'Our Father who art in heaven.' This is the opening of one of the most well-known and well used Christian prayers. Jesus taught it to his disciples when they asked him how to pray. Known as the Lord's Prayer it encourages us to address God as 'our father' and to ask him for all our needs. The Lord's Prayer begins by praising God and recognising his holiness. We also pray: 'Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.' Christians believe that God is the creator of heaven and earth. As creator, he knows what is best for us and for our world. We pray that God's kingdom will come on earth; that his priorities will be our priorities. Jesus said that the most important thing is to love God and love our neighbour as we love ourselves. We can help that day come closer by living in a godly way.

During the period between Ascension and Pentecost from 26th May to 5th June, 'Thy kingdom come' an initiative of the Archbishop of Canterbury will encourage people across the world to pledge to pray. You are invited to join the global wave of prayer. The first 'Thy kingdom come' initiative was in May 2016 when 100,000 Christians pledged to pray. That number has grown year on year, and in 2021 Christians from 172 countries participated in praying for friends and family. This praying together has been across our diversity and our differences as every person, household and church are encouraged to pray in their own way.

Thy Kingdom Come at St Mary's Eaton Bray will start with a service of Holy Communion on 26th May, Ascension Day at 7.15pm. We will then be holding prayer times each morning at 10am and each evening at 6pm during the 10 days of 'Thy Kingdom Come'. These will be led by a variety of people and will last about 20 minutes. There will also be material to lead you on a self-guided prayer walk around the villages which you can do whenever you wish. Look out for the information on the noticeboard, on St Mary's Facebook page and in the weekly pew leaflet. You can also find out more about our plans on our website www.stmaryseatonbray.org.uk There will be some free prayer journals available in St Mary's church if you would like to come and collect one. Whether you have joined in 'Thy kingdom Come before or not, we invite you to take part- along with churches from over 80 different denominations and traditions in nearly 90% of countries around the world. Archbishop Justin Welby writes: 'In praying 'Thy Kingdom Come' we all commit to playing our part in the renewal of the nations and the transformation of communities.'' Grass & Hedge Cutting in the Villages

Now that the spring time has arrived the cutting of the grass verges has resumed. EPC requests that parishioners do not park on the grass verges as this causes damage to them and inconveniences the contractors. EPC reminds all parishioners whose hedges border

the pavements that they are required to ensure that their hedges are kept well-trimmed ensuring that the maximum pavement width is available for pedestrians, pushchair and wheelchair users.

Buckinghamshire Councillors

Cllr Chris Poll and Cllr Peter Brazier attended the March Council meeting and reported on the following matters;

- Cllr Poll has contacted the Planning Officer about Primrose Cottage in Dagnall. It appears
 that demolition has commenced on the property which has resulted in the property being
 deliberately damaged without planning permission.
- At the last Buckinghamshire Full Council meeting the budget for 2022/23 was agreed with the maximum Council Tax increase. Cllr Poll stated that funding from Central Government has been cut significantly.
- There is a Boundary and Parliamentary Commission Review taking place. This is likely to affect this area due to the growth in Aylesbury, Buckingham and Milton Keynes. The plan is to reduce 147 councillors to 98 councillors. This will lead to a planned revision to the County Council; hence more changes to ward boundaries. Ivinghoe Ward will stay the same but the number of councillors will reduce from three to two.


stars of the folk scene".





Stretching

Stretching, its benefits and when "stretching it out" may not be the right thing to do!

"If you don't use it, you lose it!" This is certainly very true where muscle flexibility and strength are concerned. We tend to lose flexibility as we age and by stretching, we can help to avoid injury and to produce mood-boosting chemicals in the brain, helping us both physically and mentally.

After exercise, focus on doing static, more classic stretch postures, holding them for up to 30 seconds to give the muscles time to lengthen and recover.

Constantly tight muscles? If you find that no matter how hard you try, some of your muscles are always tight then think again before just repeatedly trying to stretch them. They may be "hanging on" because of some form of muscle imbalance, causing odd movement patterns. An assessment from a Physiotherapist can enable you to do exercises to correct this, and **then** stretch the tightened muscle group(s).

