haven't evolved a way of storing food to allow the colony to survive the winter. In fact the only survivors are the young, fertilised queens who hibernate over winter. They emerge in the spring to build little walnut sized nests where they they lay around 20 eggs.

The queen feeds the resulting larvae until around May, when they mature and become workers. Then she focuses on more egg-laying and the workers get on with feeding them, enlarging the nest as they go along. By this time of year the nest has grown to around 40cm in diameter, often larger, and that nest can contains up to 10,000 wasps! Then, in late August and September, a dramatic change takes place. The queen quits her egg laying (save a few that will go on to be future queens and males to fertilise them) and no longer releases the pheromone that causes the workers to work.

Basically these workers are made redundant and are left jobless and disorientated. And the problem for us is that, although adult wasps are insect predators, that meat is to feed the larvae not themselves. In their adult state wasps are not able to digest solid food and need sugary liquid to survive. Now, with fewer no larvae to feed, they become uncontrollably and insatiably hungry.

Wasps love easy food such as over ripe fruit and your fizzy drinks. Towards the end of their brief lives, their hunger drives them to search for easy sugar at exactly the time when we are more likely to be using our gardens and outdoor spaces for eating sweet things. The timing couldn't be better for them or worse for us.

So why are those who panic and try to swat them away more likely to be stung than those who remain calm?


Well the problem is that these redundant workers have their own pheromone, which helps protect the nest from attack earlier in the year, and that's essentially a chemical rallying cry to other workers that the nest is under attack.

So when you swat that annoying wasp and it feels under attack, that rallying cry will go out. Suddenly it all kicks off, and loads more wasps will start arriving in aggressive 'red-mist' mode, fired up and ready to defend their nest. This is why the best advice is

to stay calm.

Think of it this way, from May that wasp has been working its socks off helping to keep things nice on planet earth. Now it's going to die. So why not give it a break, save your swats, put a bowl of sugary drink somewhere out of your way, and let it go out on a nice sugar rush. At the very least don't kill it.

What's the point of wasps? Without them it's unlikely human life would survive because, in the absence of their role as insect predators, our planet would be overrun by catastrophic numbers of much more damaging insects such as aphids, ants and caterpillars that would utterly decimate the crops that we depend upon.

In the motion of Mrs Carter, seconded by Mrs Getliffe. It was decided that an Institute be started in Eaton Bray.

The following officers were elected

Secretary Miss Thorne, Treasurer Mrs Gray

Monday 14th November 1921

The Second Open Meeting of the Eaton Bray Womens Institute was held in the National Schools at 6.30 p..m.

The Chair was taken by the Vice President – Mrs Carter.

Mrs Benning, President of the Dunstable Institute, addressed the meeting and explained the wide scope of Institute work and its numerous educational and social activities

Light refreshments were served, followed by a sketch entitle "One Betty" in which the following took part

Mrs Gray, Mrs Getcliffe, Miss Maddock, Miss Shardlow, Miss Turner and Miss Wallace.

It was voted by a large majority that the first Monday in each month be the day fixed for future monthly meetings at 6.30 p.m. The enrolment of 58 members brought to a close a pleasant and very enthusiastic meeting. Signed B. Thorne and A. Wallace

EATON BRAY - IN FABRICS

By Mary Mayne THE EATON BRAY VILLAGE QUILT – 1985 – 1986

This all started when the **Ouilters** Guild of The British Isles asked its members to make quilts, have them displayed in the guilds various areas around country, then a the few were selected to go into an exhibition to be held at the Royal British Institute of Architects. This was in 1984 -85

I had already started to take photographs around the village of buildings I might want to put into a village quilt so decided this would be my effort for the Guilds request.

The photographs were enlarged to the sizes I needed and from these I made tracings and patterns. I worked one panel at a time, making sure that each piece in the design was as accurate as possible,



not always easy if the piece is very small!

I gradually worked my way through the variety of pictures, chose the border fabric of carnation style flowers to represent the Wallace Carnations (always worn by Royalty), plus burgundy fabric for the sashings around each picture. Once the panels and borders were sewn in place I then hand quilted the leaf design in the sashing areas and bound the quilt edges. This doesn't sound much, but there were times when I thought it would never be finished!

