Pancake Day is traditionally known as Shrove Tuesday, the day on which all the fat, cream and rich foods had to be used up before Lent. Shrove Tuesday always falls 47 days before Easter. The name 'shrove' comes from the Old English word 'shrive' meaning to confess. On Shrove Tuesday in the Middle Ages, people used to go to church to confess their sins so that they were forgiven before the season of Lent began. It was also the last chance to indulge in foods not allowed in Lent, so pancakes were made to use up the fat, butter and eggs which were forbidden during Lent.

The story goes that in Olney in 1445 a woman heard the Shriving Bell ringing whilst she was still making pancakes. She ran to church in her apron, still clutching her frying pan. And so the tradition of pancake races began! This year the Churches Together in Eaton Bray and Edlesborough will be celebrating Shrove Tuesday with an evening of Pancakes and Prayer. It will take place at Eaton Bray Methodist church on 21st February from 6.30pm and all are welcome. There is no charge for the pancakes, but there will be a collection for the work of Christian Aid amongst the world's most deprived communities. On Ash Wednesday, 22nd February, there will be a service in St Mary's at 10am. This will be Holy Communion with the imposition of ashes (making the sign of the cross in ash on people's foreheads). The ashes are a further reminder that Lent is a season of confession, reflection and preparation before the festival of Easter.

During Lent, the North Chilterns Group will be meeting on Tuesday evenings for an 'Alphabet of Christianity'! This is an opportunity to explore the Christian faith, whether you are a practising Christian or you just want to know more. Bring those questions you have been wanting to ask for ages, but perhaps have felt they are really something you 'should know', or have forgotten. Bring an open mind and a willingness to learn and enjoy yourself. Bring a bible if you have one... The meetings are all at Totternhoe Church Hall, Church Road, Totternhoe, LU6 1RH. We will be starting with refreshments at 7.30pm for 7.45pm, and concluding with a short act of worship, ending by 9pm. The dates are February 28th, March 7th, 14th, 21st and 28th.







John has also made it a point of knowing some of the history, going back to the Enclosure Acts, that helped shape parts of the village. In addition, John also has developed expertise, in many other council responsibilities, that helps to guide us as the role of the council develops.

Speedwatch & EDaN Traffic Management

Traffic Calming

Buckinghamshire Council have now agreed to allow the installation of the MVAS supporting posts to be installed across the Parish. Once installed this will enable EPC to deploy the three Mobile Vehicle Activated Signs (MVAS) across the parish.

The purpose of these signs is to remind drivers of the speed limit and to encourage them to reduce their speed through our villages. Data collected by the signs can also be used as evidence for other traffic calming measures.



Ivinghoe Freight Strategy - Update



EPC have received the following update from Buckinghamshire Council:
"In order to get the proposed zone restricting

HGV movements to those which have a business reason to be there, encouraging through traffic to use more appropriate routes around the area, the implementation has been divided into two phases. Phase 1 covers the installation of signage around the zone making the 7.5 tonne environmental traffic regulation order restricting HGV traffic with exception for local access legal. The installation although extensive is relatively straight forward using standard compliant signs on existing or new poles as needed. The TfB construction team have

completed the tender process for the works and a contractor has been appointed. We are waiting on

give us the planned start date and the completion timeline. In the meantime it is reasonable to suggest that phase 1 is expected to be completed by the end of February 2023.

Phase 2 will cover the advance notice signage on key routes around the zone to alert drivers and operators about the restriction enabling them to avoid breaching the order and following more suitable roads. The signage is more bespoke and includes the positioning in our neighbouring Central Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire authorities. The TfB design team are finalising the drawing and development work over the next few weeks. The plan is to give phase 1 time to operate in order to solicit feedback from the public to help identify the locations where the advance notice signs can be most effective to minimise avoidable breaches of the zone. The timeline for these works is more difficult to establish at this stage and we must consider the potential impact of the upcoming change of the highways contract.