If you feel that you might like a little more help to understand your body's flexibility, or lack of it, seek the advice of a Chartered Physiotherapist who can assess and guide you to a more flexible, less injury-prone you.

Litter Pickers in Edlesborough and Northall have been out in force over the past couple of weeks supporting the "Keep Britain Tidy" Great British Spring Clean. Edlesborough Cub Scouts started us off with an enthusiastic litter pick on and around the Green, along Cow Lane and around Townside and Slicketts Lane - which broke new ground for our Group. Well done and thank you for all your help. Hopefully they will have been surprised and taken aback at the amount of litter our village manages to generate! The more "mature" members of the Group have been busy around the Traveller's Rest area and along the main road between Edlesborough and Northall as well as clearing roads in Northall. We have covered large areas of the villages but sadly there is always lots to do. To date the wonderful "Men in Orange" from Streetscene have collected in the region of 35 bags of litter from us and we now have another 15 for them! Where does it all come from?? Well mainly from the local supermarkets. Much of our haul is cans and beer and wine bottles which people obviously dump because they don't want folk at home to know about their drinking habits. Northall is at just about the distance where people in cars finish their McDonald's meal, open their car windows, and turf it into the hedges rather than take it home. During lockdown, when McDonalds was closed, much of the litter magically disappeared from the hedgerows!!

On your behalf I would like to thank the band of intrepid pickers who turn out regularly and often put themselves in jeopardy collecting rubbish from the busy main roads. I know that the majority of people driving along the main road are not locals and won't see this, but if you do happen to drive past one of our band, please SLOW DOWN a bit and maybe open a window and yell a "Thank You". We do appreciate being appreciated!!

Recently we have been struggling with an influx of litter at the Memorial Hall Car Park end of the Green. The main problem appears to be that people use the two bins in the area until they are overflowing, and then the winds that we have been experiencing recently have been blowing the excess out onto the Green and car park. The Group are liaising with the Parish Council to try to find a solution to this problem. The bins are emptied on Fridays at the moment. If you find that the nearest bin is full when you are on the Green, it would be very helpful if you could either find a less full bin as there are quite a few, - or just take your litter home with you. This problem will probably get worse in lovely summer weather when picnics on the Green are popular....





Mary Seacole

The Mary Seacole Building, situated at Stoke Mandeville Hospital, is a prime example of using pioneers of the past to inspire a future generation. Used for educating nurses and midwives, and recently as a space for the NHS to carry out PPE training, the building opened in 2020.

Mary Seacole was born in Jamaica in 1805. This was during the period when many black people in the Caribbean were forced to work as slaves. Although Mary's mother was black, her father James Grant was a white Scottish army officer and Mary was born a 'free person'.

Mary's mother ran a lodging house, Blundell Hall, but she was also a healer and taught Mary many of her skills using traditional Jamaican medicines.



Mary travelled and then returned to Kingston and married Edwin Seacole in 1836, but Edwin became unwell so Mary nursed him until he died in 1844 closely followed by her mother's death. In the early 1850s Mary nursed victims of Cholera and Yellow Fever in Kingston and Panama. In 1853 she was invited by the medical authorities to supervise nursing services at the Kingston British Army's headquarters and she used Blundell Hall as a hospital.

The Crimean War (October 1853 - February 1856) was fought by a coalition including Britain, against the Russian Empire. Mary travelled to England and approached the British War Office, asking to be sent as an army nurse to the Crimea where she had heard there were poor medical facilities for wounded soldiers. She was refused. Undaunted, she funded her own trip to Crimea, where she established the British Hotel with Thomas Day, a relative of her husband. The hotel provided a place of respite for sick and recovering soldiers. At the time, Mary was as well-known in Britain as Florence Nightingale. Ms Nightingale's military hospital was situated hundreds of miles from the frontline in Scutari (now called Üsküdar, just outside the Turkish city of Istanbul). But Mary's hotel near Balaclava was much closer to the fighting. Mary was able to visit the battlefield, sometimes under fire, to nurse the wounded. She nursed sick soldiers so kindly that they called her 'Mother Seacole'.