The quilt was hung with quite a few quilts from other Guild members in the Guilds Region 7 – Bedfordshire, Buckinghamshire, Northamptonshire and Hertfordshire. A small team from the Guild Committee then selected quilts from this exhibition to go

to London, Eaton Bray Village Quilt was one of a very few selected. Needless to say, I was thrilled! It hung in the RSBA for 2 months and was very much admired.

Al the blocks are machine appliqued and the quilt is hand quilted. You may be surprised at how much has changed since this quilt was made, some of you won't recall many of the things in the quilt, the old

school, the out buildings at Thornes Farm, the Post office as it was in 1980s.

I am so pleased that this quilt was made and displayed in such a prestigious building, it also won an award at The National Patchwork Championships in 1986 and was featured in the television programme Pieced Pictures, again in the 1980s.

This quilt needs to stay in the village and if anyone feels they can give it a home and assure me it will stay, then do get in touch.

One, Zoo, Three...

Zookeepers complete the annual stocktake at Whipsnade Zoo

Whipsnade Zoo's keepers have begun the mammoth task of counting every animal for their annual stocktake.

Home to more than 9,500 animals, zookeepers at the UK's largest Zoo gathered their clipboards and calculators, to take stock of each invertebrate, bird, fish, mammal, reptile and amphibian.

Keepers have to count every single animal in the Zoo; from three, boisterous, Amur tiger brothers, to hundreds of fragile butterflies. The Zoo's group (also



known as a 'conspiracy') of ring-tailed lemurs were curious about the activity, while its 'waddle' of penguins happily got in line to be counted in exchange for their favourite fishy treats.

2021 saw the conservation Zoo celebrate the birth of rhinoceros calf Nandi, who was counted alongside her "crash" of Southern white rhinos. Several, recently-hatched, baby chameleons, had to be added to the Zoo's official records, as well as hundreds of Critically Endangered and Extinct-in-the-Wild freshwater fish, bred at the Zoo's Aquarium and freshwater conservation breeding centre.

ZSL Whipsnade Zoo's animal manager, Matthew Webb said: "January marked the start of the annual stocktake, where we make sure every animal is recorded as part of our official zoo license requirements. "We'll also share the information with other zoos around the world, as the numbers are used to plan the conservation breeding programmes for endangered species.

"Some species are easy to count, but others can be tricky: our Aquarium keepers sometimes take still images of the tanks so they don't count the same fish twice, while our almost 200 deer have to be counted with a lot of stealth and a lot of patience!"



The information is shared with other zoos around the world via a database called ZIMS (Zoological Information Management System), where it's used to help manage the worldwide conservation breeding programmes for endangered animals.

Derrick Bonfield 1924 – 2021:

Was he the oldest man/oldest person in Northall?

I wrote in the November 2018 about Derrick who was a long term resident of Northall, along with his wife Dill who died in 2004. Dill had attended Northall Baptist Church for many years and during this time continued to encourage Derrick who was always helpful in giving her a lift to Church and their three children to Sunday School. Although it took some time for him to fully commit himself, Dill was delighted to see the rewards of her gentle encouragement when Derrick started actually attending with her and was later baptised on 8th October 2000 at age 75. Dill was assured that they would meet again in their Heavenly home.

From then, Derrick has faithfully attended the services at Northall Baptist Church and was really keen to return to our in-Church services as soon as possible after Lockdown. However, Derrick had mastered joining our Zoom services on the telephone in the intervening 18

months, managing to unmute himself to read the scripture occasionally. The chat before and after the Zoom services helped us all to remain united as a church family. Derrick had a beautiful reading and singing voice which rang out with all the familiar hymns. We will really miss him. Derrick was taken to be with the Lord on 22nd December after a couple of weeks in the L&D. He was aged 97 and was last in Church a couple of days after his 97th birthday.

I will fear no evil, for you are with me.

Down the Lane

It's a year since I wrote my first article for Focus. I think that gardening has kept me sane: there's always something to look forward to in the garden. As I write this in January, so many bulbs are already growing, and the clumps expanding, many surprising me because I didn't remember planting some of them or what they are! In the last few years bulbs like snowdrops and hyacinths have definitely started growing earlier – I

don't remember them appearing before the New Year 20 years ago. I have a small clump of primroses which started flowering in November. Are they confusing the days shortening with the days lengthening because our autumns are milder?

