brightly for us as we said our goodbyes to our Dad, Derrick Bonfield, also known as Bonny.

Father was born in 1924 at Icknield Farm on the Tring Road, and attended Eaton Bray School as a youngster. After that he helped his father on the farm and with his haulage business, eventually having to run it himself due to his father's ill health. On his marriage to Daphne Vasey, known as Dill they were able to have a council house in Swan Lane, Northall, By then he was working at Broomstick Garage in Edlesborough for Mr Alan Moore. After his time there, father went as HGV fitter/driver for R.K. Browning in Leighton Buzzard for over thirty years.

Mum and Dad were very involved in the concept of the Northall Village and Recreational Social Club, with the aim of raising money for the village hall, which now stands in Southend Lane. The Club had a Sale of work each September and among the people who helped were two ladies Edna Ward and Brenda Warner who made beautiful items to be sold on their stall. The Bonfire night celebrations were always well attended with plenty to eat and a roaring fire and the best Guy Fawkes competition. Tug of War was always fun and sometimes a little boisterous. These were just some of events done to raise monies for the hall.

Dad was always on hand to mend people's equipment, whether it be someone's car, or perhaps a friend's washing machine, he always seemed to be able to find a way to fix something broken.

He was a great friend to many and he will be greatly missed by us all.

It is now two years since our lives were unexpectedly disrupted by Covid 19. We were required to lockdown, to stay at home only going out briefly for exercise or essential shopping. Everything changed. For some, lockdown became a period of reflection, and an opportunity to reconnect with the natural world in new ways. Revd Louise Collins, Team Vicar of Elstree and Borehamwood spent some of her lockdown reading and reflecting on trees. Trees are resilient, and adaptable. They are amongst the oldest living organisms on earth. They provide a big contrast to the way we live our lives in normal times, which for many are spent rushing around, constantly trying to fit everything in.

This year in our Lent Group with the North Chilterns Group of Churches we will be exploring the amazing world of trees, using material written by Louise. There will be an opportunity to ponder what trees can teach us and to engage in discussions with one another. Meetings will be held at Totternhoe Church Hall on Tuesday evenings during Lent, starting on Tuesday 8th March and concluding on Tuesday 5th April. Drinks and biscuits will be served from 7.30pm and each session will start at 7.45pm with a presentation followed by discussion.

I am very excited about this Lent Course. I think it will help us to see the importance of trees and give us time and space to reflect on how we too can be rooted just as they are. The five sessions will cover themes of being rooted in life, in generosity, in community, in justice and in hope. We are often encouraged to think about our impact on the environment. But how often do we consider how the world around us can change and shape us? Louise has used a wide variety of material to enable reflections on what trees can teach us. She draws on insights from figures as diverse as the Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell and Mother Julian of Norwich. Louise uses these as well as Biblical passages and her wide reading and research to open up the amazing world of trees in all its aspects.



Everyone is welcome to come along. If you have never been to church before and you would like to think more deeply about things, then this is a good opportunity to do so. It will be a relaxed approach with no pressure to join the discussion unless you wish to

do so- and it is free! The other thing worth noting is that although the sessions are linked, each one will stand alone. I hope you will take the opportunity to join us and learn more from the natural world about being Rooted in Hope and the amazing world of trees.

### Edlesborough Parish Council News Including Edlesborough, Dagnall and Northall

**16m Telecoms Mast on High Street, Edlesborough** Parishioners will be aware that the installation of a 16m Telecoms Mast on High Street, Edlesborough has commenced.

Edlesborough Parish Council (EPC) would like to clarify that when planning applications are submitted EPC is a consultee and not the planning authority. The planning authority is Buckinghamshire Council (BC). EPC submits responses to planning applications that it believes reflect the wishes of the parishioners.

Two applications for the installation of the mast on High Street, Edlesborough were submitted to BC and a yellow notice was posted in a lamp post at the proposed location on 25th October. The yellow notices are the planning authority's process for informing parishioners of an application. Once notices are posted it is parishioner's responsibility to look on the Buckinghamshire Council website for more information about the application.

EPC objected to both applications for the Telecom Mast on the grounds that the mast would be too close to homes, and would have a detrimental visual impact on the village.