When the war ended, Mary went back to Britain with very little money. Soldiers wrote letters to newspapers, praising what she had done. All those who admired her came to her aid, whether soldiers, generals or members of the Royal family. In 1857 a fund-raising gala was held for her over four nights on the banks of the River Thames. Over 80,000 people attended. The same year she published her autobiography, The Wonderful Adventures of Mrs Seacole in Many Lands, which became an instant bestseller.

Mary died in London in 1881. Unfortunately, she was then lost to history for around 100 years until nurses from the Caribbean visited her grave in North West London, where the local MP, Lord Clive Soley, promised to raise money for a statue for Mary. In 2004, Mary was voted the Greatest Black Briton. Lord Soley launched the campaign for a statue after leaving the House of Commons. In 2016, the statue was finally unveiled in the grounds of St Thomas' Hospital on London's Southbank.

Step 4

Heat a griddle pan until smoking hot and add the chicken and marinade to the pan.

Step 5

Keep everything moving over a high heat for about 5 mins using tongs until you get a nice charred effect. If your griddle pan is small you may need to do this in two batches.

Step 6

To check the chicken is cooked, find the thickest part and tear in half – if any part is still raw cook until done.

Step 7

Put the tortillas in the oven to heat up and serve with the cooked chicken, a bag of mixed salad and one 230g tub of fresh salsa.

The fox is an opportunist which has adapted perfectly to urban and suburban environments. It is a small member of the canine family, an omnivore that will eat practically anything. Its diet includes worms, beetles, berries, carrion, small rodents, rabbits and birds. Although an efficient predator, it is basically lazy and will not bother with elusive prey where scavenging might produce an easier meal. Larger items it takes and buries to insure against future hard times when food may be sparse.



Fox screams often wake and scare people, but they are no more than fox conversations. This is usually only problematic for short periods during autumn, when juveniles are dispersing, and in the mating season, between Christmas and early February.

Concern is sometimes expressed over "too many" foxes being present in an area. The population, like that of all carnivores, is self regulating and limited by the amount of food and territory available. Cubs born simply replace the number of adults lost since the previous breeding season. Foxes are loners, not pack animals, and the family usually disperses by late autumn.

Having said that, the most recent scientific research on foxes indicates the national fox population has fallen by 41% since 1995, so 'over-population' is less probable than ever.

Foxes will take livestock such as chickens, rabbits and guinea pigs if they are not properly secured, but are unlikely to threaten cats, dogs or humans, all of which are more than a match for an adult fox. The fact that urban foxes, in particular, often appear unafraid of humans has more to do with the fact they have learned how slowly humans can move, and how fast they can move if they have to! As foxes search for food, garden damage may occur, but

most damage can easily be prevented by using non-toxic chemical repellents which move foxes on humanely. Foxes are protected under a series of wildlife protection laws against poisoning, gassing, asphyxiating, maiming, stabbing, impaling, drowning, clubbing and most forms of snaring, with anyone carrying out such acts subject to 6 months imprisonment and/ or £5,000 fine per animal.

The fox is sometimes incorrectly referred to as vermin. It is not, and never has been categorised as such by the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA), the only body empowered to impose the term on a wild species.

FOR THE PLANET, AND FOR YOUR PURSE

The average family of four can save just over £60 per month by reducing their food waste. Whether you're doing the food shop or ordering a meal at a restaurant, every decision is an opportunity to save food from the bin. If you don't want a side salad, ask for your meal without it. If you won't make good use of the extra portion, don't be tempted by it. And if you can't finish your main, ask for a doggy bag! Food is made to be loved, so that's what we should do.

Today, as I write this, it's a cold, sunny April day. There's lots of colour in the garden, mainly bulbs, but shrubs and trees are coming into flower. There is a lovely prunus, with deep pink blossom, outside my kitchen window. The blackthorn and prune plum flowerings are nearly over. There have been a few bees around so I hope there will be fruit. My bluebells are already in flower though they will soon be hidden by cow parsley. There will be no cow parsley flowering down South End Lane this year thanks to Buckinghamshire Council trying to turn the verges into lawns by mowing them regularly. This is not the way to be eco-friendly!