One of my jobs at present, is cutting off all the old leaves of the hellebores (commonly known as Christmas roses or Lenten roses) so that the flowers can be seen as they open and new leaves get some light. These days hellebores come in a wide range of colours and forms. They like shade and tolerate dry conditions as well as being evergreen. The one in the photo has more upright flowers than some varieties. If you grow two or more of different colours and they cross fertilise the seedlings can produce different shades – design your own!





This photo shows a rampant ornamental vine, which has grown over a weeping pear tree. Its autumn colours lasted for several weeks. I shall have to cut the vine out of the tree because it will get too heavy but it will grow back again during the summer. Really it is too vigorous for the wooden pergola it grows over but this year I will keep it under control while still allowing it over the tree.

When I can't get outside, I enjoy looking through seed catalogues and thinking about what to grow next. I love the

Chilterns catalogue as it is full of witty cartoons and amusing descriptions of plants as well as words of caution. I have learnt to plant only as many seeds of a variety as I can use for the flower beds or as many vegetables as we can sensibly eat and enjoy. I'm getting better at succession sowing for lettuce and radishes. I planted garlic and echalion shallots in November and they are growing well. I like echalion shallots as they have a lovely flavour, and are easy to peel as they are large.

Everything seems to have continued growing since the autumn, grass that needs cutting, new growth on shrubs, herbaceous plants that have kept going; not to mention the weeds!

In this series, we take a look around local towns and villages to find interesting and unusual heraldry.

TOTTERNHOE MEMORIAL TO THE BROWNLOWS

I am grateful to a fellow heraldry enthusiast for alerting me to a memorial I had not noticed before – that given in memory of earl Brownlow which is to be found tucked away in St Giles Church Hall, Totternhoe.

The tablet has the coat of arms of Cust quartered with Egerton, two families strongly connected with Ashridge House. There is an earl's coronet above and the motto Esse Quam Videri ('to be rather than to seem to be') at the top of the monument and an inscription below which reads 'Erected in memory of John William earl Brownlow by his mother 1867'.

John William was the 2nd earl Brownlow, the youngest son of Lady Marion Alford who looked after both Ashridge and Belton House until her sons were of the age to take over the reins of the huge estates. Unfortunately John William was a sickly child and died aged just twenty-five in 1867, the date on the tablet.

Marion Alford was a remarkable lady who achieved much in her life including designing buildings including her London residence in South Kensington and helping set up the Royal School of Needlework.



Russ Sainty (1936-2021) "King of the Cali"

Sixty years have flown by for some of us since those distant memories. Carnaby Street, Mary Quant, the Mini Skirt, Mods and Rockers, the Moon Landing, Twiggy, Woodstock, England's World Cup, Hippies, the First Heart Transplant, Mods and Rockers, the Mini Cooper and so much more. Musically, the revolutionary Swinging Sixties brought the country noisily out of its sombre post-war mood and ushered in the era of pop music. And Russ Sainty was one of rock 'n

roll's founding fathers, officially commemorated as such in 2006 at the unveiling of a plaque on the site of the 2i's coffee bar in London which also launched careers such as Cliff Richard's, Wee Willie Harris's, Vince Eager's and so many others from 1956 to 1970.

But by 1960 Russ had moved on to the location for which he will always be remembered - Dunstable's iconic California Ballroom. The founder Edwin Green's granddaughter Diane Ilka's meticulous history, The 'Cali' Album, still the Book Castle's most cherished publication, contains hundreds of photographs of virtually every musical act of the time because they all performed there. The Rolling Stones, the Bee Gees, the Hollies, the Dave Clark Five, the Who, the Kinks, the Animals, the Walker Brothers, the Searchers, Lulu, Kathy Kirby, Brenda Lee, Sandie Shaw, Dusty Springfield, Tom Jones, Craig Douglas, Marty Wilde, Billy Fury, Gerry and the Pacemakers, the list goes on and on. Many a local person met their 'squeeze' of the day in that heady atmosphere, and hundreds of them subsequently married. And all those famous performers shared the bill with the Cali's resident singer, Russ Sainty, and his supporting group, the Nu-Notes (whose Rhet Stoller composed, wrote and performed the Match of the Day theme!). Incredibly popular, Russ starred there no less than 338 times...why, oh why, did he never have a giant number one hit record, despite releasing dozens for EMI, plus 'cover' albums, and appearing on all the popular TV (Six Five Special etc) and radio programmes. He subsequently starred in musicals, cabaret, even pantomime, enjoying a solo music career ever after, right up to his death on November 29th 2021.