In response to the first application Buckinghamshire Council advised the applicant that "The current plans show that the proposed monopole would sit to the immediate rear of 9 St Marv's Glebe, and therefore would be highly visible from this neighbouring property. However, it is recognised that within the site's red line boundary the proposed monopole could be relocated to be situated within the gap along the boundary line between numbers 7 and 9 St Mary's Glebe dwellings, as such the harm to residential amenity would be reduced. It is therefore considered that the proposal would comply with policy I6 of the VALP (Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan) and the guidance set out within the NPPF (National Planning Policy Framework) however prior approval would be required with regards to siting, such to reduce the impact upon the amenity of neighbours." As a result of this the applicant submitted a second application siting the mast between 7 and 9 St Mary's Glebe. The applicant did this on the grounds that permission would be granted. This meant that whilst EPC objected to the second application permission was granted before EPC was able to inform the neighbouring residents of the application.

EPC did all it could in objecting to this permitted development. EPC believes that residents would not have been able to achieve any more even if they had submitted an objection before the application was determined.

### Good Intent, Edlesborough Telecom Mast

Parishioners will recall that earlier in 2021 EPC had previously received a pre application consultation from another company wishing to install a telecom mast at the top of Good Intent. This company has not yet submitted an application for this installation and EPC has tried to work with them to find a more suitable position. This company could still submit an application to install a mast at the top of Good Intent.

### **Planning Applications**

You can read more about EPC's procedure for responding to planning applications on the EPC website. The website is regularly updated with information about local planning applications, including EPC's responses to applications and the planning authority's decisions.

### **Buckinghamshire Councillors**

This data when analysed will enable the council to consider whether physical traffic calming measures might be needed. This together with Speedwatch reinforces the Buckinghamshire Council principle of educating drivers to observe the speed limits.

### NEW SMALL GRANT AWARD SCHEME LAUNCHED

#### Edlesborough Parish Council is pleased to announce a new Small Grant scheme.

This is a great opportunity for local groups, local charities and local organisations to get a grant of up to £500 in this new scheme. The main terms of the grant are very straightforward.

- The purpose for which the grant is made must be in the interest of Edlesborough Parish that covers the residents of Edlesborough. Dagnall and Northall.
- EPC will determine the size of the award up to a maximum of £500.
- We will not award funds for activities that have already taken place.
- Any publicity covering the activity funded must mention EPC's involvement.
- The award recipients must make a short presentation at the Annual Parish Meeting.

The last time EPC awarded grants was to the teams established from the Parish Plan in 2008. Today, some of those teams are still operating successfully. This new award scheme is broader in its application and is intended to run each year from now onwards if enough proposals come forward for funding.

We have designed the application in two stages. The first stage involves screening the application to ensure it meets the basic criteria. EPC has established a small team of councillors who will examine the initial proposal. If the proposal passes stage one it moves forward to the second stage where we will require all the details needed to ensure that public money is spent wisely.

Applications will be reviewed at any time during the year and awards to successful applications made in each quarter beginning in April this year. The total funding available is limited.





### The Organ in the Church on the Hill

The Organ in the Church on the Hill has been there since June 1885. It was built by Bishop & Son (an appropriate name) of 250, Marylebone Road, London NW. The company was founded in 1795 and became Organ Builder to HER MAJESTY, being

Queen Victoria, and is still going strong today. The Organ Cost £200, the Stool £2 and Carriage costs were 2 pounds 12 shillings and sixpence (£2.65). The current equivalent is approximately £30,000, though it would cost around £150,000 to build a comparable instrument today. The Organ was later restored by R. Crabbe, Organ Builder of Wing, who also restored the organ at Little Gaddesden Parish Church.

We recently had an issue where a note was stuck on the Organ. If any stop (one of the knobs you see to either side of the keyboards, which select a specific type of sound, such as a flute) was drawn, then this one note would play continuously even though that note on the keyboard wasn't being pressed. This, of course, makes the organ unusable. Now fortunately we were able to





call upon the expertise of Stephen Axford, Organist at St. Mary's Eaton Bray who had first discovered the problem when he played at our Heritage Open Days "Songs of Praise". So for three freezing days in November and December, two of us joined up with Stephen to "help" him solve the problem.

The basic principle of Organ design may have been unchanged for centuries (the inner workings of our instrument would be familiar to an organ builder from before Bach's time in the seventeenth century) but you still need the inside knowledge, literally. Stephen removed parts of the housing and squeezed into the belly of the workings. He was able to free the stuck note and ensure that particular part of the mechanism didn't stick again – for now!