We are continuing to monitor progress through the implementation phase and will look at issuing a press release as the phase I installation gets underway. Details on the scheme can be found on the council website www.buckinghamshire.gov. uk/parking-roads-and-transport/road-freight-and-heavy-goods-vehicles-hgvs/ivinghoe-freight-zone/"



Nigel's Thoughts

Dear Friends,

As I write it has grown dark early outside after a cloudy and wintry day of squally rain.

It is said that there are just four seasons in the year. To me, February is situated in the least encouraging of them all. We have become used to changing weather patterns, and to weather which we describe as unseasonable. Undoubtedly the world's changing climate is the cause of this. We should therefore do all that we can to reduce the harm that we are causing to the rhythms by which our fragile home, planet earth, is sustained. Much more than our weather is dependent on this - not least the survival of the natural world, species that are becoming endangered, and the threatening of lives and livelihoods across whole continents.

If all this, alongside our weather at this time of year, threatens to strike at the optimism and enthusiasm you would like to find within, let me share with you a concept that I stumbled across recently and I'm finding helpful,.

If you put '72 seasons in the year' into a search engine you will discover the year, divided into that many 'seasons' of around five days each. This is based upon an

ancient Japanese calendar. It enables us to pay attention to nature and to the passing of the year, as we break down our four seasons into shorter and more manageable periods of time. It is then possible to notice the minute changes that would otherwise pass us by, and find encouragement.

I recommend you try this for yourself. It is certainly helpful to focus on the detail of what is happening all around us, rather than just waiting for winter (or any other season) to pass.

Perhaps you will discover that God, who loves and treasures all that he has made holds you uniquely, whatever the season of the year or the season in your heart. He knows, understands and is always near, never fear.

Dasy Banana Pancakes

By Esther Clark courtesy of BBC goodfood

Makes 12 pancakes

Turn overripe, blackened bananas into sweet and fluffy Americanstyle pancakes. Serve with syrup and crunchy, toasted pecan nuts as a delicious brunch treat.

Ingredients

350g self-raising flour

1 tsp baking powder

2 very ripe bananas

2 medium eggs

1 tsp vanilla extract

250ml whole milk

butter, for frying

To serve

2 just ripe bananas, sliced maple syrup (optional) pecan halves, toasted and roughly chopped

(optional) **Method**

Step 1 - Sieve the flour, baking powder and a generous pinch of salt into a large bowl. In



a separate mixing bowl, mash the very ripe bananas with a fork until smooth, then whisk in the eggs, vanilla extract and milk. Make a well in the centre of the dry ingredients, tip in the wet ingredients and swiftly whisk together to create a smooth, silky batter.

Step 2 - Heat a little knob of butter in a large non-stick pan over a medium heat. Add 2-3 tbsp of the batter to the pan and cook for several minutes, or until small bubbles start appearing on the surface. Flip the pancake over and cook for 1-2 mins on the other side. Repeat with the remaining batter, keeping the pancakes warm in a low oven.

Step 3 - Stack the pancakes on plates and top with the banana slices, a glug of sticky maple syrup and a handful of pecan nuts, if you like.

Greamy Chocolate Mousse

Courtesy of Tesco Real Food

Serves 2

This easy chocolate mousse recipe is perfect for an indulgent dinner for two, or rustle up as part of your Valentine's Day meal.

Ingredients

85g dark chocolate (70% cocoa solids)

6 strawberries

100ml whole milk

90g full-fat Greek yogurt

1 tbsp maple syrup

40g pomegranate seeds

Method

Break the chocolate into a heatproof bowl and melt over a small pan of barely simmering water, stirring constantly.



Dip each of the strawberries into the melted chocolate and put on a plate or baking sheet lined with nonstick baking paper.

Add the milk to the remaining melted chocolate and stir over the simmering water until combined.

Remove from the heat and stir in the yogurt and maple syrup until smooth. Pour into 2 dessert glasses or bowls.