The excitement is all covered in another lavishly illustrated Book Castle title, King of the Cali, recounting his roller-coaster life. Born in the East End of London, he was evacuated in wartime with his parents to Woughton on the Green, to a cottage later taken over by Bletchley Park decoders. Little knowing that his fame and fortune would be made just ten miles or so down the road in Dunstable. A lovely, happy, fulfilled and generous man, he was proud to return there in 2008 to launch the autobiography with an evening performing dozens of his favourite numbers at the United Services Club for those of us privileged to hear once again the voice of a consummate professional. Many pop stars were one hit wonders. Russ was the opposite. Send me the Pillow that you Dream on was the nearest he got to that pinnacle, but he was admired for decades by all his fellow artists and gave so much pleasure to so many for so long. Dunstable can be proud to have embraced and enjoyed him as an adopted 'son' in his heyday.

Doolittle Mill, Eaton Bray (courtesy of the Bedfordshire Archives)

Doolittle Mill was in the civil parish of Totternhoe until 1985 when it was transferred to Eaton Bray. Four mills were recorded in Totternhoe in 1086 and it seems reasonable to assume that one of them may have stood at or near the later Doolittle Mill. In September 1980 the

former Department of Environment listed Doolittle Mill as Grade II, in the highest group of buildings of special interest. The house dates from the 18th century and is built of red brick and has two storeys with an old clay tiled roof. The Bedfordshire Historic Environment Record contains information on the county's historic buildings and landscapes and summaries of each entry can now be found online as part of the Heritage Gateway website. Entry 1457 notes that a gallows stood next to Doolittle Mill as described in the inclosure award.

In 1931 J. Steele Elliott, in Volume XIV published by Bedfordshire Historical Record Society, wrote the following: "1826 'Dolittle Windmill' is first mapped at its present site in this year. In 1841 'Windmill Field' was one of the big Open Fields that lay between Church End, Doolittle Mill and 'Well Head'. Remotely situated in the valley of this Chiltern country stands one of the most remarkable mills in England, a combination building for both water and wind power, yet each working independently of the other, and latterly with steam power in addition. The water-mill is worked by an overshot wheel within the mill building, and occupies

the two lower stories at two different levels; the windmill works the machinery in the upper two floors. There is a communicating way between one of the windmill floors and the attic floor of the house. It is upwards of 50 years since the wind power was last used; a westerly

gale terminated its days by blowing off the complete mill head, with sails, far into the mill pond below. The sails were two of double and two of single shutter form. The windmill ran originally two pairs of four foot stones. The tower at the present time is shorn of its cap and several courses of brickwork; but has an elevation of 46 feet. Not only is this mill of unique interest in itself, apart from its being, too, a delightful picture of this countryside, but it carries a history that is indeed remarkable. In 1539 Richard Buckmaster of Eaton Bray appears in a Deposition of a Chancery Suit. Richard Buckmaster held a mill at Totternhoe in 1610, and it continued in the family from that time. Thomas was Constable on the Jury List at Totternhoe in 1780 and recorded as a miller there in 1791. Christopher Buckmaster was a miller there with freehold in 1820 and at least until 1830. The descendants of this family, represented by three grand-daughters of John Buckmaster, who was a son of a Christopher Buckmaster, remain the owners at the present day. An Alfred Buckmaster owned Beaudesert windmill at Leighton [Buzzard]; and Miss. S. Buckmaster, the present owner of Stanbridge Mill, is also a

relative".

Two wills survive of people, other than Buckmasters, who both devised the mill. In 1708 Richard Gadbury the elder of Totternhoe, yeoman's will read as follows: "I doe give will devise and bequeath unto Richard Gadbury my sonne his heires and assignes for ever All that my Windmill with all the running Geares furniture and implements whatsoever thereunto belonging and also all that my peece or parcel of ground upon part whereof the said Windmill now standeth containing three poles and eleaven foote of Square measure ground situate and being within the Parish of Totternhoe aforesaid and lyeing next Warehill Balke on the west part. Item I doe give Will devise and bequeath unto the said Richard Gadbury my sonn his Executors Administrators and Assigns All that my Millhouse and Watermill wherein the said Richard Gadbury my sonne now doth dwell together with all the running Geares and implements whatsoever to the same watermill belonging". The will goes on: "To have and to hold my said millhouse and watermill closes and pightles of pasture ground with all and singular their and every of their appurtenances unto the said Richard Gadbury my sonn his Executors Administrators and Assignes for and during all the rest residue and remainder of such terme and termes number and numbers of yeares as shall (at my decease) be then to come and unexpired". This latter clause seems to make it quite clear that Gadbury only held the mill by lease, presumably from the Buckmasters