Music for the organ is usually written for both

hands and feet, and when the manual or pedal keyboard notes are depressed, valves (called pallets) are opened, wind supplied by bellows and stored in reservoirs flows through various channels, and the pipes produce the sound. Our organ has two keyboards (manuals) with 56 notes each, and a pedalboard of 30 notes. Many pipes can sound at the same time, and the organist can choose the type of sound – this organ has stops with familiar names such as flute, viol, and oboe, as well as ones that make the more typical big organ sound.

The pedal notes were the most troublesome aspect of the organ and only about half of them worked. The pedal notes are the lowest notes, rather like the Double Bass in an orchestra, so



missing these means you don't get the deep rich sound you expect from an organ. Having seen the decrepit state of the innards (very clear in the first photograph), Stephen carefully removed and numbered all of the connecting rods (called trackers), which were cleaned, repaired, and re-varnished (most of the mechanism is incredibly lightweight, delicate pieces of wood), prior to re-assembling the action. He fabricated new parts where the old was corroded or had been damaged by damp or mice! This included hooks and connectors made of bronze wire, and felt and leather to make washers and nuts. Half (15 notes) of the newly-repaired pedal action can be seen in the second photograph. There is a similar collection of parts for the other 15 notes, which you can see in the third picture. It took around twelve hours in total to re-assemble the full mechanism.

The Organ was played in its full pomp at our Carols by Candlelight Service, when Stephen also sang a solo, with his wife Elizabeth providing the accompaniment on the Organ.

As the weather warms in the Spring, we hope Stephen will carefully overhaul the keyboard mechanism which, while it currently works (just), is also quite unreliable in places and is suffering from dirt, damp and general deterioration.

The Friends Group is deeply indebted to Stephen and we are hoping to host an Organ Recital in the Spring. Stephen will demonstrate what our wonderful instrument is capable of, and tell us a bit more about how these amazing musical machines work. \*\*\*\*\*

### St Mary's Churchyard

I have recently completed a 3 year long project to record all the inscriptions and photograph all the graves in the church graveyard, to post on the website www. findagrave.com as an aid to family historians anywhere in the world. I have also entered the details into a spreadsheet for use by the Parish clerk. The Bucks Family History Society carried out a similar task in the late 1980s. Over 25% of the inscriptions that were readable then are now illegible, either completely or partly. Sometimes they have become overgrown and sometimes the stone face has become damaged.

The grounds maintenance team helped by clearing away dead brambles etc from the more overgrown graves. We made several interesting finds.

#### How did the 1985 team miss these?

These 3 huge chest graves are on the slope near the wooden steps and were missed from the earlier project. Like most of the graves on the flat area above them they commemorate various members of the Ginger family.





#### Туро

There is a huge gravestone in the large chained area not far from the war memorial that commemorates 3 members of the Batchelar family. When we looked closely we found that the stone mason had made 2 typos, if you can call carving that. If you look closely at the 'A' you can see that it was inserted into the row of text, presumably the stone mason assumed the name was spelled 'Batchelor'.

#### **Mysterious steps**

The grave at the top of the picture is for Robert John Sharratt, who died age 7 in 1957. The 'book' in the foreground marks the ashes burial place of Elsie and Adam Sharratt, who died in 1972 and 1976, respectively, possibly his grandparents.

But why are there steps in between them? There don't seem to be any more steps in the flight, though one of our team got out her trowel in best 'Time Team' style.

#### **Overall Findings**

- 352 graves with legible inscriptions, plus 2 with a decorative metal cross and 9 marked with just a vase or surround to the grave.
- 650 people were recorded.
- The oldest grave dated back to 1823
- Most common surname Janes (23), then Gray (20) and Gadsden (17)
- 38 people were over 90 when they died, 3 of whom were 101. Of the 38, only 5 were men.
- 25 children aged 5 or under were recorded, of which 16 were 1 or under. This is a surprisingly small number but these are only the graves where there is a stone headstone; the large grassy areas throughout the graveyard signify that the majority of graves probably had only had a wooden headstone.

#### The importance of local information

A parishioner told us that there was a plaque to a lady doctor who was killed in WW2,



but we could not find it anywhere until we decided to tidy up a large grave and found it resting on her parents' grave. The plaque commemorates Captain Jean Cunison Nelson, who was killed in India in 1945 whilst she was serving as a doctor. She is commemorated on the war memorial of Buckland village, where her parents were living when she died, but she spent most of her childhood in Dagnall.