Roadside verges can be a haven for wildlife. The lane is about 800 metres long so that gives about 1600 sqm of verge or flower meadow. I know I need to contact BC as highway maintenance is not under the remit of the Parish Council.

Thanks to Monty Don, I have discovered that my domesticated cowslips are primulas! They have now been flowering for a month. I'll pot some up for sale at St Mary's Spring Fair on May 7th. There will also be winter aconites, one of the few plants which flower in January and provide nectar for any bees around then. This year I'm planning to collect seed from my snowdrops to plant in the garden and St Mary's churchyard under the new native hedge. The seed pods need

to be collected when they change colour and planted straight away. I've always split and moved snowdrop clumps before. Collecting seeds will be less time consuming but the flowers will not appear for a couple of years.

I'm sowing vegetable seeds now. It always exciting to try something new so this year it's artichokes in a flower bed as the plants are too big for the vegetable plot. Many vegetables have attractive foliage which has given me other ideas, purple kale, carrots

and climbing beans, which have pretty flowers, to go into the borders. During the winter I bought kallettes, a cross between sprouts and kale, to eat which are delicious but expensive in the shops. I've bought some seed for the vegetable plot. I will also grow some outdoor cucumbers. The press is warning that fuel costs are deterring commercial growers from growing cucumbers this year.

My photos this month are primulas, and a pot with thalia daffodils and tulips. This is the third year I have left the bulbs in the pot. They must like all the fertiliser given to the summer bedding which is planted as they die back! The third picture is a robinia with its colourful new growth. *∝*Sally Taylor







In the days before social media came along the government decreed that there must be a forum where the Parish Council publicly and formally reviews its achievements and plans each year with its electors. It is known as the <u>Annual Parish Meeting</u>.

The meeting offers any electors in Edlesborough, Dagnall and Northall the opportunity to raise any issues. Unlike a normal Parish Council meeting, in this special meeting anyone is allowed to speak on any topic related to the parish.

Edlesborough Parish Council plans to take this a stage further. We would like to invite organisations based in the parish to join us and share their plans for the future and identify ways the Parish Council and/or electors might help to support them. They will have the opportunity to address all the participants in the meeting. It also provides the opportunity to meet with councillors informally.

Coupled with this EPC has launched a Small Grants Scheme to invite individuals and local groups/organisations to apply for funding. We will invite them to share their plans/progress of any Parish Council funded project. Similarly, we will invite representatives of existing organisations that have already received council funding to share their plans. We would also like to make you aware of new opportunities to participate in initiatives and funding from Buckinghamshire Council.

The law requires that a meeting be held each year and that both the chair and clerk of the council organise the meeting between March and 1st June. The chair of the council is required to chair the meeting. 



The White Horse Public House: The Green, Eaton Bray (courtesy of the Bedfordshire Archives)



The White Horse about 1920

The White Horse is the oldest known licensed premises in Eaton Bray. The earliest record of it is in 1810 when it was the venue for a court held by the Manor of Eaton Bray with the Members. The building was listed by the former Department of Environment in September 1980 as Grade II, of special interest. The department dated the construction to the early 19th century, raising the interesting possibility that it was purpose built as a

public house. The building is clad in colourwashed roughcast and has a hipped slate roof. It has been extended to the rear.

The White Horse played a minor role in a felony. In 1832 Samuel Heley of Edlesborough [Buckinghamshire] and George Woodcraft of Eaton Bray were accused of stealing ducks from Eaton Bray farmer William Rollings. He went to Heley's house and found one and a half ducks there, he also found two ducks at Woodcraft's house. He then went to the White Horse where he saw two ducks' heads to one of which he identified because it had a blemish on the top of the eye, though the eye had been knocked out. 30 year old Heley and 25 year old Woodcraft were both sentenced to six months' hard labour. Woodcraft seems to have stayed on the right side of the law but Heley went to prison twice more – in 1845 for stealing apples and pears, when he received fourteen days' hard labour and in 1876 when he served fourteen days' for breaching the Factory Acts.