Similarly in 1769 Henry Pearson of Eaton Bray miller devised to "Ann my Loving Wife All that Messuage Cottage or Tenement called or known by the Name or Names of Horsamills (otherwise Do-Little Mills) wherein Joseph Bly now Doth Inhabit and Dwell Situate and Standing in the Parish of Totternhoe in the said County of Bedford".

He goes on: "To Hold the same unto the said Ann my Loving Wife her Executors Administrators and Assigns for and during all the rest residue and remainder of the Term or Terms of Years that are to come and Unexpired in the Lease or Leases thereof and Subject to the Outgoings and Payments mentioned in the same Lease or Leases". Clearly Pearson leased the mill from someone, probably a Buckmaster and then sub-let to Joseph Bly.

There is a painting by Thomas Fisher of about 1820 which shows "The bridge before Mr. Pierson's Mill". This appears above but looks nothing like the current premises. This gives rise to the suspicion that, provided the attribution is correct, there was no windmill attached to the mill house at this time. At first sight this seems to contradict the evidence of Richard Gadbury's will. However, the document does not say that the two mills were joined and, in fact, rather gives the impression that they were not because they are mentioned in different clauses. The answer seems to be that the windmill stood further off in the 18th and early 19th century. Steele Elliott notes in the Bedfordshire Historical Record Society volume: "1765. A windmill earlier than the one now in evidence is figured about 60 yards distant to the north of 'Doe Little Mill'; the latter mill was then solely run by the stream. The mill-stump was still to be seen there up to about twenty years

ago". His source is a map of Bedfordshire of 1765 by Thomas Jefferys

Two detailed maps showing the Bridgewater, later Brownlow Estate survive for the early 19th century. The map of 1829 has a reference book detailing all the land holdings on the estate. Each house in the village is marked, together with a description of the area of the property and the name of the person who inhabited it, whether or not the property was owned by the Estate. The 1840 map also has a similar reference book.

In 1829 Doolittle Mill was number 7 on the map. It was described as "House, mill and garden; owned by C. Buckmaster; occupied by C. Buckmaster; 10 poles."

In 1840 the mill was shown as three separate properties, with entries as follows:

- 7. Mill, meadow and stream; 1 acre, 1 rood, 10 poles; owned by Christopher Buckmaster; occupied by Christopher Buckmaster:
- 8. House, mill and garden; 10 poles; owned by Christopher Buckmaster; occupied by Christopher Buckmaster;

 9. Barn and yard in front; 10 poles; owned by Christopher Buckmaster; occupied by Christopher Buckmaster.

The Rating and Valuation Act 1925 specified that every building and piece of land in the country was to be assessed to determine its rateable value. The valuer visiting Doolittle Mill, on 26th October 1926, found it was owned and occupied by the Misses Buckmaster and that it included land comprising twenty six acres. The valuer commented: Also rent 17½ acres (Eaton Bray). Mill been in family 400 years. Last used four years ago. Was wind and water at one time. Water wheel out of order. Engine no good. Buildings appalling".

The miller's house comprised three reception rooms, a kitchen and a pantry downstairs with five bedrooms above. The valuer noted: "Water from stream". The brick and tiled mill comprised five floors and two stones of three feet diameter; "sacks stored on ground floor". The farm homestead comprised the following buildings: a weather-boarded and corrugated iron lean-to cart shed ("old steam engine in"); a shed; a weather-boarded and tiled loose box ("very bad"); a weatherboarded and corrugated iron pigsty, openfronted cart shed and three further pigsties; six weather-boarded and thatched calf boxes ("part in Eaton Bray neglect"); three weather-boarded and corrugated iron loose boxes and a large flint and thatched store shed ("roof falling off").



All The Quesadillas

Time to talk about one of the staples in my house. We are a bit quesadilla "crazy". They are so versatile, so quick and so cheap that I just keep serving them up in different ways to my children. They are also a brilliant way of using up leftovers and, perhaps surprisingly, hold up pretty well in a packed lunch box too to be eaten cold at school.

Once you have got the basics mastered, there is no looking back.