Paul, originally known as Saul was struck down by a bright light, after he had been persecuting the Christians with great enthusiasm. Paul then had a firsthand encounter with the risen Lord. Everyone has heard about how this happened on the road to Damascus. In everyday language, people talk about having a 'road to Damascus' experience. This means a complete change of direction. Paul changed totally as a result of his experience. He was blinded for three days

until help arrived. He then had to escape from Damascus in a basket lowered from the city walls. This was the first of his trials after his conversion and there were many, many more. Paul was born in Tarsus, a city at the north eastern side of the Mediterranean. He learned how to preach the gospel of the saving grace of Jesus Christ instead of tracking down and punishing those who believed in Jesus. The Roman occupation at the time had improved travel and communications. Paul's specific calling was to preach and share this good news beyond Israel and to the known world at that time (Acts 9).

Three Missionary journeys covered a huge area around Turkey, Greece, Israel, Syria and Italy. All current holiday destinations! How life has changed. Very few then had the resources to travel for pleasure. It was dangerous. Three times Paul was shipwrecked. 2 Corinthians 11 lists the many dangers he had faced including being arrested and imprisoned many, many times. We read elsewhere about his severe eye problems.

This doesn't sound like a good holiday. His last trip was to Rome where he was again imprisoned and likely later executed. But what a job he had done. So many heard the Good News because of Paul's unending efforts. The stories are all recounted in our bibles.

Our Sunday services, are now back in Church at 11 am. Feel free to join us for our worship and song. You will get a warm welcome. For those unable to attend in person we also stream our services.

Made in 2015 approximately, using a small map of the Close kept by my husband Peter, enlarging the map and tracing off the shapes as I have done before, the next step was to carefully choose the fabrics as I didn't want to use fabrics that had too much of a print on them but still look appropriate. The strip on the right side of the picture has since been built on and some of the bungalows have had extensions done over the years. The red bungalow and garage is where I live and my studio is the back half of the garage - cleaned out and warm!

### ADELBERT WELLINGTON CUST

Following on from the last article about the 2nd Earl Brownlow, I would now like to turn to his younger brother who succeeded him as the 3rd Earl in 1867. You may recall that both were the sons of Lady Marianne Alford, who looked after Ashridge House until they reached the age of maturity. Both Ashridge and the more important Belton House in Lincolnshire belonged to the family and Adelbert is remembered with a marble bust, coat of arms and florid inscription there, though the entwined 'A's of Adelbert and his wife Adelaide (Talbot) are also prominently displayed in Ashridge House.

The inscription at Belton reads as follows:

Adelbert Wellington Brownlow Cust, 3rd Earl and 4th Baron Brownlow. Knight Grand Cross of the Royal Victorian Order, Privy Councillor, Lord Lieutenant of this county for fifty four years. Aide de Camp to Their Majesties Queen Victoria, King Edward VII, and King George V successively. A Colonel in Her Majesty's Army and a Brigadier General of the Volunteer Force. Born 19th August, 1844, died at Belton, 17th March 1921. He was a very gallant and honourable gentleman. The coat of arms shows Cust (Ermine on a chevron Sable three fountains) impaling Talbot (Gules a lion rampant within a bordure engrailed Or) with an earl's coronet above. Actually the Talbot arms are modelled incorrectly as the *bordure* as shown is what is termed invected rather than *engrailed*, meaning the scalloped edge is turned the wrong way round.

I suspect that had the earl lived his eye for detail would have spotted that!



#### Landscape

Eaton Bray lies at the foot of the Dunstable Downs, themselves part of the Chilterns.

As might be expected some of the soil is chalky but the picture is more complex than that. The area around the New York Diner, the former Plough Public House as well as Valance End, now in Whipsnade, for example has an underlying geology which comprises a mixture of West Melbury Marly Chalk Formation, laid down between 94 and 99 million years ago in the Cretaceous Period and Zig Zag Chalk Formation laid down at the same time.