The countywide licensing register of 1876 states that the owner was Annie Macnamara of Caddington, Lady of the Manor, she leased the property to Dunstable brewer Benjamin Bennett, meaning that the publican, James Bird, was the sub- tenant. By the time of the 1891 licensing register the pub was a free house, though still owned by the Macnamaras.

In 1898 the public house was put up for sale by auction by Arthur Macnamara. The sale particulars read as follows:

THE FULLY-LICENSED PUBLIC HOUSE

Known as

"THE WHITE HORSE"

Situate at the junction of the High Roads in the centre of EATON BRAY VILLAGE and within four miles of the towns of LEIGHTON BUZZARD and DUNSTABLE

Comprising

SUBSTANTIALLY-BUILT HOUSE,

containing

BAR, PARLOUR, CLUB ROOM, TAP ROOM AND EIGHT BED ROOMS;

Connected by covered way are

KITCHEN, WASH-HOUSE AND STORE;

THE OUTBUILDINGS

Include Stabling for Seven Horses and Barn, And in field PIGGERY AND HEN-HOUSE Together with GARDEN AND PADDOCK Containing 0a. 3r. 35p.

Let on a Yearly Michaelmas tenancy to Mr. HENRY SELLS at the low Rent of £30 per annum. THE POSITION OF THIS HOUSE RENDERS IT CAPABLE OF DOING A LARGE TRADE.

The particulars are annotated to show that the White Horse was bought by Berkhamsted [Hertfordshire] brewers Lock & Smith for £2,000. Perhaps the rent was not as low as the sale particulars suggested because in 1901 the publican, Henry Sells, became insolvent and his possessions were sold at auction. The pub was a favourite place for auction sales for the best part of a century, from at least 1858 until at least 1944.

The countywide licensing register of 1903 duly shows the White Horse owned by Lock & Smith. It is described as: "clean and in good repair" and was just 44 yards from the next licensed premises (The Five Bells); the property had one front, one side and one rear door.

The Rating and Valuation Act 1925 specified that every building and piece of land in the country was to be assessed to determine its rateable value. Like most of the county, Eaton Bray was assessed in 1927 and the valuer visiting the White Horse found that it was now owned and occupied by George Walter Shiers. The valuer commented: "Nice attractive looking place but looks larger outside than inside"

The property comprised a public bar ("good"), a tap room ("rather small"), a club room ("good, brick floor"), a kitchen, a sitting room and a large lobby with six bedrooms ("one a letting bedroom"), a dining room and a bathroom upstairs. A brick, weather-boarded and slated washhouse, a coal shed and a WC stood outside along with three brick, stone and slated stables ("disused") and a weather-boarded and sheet iron two bay open shed.

The takings were said to be $\pounds 12$ per week in winter and $\pounds 18$ in summer. Trade consisted of four barrels of beer per week ("?? Halves?"), eight to twelve dozen bottles of beer per week, six gallons of spirits per year and eighteen gallons of wine per year. The valuer observed: "Good stock in cellar. Been here just over a year". Evidently there was some uncertainty over the level of trade because another hand has written: "Mrs. Shiers says five barrels per month. Mr. Shiers in bed" and another person has written: "I think above trade rather underestimated". The observation was

made: "House faces small green, good position. Five Bells practically adjoins".

The owner also had an orchard of just over half an acre ("few trees") and a small plot with a weatherboarded and tiled meal house and store. In the orchard stood two weather-boarded and tiled piggeries and a weather-boarded and felt hen house ("good").

The White Horse is now the only public house in Eaton Bray – the rest having closed and either been demolished, become private houses or restaurants.

Who Do You Think You Are Has Cot Nothing on Me!

I started researching my family history when I retired a few years ago, little did I know what I would find.

My father was orphaned at the tender age of 8, his parents died within a couple of weeks of each other in November and December 1931. He and his 3 siblings became the responsibility of 3 much older step siblings who split them up and sent them off to boarding school or to live with family friends or relatives. Consequently, their contact with each other was sporadic and they certainly knew nothing of their closer family, aunts, uncles, cousins etc.