For each quesadilla, you'll need two large flour tortillas, the filling, a hot large pan and some olive oil

The filings will usually always need • Leftover bolognese sauce and parmesan something melty, just to glue it all together - not to mention that the translation of quesadilla is apparently "Cheesy-Dude"!

Simply build the quesadilla by placing one tortilla on your worktop, cover it with your choice of filling and leave a border of a couple of centimetres.



Top the filling with the other tortilla and heat up your pan to a medium-high temperature.

Pour in a good glug of oil.

Carefully slide the quesadilla in and let the base crisp up nicely. Using a flat spatula, gently turn the quesadilla over and crisp up the other tortilla. Serve immediately, cut into segments like a pizza.

There are no limits to the filling combinations vou can use. Here are some of the ones I use at home:

- Leftover chilli con carne and cheddar.
- Leftover Sunday roast and veg, topped with a little cheese (I love using brie with chicken)
- Thinly spread tomato puree and grated mozzarella
- Grated cheddar, sweetcorn and cherry tomatoes
- · Sliced cooked chorizo and feta
- Lightly mashed butternut squash or sweet potato with feta
- French mustard, crispy bacon and grated Emmental cheese
- Camembert with red onion chutney

Faton Bray/Edlesborough House Prices • The Effect of Rising Indution

House prices tend to rise with inflation, so with UK annual inflation hitting 4.2% last week, that's good news, isn't it? Yes and no – let me explain what it means for village homeowners.

The year-on-year cost of living rose by 4.2% in October, its highest rate in almost a decade. This jump in prices (inflation), pushed mainly by increasing fuel and energy costs, places further pressure on Eaton Bray/Edlesborough household budgets.

So, what will this rise in inflation mean to village house prices?

Let me look at the downsides first. The first is the effect inflation has on the true spending power or value of your hard-earned money.

The mid-1970s to mid-1980s was a time of high inflation in the UK, so I think that is an excellent place to start.

The average house in LU6 in 1974 was worth £14,651, and by 1984 it had risen to £44,524

So, property prices in LU6 had risen by 203.9% in the decade 1974 to 1984.

Good news for everyone, then? Well, as always, the devil is in the detail.

Inflation over the same decade rose by 224.2%, meaning your village house was worth less in real terms (i.e., spending power terms).

If that same Eaton Bray/Edlesborough home had gone up by the inflation rate seen between 1974 and 1984, the house would have been worth £47,505 in 1984

That doesn't sound a lot (the difference between £44,524 and £47,505), until you apply that difference to today's prices; that's a loss of £21,899 in today's money.

The second is the effect of interest rates.

When inflation rises, the usual weapon of choice to reduce inflation is to increase interest rates. Homebuyers tend not to borrow as much on their mortgage when borrowing money becomes more expensive due to higher interest rates.

When interest rates get high (they were over 15% in 1992) Eaton Bray/Edlesborough homebuyers may not even want to borrow any money at all (staying put in their existing home). This would mean fewer home buyers wanting to buy (decreased demand). However, at the same time, more village houses would be coming onto the market (because existing local homeowners would want to sell and downsize because they have high mortgage payments), meaning higher supply... low demand and high supply does drive house prices in a downward direction.

So, does that mean you should hold off buying a Eaton Bray/Edlesborough home? Although house prices in LU6 did not keep up fully with inflation in the late 1970s and early 1980s, they did a pretty good job (and much better than keeping money in a savings account). You must remember your house is not a pure investment, it's a place you and your family live in. It's a place you call home. So don't worry if it doesn't keep up with inflation in the medium term as your four walls offer a lot more than just a simple investment.

Ok, so let's look at what does happen when inflation affects property.

When your Eaton Bray/Edlesborough house price rises because of inflation, it increases

the value of your house, not by the cost/value of your deposit. So, if inflation increases the value of your home by, say half (50%), it may triple, quadruple, or even quintuple the value of your deposit/equity.

For example, if you buy a Eaton Bray/Edlesborough property for £500,000 with a £50,000 deposit and inflation increases the price/value by 50% to £750,000, that means your equity in the property quintuples from £50,000 to £300,000. It also means you go from (in this scenario) owning 10% equity (£50k of £500k) in your home to 40% after inflation (£300k of £750k).