Put the chocolate mousses and chocolate-covered strawberries in the fridge for at least 2 hours to set. When ready to serve, remove from the fridge and garnish the mousses with the pomegranate seeds and the chocolate-dipped strawberries.

Down the Lane

A new year and the bulbs are emerging! The Violas in my tubs are covered in blooms. Like many of the weeds, they weren't affected by the snow and cold weather. Some of the evergreen shrubs are looking rather sad. Their leaves have fallen off, whereas a year ago they were a good source of foliage for flower arranging. I shall have to wait and see if there is new growth in the spring or whether they have to be replaced. The devastation has come as a shock after several mild winters.

I left my Pelargoniums in the greenhouse and they have all died. At least I hadn't spent time potting them up and then losing them! I can now have fun buying new plants and working out a colour scheme. There is a such wide range of colours and types these days. If I start early they will be well established by the end of May when they can go outside.

Last autumn saw a bumper crop of nuts, seeds and berries after the excellent growing weather of the spring. Birds enjoyed the Crab Apples and fruit on the Prunus tree (it rarely has more than a few berries but was laden). When it was very cold, one clever bird, its feathers so puffed out I couldn't recognise the species, was bouncing on to verbena heads to knock off the seeds and then eating the seeds from the ground as it was too heavy to land on the plant.

Some of my favourite plants are shy and retiring, if you can describe plants that way. Algerian Winter Iris grows up against the garage wall where it is very dry under the eaves and catches some winter sun. It came from my mother's garden in Somerset and flowers continuously for a month although individual flowers only last for 3 or 4 days. I love having the flowers in the house; just a small vase with Winter Jasmine and Hazelnut catkins.

Moor End Farmhouse July 2012

Moor End Farmhouse is, today, hidden behind a modern development in the High Street. It was listed by the former Department of Environment in September 1980 as Grade II, of special interest. The department dated the building to the 17th century "with later additions". The front wing is timber framed with brick infill panels. The rear wing is in brick with clunch ashlar. The linking wing is of similar construction. The house comprises two storeys and attics beneath a modern tiled roof.

The farm was part of the Manor of Eaton Bray which, by the late 19th century was in the hands of the Macnamara family. In 1881 the tenants were Charles and John Hedges. By 1897 the tenant was William Bates. He was dead by 1903 because Kelly's Directory for that year, as for 1906, lists the tenant as the executors of William Bates. The Pedley Settled Estates were put up for auction in 1915 by Arthur Macnamara's executors. The sale particulars for Moor End Farm read as follows:

adjoining, timber-built and thatched and tiled, of Two Barns, Cow House, Stabling, Corn Store, cattle Sheds, Open Waggon, Shed, Piggery and Fold and Rickyards together with the several Enclosures of


Pasture and Arable Land

The land comprised: 9 acres, 32 poles of pasture; 2 roods of garden; a pond of 28 poles; 105 acres, 2 roods, 8 poles of arable with the remaining area being buildings, "Green Baulk", and "Sheep Wash". Bedfordshire County Council leased the garden for £1 per annum and the remainder was leased by Fred Bates for £183/10/- per annum. "This Lot is Sold subject to the right of the Parishioners of Eaton Bray to use the Sheep Wash".

The Lot was withdrawn. Fred Bates is given as occupier in Kelly's Directory for 1910, 1914, 1920 and 1924. In 1917 and 1918 the farm was compulsorily hired by Bedfordshire County Council. This was because the U-Boat campaign by Germany was taking such a toll on British shipping that it was feared that the country might be starved into surrender. As a panic measure the government instructed County Agricultural Executive Committees to order farmers to break up meadow and pasture to plant arable crops which is what happened in this case. Naturally most of these crops failed or brought in small yields but the introduction of the convoy system by the Admiralty saw the end of the U-Boat menace.