Imagine my surprise when I discovered that my paternal grandfather had 11 siblings!!! My father who sadly passed away some years ago, definitely knew nothing of these uncles and aunts and what a job I had ahead of me, researching all these relatives with the surname Smith – my maiden name.

After joining ancestry.co.uk I was able to make a lot of headway, my first discovery being 3 of my cousins who were brought up in Wales. Now for my first shock, one of these cousins had been in the RAF and having reached the end of his time there had gone on to create a business buying and refurbishing old aircraft. He subsequently bought a small airfield and became the owner of numerous planes, including Spitfires, that he had worked on and flew. Little did my Dad (a great James Bond fan) know that when he was watching Tomorrow Never Dies, it was his nephew flying one of the Spitfires that appeared in that film!

My next discovery was that my Father had two very glamorous cousins, one had been a Playboy Bunny Girl, the other a Page 3 Girl (who remembers them?) who married John Conteh, the boxer. So I now have a world champ in my family tree. Even more shocking was the fact that their family lived just five minutes from me at my previous address in Harrow. If only we'd known.

I have managed to make contact with all these cousins and second cousins, either spoken to them on the telephone, written to them or actually met them.

The last discovery I will go into now (though I could go on for pages more!) is a very sad one concerning another cousin of my father's, again someone he knew nothing of. As Leading Aircraftman in the RAF, this cousin was called upon to serve in World War II, captured and taken Prisoner of War by the Japanese.

Having become sick from starvation and torture, he, along with numerous other sick prisoners, both British and Dutch (a total of 549 men) were being transported to Java on board the prisoner of war ship Suez Maru. Almost one hundred sick Japanese were also on board.

On 29th November 1943, the Suez Maru was torpedoed by American submarine USS Bonefish, commanded by Cdr Tom Hogan, obviously unaware of who was on board. Hundreds were drowned and hundreds more, both allied and Japanese, managed to escape and were struggling in the water. A Japanese minesweeper managed to pick up Japanese survivors then slowly circled the British and Dutch who were still in the water struggling for survival and shot them with machine guns and rifles. Only one lived to tell the tale.

This tragedy is still, to this day, being discussed in Parliament. No official explanation or apology was ever offered.

A lush, well-maintained lawn is the perfect green foil for colourful herbaceous borders, a great setting for summer picnics and even a foraging ground for birds and other wildlife. We show you how to keep your lawn looking its best all year round. How to care for your lawn

Regularly mowing your lawn will help promote lush, green growth. Nip out weeds like dandelions when you see them to stop them competing with the grass and scatter grass seed into bare patches to get them growing again. Use stored rainwater and grey water to water your lawn in dry summers to stop it going brown. Spike the turf with a fork to aerate trampled areas to help bring them back to life, and rake out dead growth in autumn to maintain a lush, green sward.

Follow our care tips to improve the condition and appearance of your lawn, below.

Mow your lawn regularly

Cut your lawn at least once a week in summer and once every two weeks during spring, autumn and warm winters. Regular trimming encourages the roots to spread, which will help to fill gaps and block out weeds.

In summer, raise the cutting height of your mower to leave the lawn longer – around 5-10cm – as this will make it less prone to going brown in dry weather. Keep your mower well maintained and the blades sharp.

Water your lawn

Always water young lawns but don't over water as this can cause them to root shallowly and establish poorly. Where possible, use rainwater from a water butt or grey water from your bath or washing up bowl. Sprinklers are perfect for keeping lawns hydrated but they use a lot of mains water and are not permitted during a hosepipe ban. Don't worry if an established lawn goes brown, it's not dead. It will simply green up again when the rains come.

Weed your lawn

Plantains and dandelions have wide, flat leaves that can smother large areas of lawn and inhibit growth, although they are easy to remove using a hand trowel or daisy grubber. Yellow medick, buttercups and clover can also spread quickly through a lawn, so raking before you mow can help to lift them up into the mower blades, weakening and killing them off over time.



Try to avoid using weedkiller. Chemical weedkillers can be expensive and ultimately don't tackle poor grass health, which helps weeds to thrive. If you feel you need to use one, try a homemade weed killer instead.