The southern part of Moor End, is also West Melbury Marly Chalk Formation but with a sub soil called head, a mixture of clay, silt sand, gravel deposited by the watercourses in the area. The northern part of Moor End as well as Bower Lane. Dunstable Road and Harling Road is all West Melbury formation with a chalky subsoil but the south-east side of the High Street has solid geology called Upper Greensand Formation, a mixture of siltstone and mudstone laid down between 94 and 112 million years ago. The Market Place, Church Lane and Northall Road also lies on this formation but with head, once more, as the subsoil. Finally Totternhoe Road, the Rye and the northern part of the parish lies on a fourth type of solid geology - Gault Formation. a mudstone laid down between 99 and 112 million years ago.

The church stands around 330 feet above sea-level whilst the Recreation Ground is ten feet or so lower. Rye Farm is lower still



at around 305 feet whilst Honeywicke Cottage stands at about 327 ft. The former Moor End

Mill is around 322 feet above sea-level but the highest parts of the parish are towards the Chilterns - Café Masala stands about 350 feet above sea-level, Bellows Mill around 337 feet, Doolittle Mill nearly 370 feet with New York Diner at 418 feet above sea-level with Edlesborough Hill standing at 434 feet..

Volume III of The Victoria County History for Bedfordshire was published in 1912, before a series of boundary changes which have had a cumulative effect of making today's parish slightly smaller. Then the parish comprised 2,417 acres of which more than half was arable, with 664 acres of "rich meadows for cattle grazing". Crops were wheat, barley, beans, plums (usually for prunes) and damsons. The Victoria County History remarked: "Duck rearing was also started about twenty or thirty years ago and is still kept up by many of the natives, but the risks being so great it is gradually losing its popularity". In fact evidence from Quarter Sessions records shows that duck rearing was popular as far back as the 1830s.

#### Name

The word Eaton means "river farm". Eaton Bray has numerous small streams giving the name the connotations of a wellwatered landscape. The Bray element was not added until the 15th century or later, the Bray family becoming Lords of the Manor of Eaton in 1490. The first element of the name has changed through history as shown: Eiton: 1086-1286 Eitona: 1086-1286 Eitun: 1156 Æiton: 1159 Etton: 1164 Ehton: 1166 Eyton: 1220-1491 Eton: 1241-1490

#### **Administrative History**

Eaton Bray is an ancient parish in the Manshead Hundred. It was, briefly, the centre of a rural district council from 1894 to 1933. The parish is bordered as follows: Billington to the north; Stanbridge to the north-east; Totternhoe to the north-east and east; Whipsnade to the south and south-east and Edlesborough (Buckinghamshire) to the west and south-west. There have, of course, been small boundary changes over the years, the most significant of which was the adjustment of the county boundary with Buckinghamshire to run along the stream in Moor End meaning that Moor End Mill, Two Counties Mill and Summerly Road, amongst others, moved from Eaton Bray and Bedfordshire to Edlesborough and Buckinghamshire.

In 1985 an area of land running north from Dukes Avenue in Whipsnade was transferred from Eaton Bray to Whipsnade. Some small, uninhabited areas were also exchanged between Eaton Bray and Totternhoe.

#### Population

The Domesday Book of 1086 records 20 villagers, 13 smallholders and 2 slaves in the Manor of Eaton Bray – a total of 35. These numbers would only count the heads of households so to arrive at a true figure for the population one needs to multiply this figure by at least four, suggesting a total population of around 140, making Eaton Bray a more substantial settlement for the time.

It looks as if Eaton Bray has always been one of the more populous rural parishes in the county as the figures below indicate. It is interesting to note that the only drop in population occurred after 1871 and lasted into the 1920s. An agricultural depression initially drive people away from the land to seek their living in towns and steady mechanisation agricultural continued that trend before an increasing birth rate began to reverse the decline. Latterly, of course, many villages have seen great expansion as the population has risen and people who work in towns and cities have chosen to move to the countryside for the better quality of life it affords; hence the population of Eaton Bray more than doubling between 1931 and 2011.

As part of being an Eco church, St Mary's is committed to finding ways to decrease our environmental impact. Recycling is one of the ways we can do this. Most of us will use the kerbside recycling bins. What happens to the stuff we bin and how can we help to make the process better? I spoke to Lee to find out.

Hi, my name is Lee and I work for Cawleys which is a privately owned waste management and recycling company based in Luton. I work in the engineering department helping to keep all the machinery we use running efficiently and I'm here today to help explain the recycling process.

Joy: Can you explain the recycling process once it is collected from our bins.