The Rating and Valuation Act 1925 specified that every building and piece of land in the country was to be assessed to determine its rateable value. Eaton Bray, like most of the county, was assessed in 1927 and the valuer visiting Moor End Farm found that it was owned by the executors of W. H. Wallace, he had presumably bought the Farm from the Pedley Estates. His tenant, Fred Bates had paid rent of £202 per annum since 1906, though this is annotated "now £101/10 fixed in 1916" presumably the date at which Wallace bought it.

The reason for the dramatic decline in rent was that the former 122 acres had been reduced to 52. The valuer commented: "Nice house, very good Homestead". Kelly's Directory for 1928, 1931, 1936 and, the last directory for the county, 1940, all give the tenant as Thomas Gurney. In 1944 the arable land was sold following the death of Mrs. Wallace.

Moneybury Hill Archaeological Barrow

Well preserved Bronze Age Bell Barrow. The following is taken from the English Heritage scheduled monument description:

The monument includes a bell barrow situated on the west-facing escarpment of Moneybury Hill. The barrow mound survives as a well-defined roughly circular mound 25m in diameter and stands up to 3m high on its west side and 2m high on its east. The top of the mound has been disturbed at some time in the distant past so that it is now concave to a



depth of 0.4m. Surrounding the central mound is a sloping berm or platform 2.5m wide which separates the edge of the mound from the ditch; such a berm is characteristic of this class of monument. A surrounding ditch, from which the material was quarried to construct the mound, survives as an earthwork around the north and south sides only where it averages 4m wide and 0.3m deep; elsewhere it is buried and overlain with modern trackways but survives as a buried feature of similar width.

Bell barrows, the most visually impressive form of round barrow, are funerary monuments dating to the early and middle Bronze Age, with most examples belonging to the period 1600-1300 bc. They occur either in isolation or in round barrow cemeteries and were constructed as single or multiple mounds covering burials, often in pits, and surrounded by an enclosure ditch. The burials are frequently accompanied by weapons, personal ornaments, and pottery and appear to be those of aristocratic individuals, usually men. Bell barrows (particularly multiple barrows) are rare nationally, with less than 250 known examples, most of which are in Wessex. Their richness in terms of grave goods provides evidence for chronological and cultural links amongst early prehistoric communities over most of southern and eastern England as well as providing an insight into their beliefs and social organisation. As a particularly rare form of round barrow, all identified bell barrows would normally be considered to be of national importance.

Despite some disturbance of the central area of the barrow mound, most of the Moneybury bell barrow survives intact. There is also potential for the recovery of environmental material, relating to the landscape in which the monument was

constructed, from both the old land surface sealed beneath the mound and from the ditch fill.

Grand Union Canal

The Grand Union Canal was once one of the most important waterways in Britain, carrying goods between London and Birmingham. The canal travels 137 miles (220 km) in total, with 166 locks. After the introduction of the railway and lorries, the waters



were no longer needed for business and commercial trade stopped completely in the 1970s.

Today, the canal is a peaceful waterway carrying pleasure boats gently downstream. Joggers, cyclists and walkers enjoy the well-maintained tow path along its banks. The canal is a haven for wildlife, too.

Icknield Way

The 110 mile long Icknield Way is an ancient road which runs along the side of the Downs, its history dating back 6,500 years. Connecting East Anglia to important sites such as Avebury it was a well-used road, and since prehistoric times, farmers, soldiers, Saxon warlords and medieval drovers have walked or ridden along it. When the rain fell onto the Downs, it seeped



through the hills and emerged as springs at the edge of the Chiltern hills lower down. These springs provided water for people and their animals.

London Gliding Club / Strip Lynchetts

The club was inaugurated in 1930. In 1939 Geoffrey Stephenson was the first person to glide across the Channel when he flew from Dunstable to France. The clubhouse and hangar form a listed building. During the Second World War, the club was used as a prisoner of war camp. Strip Lynchets on your left, to the north of the bridleway, are cultivation terraces or strip lynchets. They



are believed to be medieval. They would have made cultivation easier and improved drainage for vines or for crops planted after ploughing.