Relieve compacted grass

Compacted ground prevents grass growing well and can lead to bare patches in the summer and mud baths in the winter. Relieve the compaction and aerate the soil by pushing a garden fork about 10cm deep into the soil every 10cm and gently rocking back and forth on the fork handle. The prongs open up the soil, allowing the roots to breathe and encouraging the grass to regrow.

On heavy ground, such as clay soils, brush sharp sand or fine horticultural grit into the holes to improve drainage and prevent further compaction.

Edge your lawn

Edging a lawn is the finishing touch to a neat, clipped lawn. Use a pair of long-handled shears to define the edge of your lawn, and stop the grass growing into borders. It instantly neatens your garden, creating a very satisfying finish. Where the lawn has grown into the border, use a spade or half-moon edger to reshape it and create a shallow 'moat' or install permanent edging that the grass can't cross.

Feed your lawn

To keep your lawn looking good you need to feed it regularly. If you have a large lawn, invest in a wheeled lawn feeder for a fast and accurate job. Apply fertiliser to grass when rain is forecast, so that it gets washed down to the roots and to stop it burning the leaf blades – an organic fertiliser will aid long term lawn health, over chemical alternatives. If it doesn't rain, water the fertiliser in with a hose or watering can. Your grass should look greener within a week. Lawns typically need a feed in spring and midsummer.

Fill bare lawn patches

Rather than letting bare patches spoil the look of your lawn it's easy to sow grass seed over the raked soil. Alternatively, make fillers from unused turf. When reshaping the lawn, collect up the strips and place them 5cm apart in a compost-filled seed tray, then grow them on outside or in a cold frame.

To replace the bare patch, cut out a square or rectangle around the area and, using a hand trowel, dig up the soil in the rectangle to whatever depth of soil your new turf strip is. Gently lay the turf, cut to fit, over the patch. Firm it down so that there are no gaps and your new turf is no higher or lower than your existing lawn.



Bedfordshire Lieutenancy New High Sheriff of Bedfordshire 2022-2023 Sworn in at Elstow Abbey

The new High Sheriff of Bedfordshire for 2022/2023 was installed yesterday, Sunday 3 April 2022. Lady Jane Clifford, who succeeds Eric Masih, was sworn in at a ceremony at Elstow Abbey.

Lady Clifford was born in Tanzania where her father, Sir George Paterson, was Attorney General. She was brought up in Sierra Leone, Ghana and Zambia as her family moved around with her father's work, latterly as Chief Justice. One of her earliest memories was accompanying her parents to the Assizes in a huge dug out canoe crossing the Zambezi River as there were no roads or bridges. In Ghana, Sir George worked with Kwame Nkrumah to ensure the smooth transition to independence. Jane finished her education in Dorset before moving to London to read Art History at the Courtauld Institute, London University. It was during this time that she met her future husband, Timothy.

Jane started out as a lecturer for the Workers' Educational Association in Manchester before becoming the art critic of the Daily Telegraph. At the same time, she began closely assisting Laura Ashley, finding and copying antique wallpaper and textile designs and writing books about furnishing and decorating houses for the company. After Laura's tragic death, Jane moved to Zoffany, another wallpaper and fabric manufacturer.

While her husband was directing the Manchester City Art Galleries, Jane set up and ran the events for the Friends. When Timothy moved to direct the National Galleries of Scotland, Jane performed a similar role for the Patrons. Supporting her husband's role took up a lot of her time and her career was put on hold. Timothy was knighted by Her Majesty in 2002. After their retirement in 2010 the Cliffords moved to Bedfordshire to be nearer London and their only daughter and grandson.

Jane has helped various charities to organise large scale events, including Help the Aged, Save the Children and the NSPCC. She is a keen bridge player and founded a book club which is still going strong after 30 years. They own a small house in Umbria in Italy; Jane speaks Italian and is a great Italophile.

Jane feels very honoured to have been nominated as High Sheriff for Bedfordshire for 2022-23 and will endeavour to serve the county to the best of her ability.