Even better if you take out a fixed-rate mortgage because you would be making a fixed monthly mortgage payment that dropped in real spending power 'inflation adjusted' pounds over the time of the fixed rate. You might ask why? Well, you are paying less for the mortgage than you did when you took it out (i.e. inflation erodes the actual value of money, meaning your mortgage debt diminishes in real value terms in line with inflation).

So, holding off moving home could cost you a lot of money.

What does this all mean for existing Eaton Bray/Edlesborough homeowners?

It's challenging to forecast with any certainty what will happen with UK inflation and interest rates. I believe we will see inflation hover between 3% and 5% in 2022, with it returning to more normal levels of around 2% in 2023 (although I am no economist!). We know the Bank of England base rate is just 0.1%, meaning it's unlikely to get any lower. I have spoken about this in previous articles on the local property market and said the money markets have already priced in an interest rate rise to 0.75% to 1% by the summer of 2022.

So, if you haven't already, you need to seriously consider taking advantage of these low mortgage rates (can you believe 21% of local homeowners aren't on a fixed-rate mortgage). The bottom line is, irrespective of what is happening to inflation and house prices in LU6, being able to afford the monthly payments on your village home is what

counts for everyone.

One final thought for any Eaton Bray/ Edlesborough homeowners thinking of selling and not buying another home, inflation could eat into the real spending power terms of the equity of your home – so now might be the best time to sell to get maximum bang for your bucks. Then invest the money in other pure investments that consistently tend to beat inflation, such as gold, commodities, or Real Estate Investment Trusts? Again, I am giving you my opinion here, not financial advice. You must take independent advice from someone qualified in these matters and make your own decisions.





What to Sow and Grow in February



February might be the cold, tail end of winter, but springtime is only around the corner. There are plenty of flowers, fruits and vegetables to sow and grow this month. Here are our top picks:

Flowers to sow and grow In the greenhouse/indoors

- Sow lobelia in a heated propagator.
- Plant begonia tubers (hollow side up) in pots of moist compost and cover with a little more compost. Keep them in a bright, frost-free position.
- Sow your last lot of begonia seeds under glass or in a propagator for beautiful blooms throughout the summer. Keep them at a constant temperature of around 24-27 degrees celsius.
- Sow antirrhinums (snapdragons) and laurentia now to ensure early flowering.
- Start dahlia tubers into growth by planting them in pots of compost, maintaining a minimum temperature of 10 degrees celsius.
- Sow certain varieties of value annual flower seeds & value perennial & biennial seeds, such as hollyhocks or stock, in a propagator or inside a polythene bag. Read the individual growing instructions on your seed packet to learn more, and check out our dedicated biennials and perennials sowing guide.
- Sow sweet peas in a glasshouse, cold frame or a cool place indoors. Soak sweet pea seeds in tepid water overnight before planting them, to speed up germination.
- Grow your own chrysanthemum plants

- from seed start them off now in the greenhouse for the earliest blooms.
- Sow geraniums (pelargoniums) indoors now for earlier flowers.
- Plant or pot on hardwood cuttings taken last year.
- Pot on rooted cuttings of tender perennial plants taken last summer.

Plant outdoors

- Plant lily bulbs and allium bulbs.
 Although best done in autumn, you can get away with planting lilies and alliums until spring.
- Plant bare root roses in a sunny position for spectacular summer colour.
- Plant fragrant winter-flowering shrubs to add interest to borders, such as daphne, viburnum x bodnantense 'Dawn', witch hazel (hamamelis x intermedia) and wintersweet (chimonanthus praecox).

Vegetables and herbs to sow and grow

In the greenhouse/indoors

- Start growing (chitting) early potatoes on a windowsill indoors.
- Start sowing cucumber and tomato seeds for the greenhouse, in warm conditions.
- Sow peas try sowing them in upcycled guttering with drainage holes drilled in the bottom.
- Start asparagus pea seeds under cover for planting out in late spring.
- Sow aubergine seeds now for indoor crops this summer.
- Grow your own basil on the windowsill to flavour your favourite Italian dishes and fill your kitchen with heady Mediterranean aromas.
- Start early sowings of brassicas under cover. Try Brussels sprouts, summer cabbage, cauliflower 'All the Year Round', and calabrese 'Aquiles'.