Lee: All recyclable waste will be taken to a facility equipped to sort it out into its different individual properties. Cardboard will be sorted one way, plastics and paper another and so on. This is done by using computer-controlled sorting machines which identifies each type of waste and then uses jets of air to separate them - or by people who sort by hand what the machines can't do.

Joy: Is there anything made of glass which we shouldn't put in the Kerbside glass collection? If so, why?

Lee: Nearly all glass is infinitely recyclable except for Pyrex and sheet glass from windows etc. Pyrex or sheet glass should be either put in the general waste or disposed of separately. The reason is that they have been treated with chemicals to give them a higher melting point so they will not melt down like ordinary bottles or glass jars do when they get to the recycling facility. They will contaminate the process and make that batch of glass unusable.

Joy: Does everything have to be washed out & clean before putting it in the recycling? What if there is a bit of food on it?

What happens if I put something in which can't be recycled? Will it ruin the whole collection?

Lee: Yes, everything should be washed of food residue before being put in the recycling bin. Food residue will contaminate the material and render the batch worthless for re-use. The same applies to non-recyclable materials that have been mixed in.

Joy: What is the best way to recycle tin foil? Should it be scrunched into a ball?

Lee: Tin foil can be put in the recycling bin. It just has to be free of food residue just like all other types of recyclables.

Joy: What should I do with old clothing that is not good enough for the charity shop?

Lee: Old clothing, curtains and duvets can be reused in many ways so it's well worth the effort to recycle them. If the items are of no use to a charity shop, they can be taken to local clothes banks or specialist clothing recycling centres. Items not fit for direct re-use are broken down and used again as padding in new items such as chairs or car seats, or can be turned into cleaning cloths or industrial blankets.

Joy: What can I do about the supermarkets who sell so much in wrapping that is not able to be recycled (especially fruit and veg)?

Lee: Everyone has a responsibility to help make the world we live in sustainable ways, and that includes our supermarkets.

Many thanks Lee for giving us that insight into the recycling process, and enabling us to do our bit for the environment.

### Easy Teriyaki Chicken

Try this easy, sticky Asianstyle teriyaki chicken for a speedy weeknight supper – it takes just 20 minutes to make! Serve it with sticky rice and steamed greens.

Prep 5 mins, Cook 15 mins, Serves 4

#### Ingredients

2 tbsp toasted sesame oil

6 skinless and boneless chicken thighs, sliced

2 large garlic cloves, crushed

- 1 thumb-sized piece ginger, grated
- 50g runny honey
- 30ml light soy sauce
- 1 tbsp rice wine vinegar
- 1 tbsp sesame seeds, to serve



4 spring onions, shredded, to serve sticky rice, to serve steamed bok choi or spring greens, to serve **Method** 

Heat the oil in a non-stick

pan over a medium heat. Add the chicken and fry for 7 mins, or until golden. Add the garlic and ginger and fry for 2 mins. Stir in the honey, soy sauce, vinegar and 100ml water. Bring to the boil and cook for 2 - 5 mins over a medium heat until the chicken is sticky and coated in a thick sauce.

Scatter over the spring onions and sesame seeds, then serve the chicken with the rice and steamed veg.

Condensed milk is the secret to this super snappy Italian dessert. Coffee and chocolate are a classic combo, simply layer them up and enjoy.

Prep 15 mins, plus 1 hour chilling, Serves 2.

#### Ingredients

- 3 tsp instant coffee granules3 tbsp coffee liqueur (or Camp Chicory & Coffee Essence)250g tub mascarpone85g condensed milk
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 4-6 sponge fingers
- 1 tbsp cocoa powder



#### Method

Mix the coffee granules with 2 tbsp boiling water in a large jug and stir to combine. Add the coffee liqueur and 75ml cold water. Pour into a shallow dish and set aside.

Make the cream layer by beating the mascarpone, condensed milk and vanilla extract with an electric whisk until thick and smooth.

Break the sponge fingers into two or three pieces and soak in the coffee mixture for a few secs. Put a few bits of the sponge in the bottom of two wine or sundae glasses and top with the cream. Sift over the cocoa and chill for at least 1 hr before serving.



### Spring Clean Your Body

During the cold, dark, wet months it is very easy to pick up bad habits such as slouching, slumping and forgetting to exercise. So, put a spring back into your step with a few simple postural exercises.

Good posture involves keeping your body in correct alignment by maintaining your natural curves in sitting, standing and walking. Try following these 4 simple steps to help improve posture, as well as minimise the stress and strain on muscles, joints and discs.