Initiatives and Objectives for 2022-2023

Jane is particularly excited to be holding office the year of HM The Queens's Platinum Jubilee and is keen to support the Queen's Green Canopy initiative, 'Plant a Tree for the Jubilee'. In the wake of the pandemic, the special importance of green spaces has become evident to help combat isolation, promote mental health and physical wellbeing and, by improving the surroundings in deprived areas, to prevent crime. With this in mind, Jane is keen to support charities that promote sport for all ages, rehabilitation and prevention of homelessness. In the last few months, the world has changed and we must now face the new and unexpected challenges presented by the crises in Ukraine and Afghanistan.

The Office of High Sheriff is an independent non-political Royal appointment for a single year. The origins of the Office date back to Saxon times, when the 'Shire Reeve' was responsible to the king for the maintenance of law and order within the shire, or county,

and for the collection and return of taxes due to the Crown. Today, there are 55 High Sheriffs serving the counties of England and Wales each year.

Whilst the duties of the role have evolved over time, supporting the Crown and the judiciary remain central elements of the role today. In addition, High Sheriffs actively lend support and encouragement to crime prevention agencies, the emergency services and to the voluntary sector. In recent years, High Sheriffs in many parts of England and Wales have been particularly active in encouraging crime reduction initiatives, especially amongst young people. Many High Sheriffs also assist Community Foundations and

local charities working with vulnerable and other people both in endorsing and helping to raise the profile of valuable work. The High Sheriffs' Association adopted National Crimebeat in recent years in response to specific areas of need. High Sheriffs receive no remuneration and no part of the expense of a High Sheriff's year falls on the public purse.




Dagnall Weather Station (AONB)

Weather Conditions for March 2022 Elevation: 450 ft - Latitude: 51° 50' 13" North - Longitude: 0° 33' 34" West

The month started unsettled, showery and on the colder side. Between the 6th and the 10th it was dry with frost on the morning of the 8th. After that, the temperature started to rise and became unsettled again. On the 16th, it rained from noon onwards, making it the wettest day of the month with 19mm of rainfall. From the 18th to the 28th, we had cold mornings and sunny days. The lowest temperature of the month came on the 21st with -1.7° c. It was the only time in March that the temperature dropped below zero and only then for six hours (01:00-07:00). There followed a five day stretch with temperatures reaching above 18° - achieving 19.9°c on the 23rd - which felt like spring turning into summer. We ended March with a few light showers and a rapidly falling temperature. The monthly rain was spot on average. Overall, it was warmer than normal and largely sunny with a mean temperature of 8° c.

Andrew and I were privileged to go on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land recently and to see for ourselves where Jesus walked, talked, taught and lived His life.

One of the highlight's for me was when the group boarded a fishing vessel and we sailed into the middle of Lake Galilee admiring the beautiful lake and surrounding mountains.

Only the previous day when travelling to our hotel, we saw that Lake Galilee was very stormy and it reminded me of the story of Jesus in the boat when the storm arose and as he slept the disciples had to cope with the raging storm and were in fear of their lives.

Jesus stood up in the boat and said to the disciples, "Quiet! Be still!" and the wind and waves obeyed him.

The next day as we sailed on the boat, the water was like a mill pond, perfectly still. Much of Jesus' ministry takes place in and around the lake and even on the lake. The first disciples are called and the Gospels conclude with events by the lake in John 21 when Jesus calls the disciples to him because he wants to cook them breakfast.

As we sailed all these stories came flooding back reminding us along with my fellow colleague officers, that we had been called by God into ministry, not as dramatically as those first disciples, but remembering God's faithfulness through the last forty years of ministry.

When the boat came to a standstill all we could hear was the water lapping up against the side of the boat. A very special moment but in the silence each one of us were aware of God's presence.

We sang these words together:-

- When in the hush of eventide Cool waters touched his feet, Was it a hymn of Calvary's road He heard the waves repeat. (Catherine Baird)
- When sunrise dyed the lovely deeps and sparkled in his hair,
 O did the light rays seem to say: A crown of thorns he'll wear?
- 4. But when the winds triumphantly swept from the open plain, The Master surely heard the song: The Lord shall live again!