- Start slow-growing celeriac seeds now under cover.
- Try bolt-resistant varieties of celery, such as 'Lathom Self Blanching', for early sowings.
- Sow leeks under cover these vegetables need a long growing season.
- Try growing really large onions this year sow 'Bunton's Showstopper' and 'Ailsa Craig' indoors now.
- Sow sweet peppers for growing on in a heated greenhouse. Always provide plenty of warmth.

In the cold frame/under cloches

- Sow broad beans, carrots, parsnips, early beetroot, salad onions, lettuces, radish, peas, spinach and summer cabbages outside under cloches, if you have light (sandy) soil and live in a mild part of the UK. Otherwise it's best to wait until the soil has begun to warm up in March or April.
- Grow chicory under cloches, for early summer harvesting.

Direct sow outdoors

 Direct sow hardy broad beans, such as 'Aquadulce Claudia', if the soil isn't frozen.

Plant outdoors

- Plant out garlic and shallots in light soils only; heavy soils still need longer to warm up.
- Plant Jerusalem artichoke tubers.

Fruit to sow and grow



- Plant raspberry canes and blackberries provided the soil isn't frozen or waterlogged.
- Plant currant plants, such as redcurrants, whitecurrants, blackcurrants and

- gooseberries if soil conditions are right.
- Plant bare-root strawberry plants outside now. Replace plants that are 3 years old or more, as they will have lost much of their vigour.
- Plant stone fruit trees, such as apricots, peaches and nectarines.
- Plant rhubarb crowns in a sunny position in well drained soil.

Keep one step ahead - what to order this month:



- Order sweet pea seeds to sow under cloches, in a cold frame, or in a cool room.
- Buy perennial plants like foxgloves.
- Order summer bedding plug plants.


December: started cold with temperatures just below zero. Then it turn unsettled with windy conditions on the 7th and 8th. On the 11th, temperatures rose and it became milder and drier. On the 21st, the temperature dropped to -1.5°c, but the following day we returned to mild and unsettled weather. This took us to the end of the month and the wettest day on Boxing Day when we had 15.2mm of rain along with December's highest temperature of 14.8°c. We recorded rain on 27 days, but the total of 75.6mm was below the average. December was a dull month with little sunshine but warmer than normal, particularly the night time temperatures.

2021 Highlights: the year started with a very wet and cold January when rain was at 167% of the average (124mm) and the temperature dropped to -5.9°c. April was the driest month with only 4.4mm of rain, which is 10% of the monthly average, followed by November with 23mm. There was a hot spell in July where the temperatures were above 30°c degrees on five consecutive days and **included the highest temperature for the year of 31.4**°c. August temperatures and sunshine were down and reached a high of 27.4°c. Autumn-like conditions continued into winter to give a mild end to the year. We had 206 days of rain, giving a total of 811.1mm rainfall, which is 107% of the average.







Salvation Sound

Eaton Bray Salvation Army Hope and Forgiveness in face of adversity





It was with sadness that last month Desmond Mpilo Tutu was a South African Anglican Bishop and theologian passed away at the age of 91.

During most of Desmond Tutu's life the laws in South Africa segregated people according to their race. Schools, homes and jobs were separated- life was much more difficult for those who were not white. Desmond Tutu was often treated unkindly by other South Africanshe was beaten and even put in prison, simply because of the colour of his skin.

When he was a young boy, out walking with his mother, he was surprised to see a white man, a priest, take off his hat as a sign of respect to his mother, a black woman. That sign of peace, friendship, and dignity had a big impact on young Desmond. It showed him that he did not have to behave like everyone else. These small examples of Jesus' kindness were

a powerful way to fight the hatred and inequality he experienced during his lifetime.

When Desmond Tutu was a teenager he was sick with tuberculosis and in hospital for over a year. A priest visited him and showed the love and care of Jesus. It was during this time that he decided to give his life in helping others.

These moments shaped his life, and he was well known to the world as a religious and political leader. He was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his leadership in the ending of apartheid. After apartheid ended, he chaired the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. He heard many terrible stories of injustice and pain but was most overcome by the courage of others to say 'I'm sorry', and the power of 'I forgive you'. Desmond Tutu was a beautiful example of someone who chose to forgive rather than get revenge.

This year, 2022, the words from Desmond Tutu will echo in my mind.

'We are family...... made for togetherness, goodness, compassion.... Little bits of good that overwhelm the world.' Perhaps, the shared dreams of this new year and all that it means to us can be pointers to the hope that we share; 'Hope is being able to see that there is light despite all the darkness' (Desmond Tutu)