- 1. Try to stand as tall as you can this will make you look longer, leaner, fitter and thinner.


The first eleven days of January were unsettled, followed by a period of high pressure bringing dry spells almost to the end of the month. From the 12th to the 21st, we had frosty mornings with some fog, mist and sunny days. On the 22nd, the frosty mornings had gone and, by the 29th, the daytime temperature had reached 12.5°c. Storm Malik brought windy conditions, followed by Storm Corrie which gave us the highest wind speed of the month at 42mph on the 31st. The highest January temperature was 14.2°c, recorded on the 1st.

The highlight of the month was the lack of rain with only 22.4mm, which is only 29% of the Dagnall monthly average. This made it a very dry month, but we did have more sunshine than normal. That compares to January 2021 when we recorded 124.0mm of rain and 2014 when we had 160.6mm.

On the chart below, you'll see we had seventeen rain days (blue column), even though it rained for only seven days. This is because of frost melting on the rain gauge on some days, equating to 0.2mm of moisture.

February 8th and the winter aconites have attracted a honey bee! I saw only one but the temperature was 12°C which bees need to leave the hive. Several other flowers are blooming - hellebores, snowdrops, winter box, scilla and a few early daffodils to tempt other pollinators.

I have decided to make a new border next to a yew hedge. At the end of it is an elm sapling, a variety resistant to Dutch Elm Disease,

which was given to me and is growing well. There are still elms growing in our roadside hedge but they reach a certain size and then succumb to disease.

I'm excited about planning the border because I've never tried garden design before. In the past I've just added plants to existing planting schemes. My first decision is colour. I have some pale yellow dahlias which come from the tuber I was given to celebrate the Bedfordshire WI's centenary. These gave me the idea of a colour scheme of

yellows, blues, purples, whites and grey. I grew an artichoke in the vegetable garden last year which was far too big for where it was planted but I thought the grey foliage would look very striking at the back of the border as well as having blue-purple flowers and artichokes to eat!

Other blues would be delphiniums, eringiums and alliums. Irises grow well in the garden and different varieties give a long season starting with the miniatures which are flowering now and going on to the bearded iris later.

Rushing Stream is a groundcover rose with white flowers which I think would look

pretty at the front of the border. Salvias flower all summer and would be a good addition as well as Michaelmas daisies and chrysanths for autumn colour. I'm still thinking about shrubs. I like pittosporum and Viburnums which flower on bare branches in the winter.

This picture is Rembrandt's interpretation of The Return of the Prodigal Son. It is a striking picture, detailing so much, that Henri Nouwen (a Dutch Christian writer) spent four hours pondering over it where it hangs in the Hermitage Museum, St Petersburg.

Museum, St Petersburg. The father's embrace is warm, the son is repentant, the bystanders are

non-committal. Those are three simple phrases that I can see as I look on it.

In every translation of the Bible, the account of Luke 15:11-32 is entitled 'The Prodigal Son'. We read about a younger son who asked his father for his inheritance; he travelled far spending his inheritance on wild living; his friends dropped away when his money went; he reached desperation point and went to feed pigs; he came to his senses and returned to his father; his father welcomed him back as a son and a party was thrown to the disgust of the elder brother. In just a few phrases that is the story. The story of The Prodigal Son.

We have grown up with that story, we have grown up calling it, 'The Prodigal Son'. A few years ago, I read Henri Nouwen's book, 'The Return of the Prodigal Son', and he puts a completely different emphasis on it! (If anyone would like to borrow the book to read, please ask.) The emphasis is to call it 'The Welcoming Father'. When I first read that, I realised that it is a huge mind-shift. From 'The Prodigal Son' to 'The Welcoming Father', it is the difference between north and south, the difference between rich and poor. It turns our attention from the negative to the positive. From that time on, I have renamed the story, 'The Welcoming Father'.

Of course, we understand that being a parable there is a deep meaning behind it. It speaks of us and everyone else; the times when we are reckless, or far away from God. Yet, our God waits for us, loves us unconditionally and receives us with the warmest of welcomes when we decide to go back to Him. The Father says to us:

"Let's have a feast and celebrate. For this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found." So they began to celebrate. (Luke 15 verses 23-24)

Let us always remember that our God is always ready to receive us. Let's focus on the positives and the negatives will disappear.