Dunstable Downs

With breathtaking views, scheduled monuments to explore, and several Sites of Special



Scientific Interest (SSSI), Dunstable Downs is a fantastic place to spend some time. Situated within the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, it is the highest point in Bedfordshire. There are lots of footpaths to explore across the chalk grasslands, including several circular walks. The site is managed by the National Trust and there is a visitor centre.

Pitstone Hill

Pitstone Hill is a chalk grassland with small areas of woodland and scrub. As you explore the reserve, which has been designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest, you can see lots of rare plant life including the nationally-scarce pasque flower and field fleawort. At least 26 species of butterfly have been recorded here and you can also see birds such as skylarks, meadow pipits, and willow warblers.



Sundon Hills Country Park

The Smithcombe, Sharpenhoe and Sundhon Hills cover 86 hectares in Bedfordshire. With thick forests, gentle slopes and wildflowers, the area is a lovely place to cycle, hike and enjoy a picnic. The hills make up part of the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and are considered a Site of Special Scientific Interest.

Here, you will find plenty of interesting plants and wildlife. As the hills are made mostly of unimproved chalk grassland, there are lots of rare species. Look out for rabbits too!







One, Zoo, Three...

Zookeepers undertake the annual stocktake at Whipsnade Zoo

On 5th January, ZSL Whipsnade Zoo's keepers began the mammoth task of counting every animal for their annual stocktake. Home to more than 10,000 animals, zookeepers at the UK's largest Zoo gathered their clipboards and calculators, to take stock of each invertebrate, bird, fish, mammal, reptile and amphibian.

2022 saw a number of new arrivals to Whipsnade Zoo, all of which were recorded for the first time during the yearly count; in August, the conservation Zoo celebrated the birth of Endangered Asian elephant calf, Nang Phaya, while November's Remembrance Day saw the birth of Wilfred, a reticulated giraffe calf named after war poet Wilfred Owen.

Elsewhere, a two-month-old, Critically Endangered, Visayan warty piglet (Sus cebifrons) was also added to the Zoo's official records, as well as hundreds of Critically Endangered and Extinct-in-the-Wild freshwater fish, bred at the Zoo's Aquarium and freshwater conservation breeding centre.

A Neolithic flint flake and axe were found in allotments in Dagnall, along with Roman and medieval pottery. Mesolithic, Neolithic and Bronze Age flints were found in fieldwalking near the Washbrook

Stream with Roman tile, quern fragments and pottery. A pit of unknown, but possibly prehistoric or Roman date was found in the Aylesbury-Buncefield pipeline excavation, which passed through this parish. Iron Age and Roman ditches, pits and pottery were also found. A possible enclosure at Coombe Bottom is known from an aerial photograph, but again the date is uncertain. Roman

finds are also known from Coldharbour, where cinerary urns were found in the nineteenth century and from fieldwalking near the Tring Road, where Saxon artefacts were also found. A possible Saxon cemetery was found in the nineteenth century at Maylands in Dagnall.

A possible medieval chapel is recorded in the field-name Chapel Dell, and there are also historical records for its presence in the thirteenth to sixteenth centuries. Documents record the presence of a watermill from the eleventh century in Edlesborough, separate manors at Dagnall

and Bowell's manor and a moat at Church Farm. There are also lots of earthworks of the medieval period, such as the moat and hollow-way at Manor Farm, the moat at Butler's Farm that was infilled in the nineteenth century, one at Peppiatt's Farm associated with a fishpond, two fishponds at Church Farm and medieval field lynchets near the church. Archaeologists observed a test-pit inside St Mary's church, which revealed several skulls and medieval pottery, tile and stone. The oldest building is the church, with a

thirteenth century nave aisles and chancel, fourteenth century tower and windows and fifteenth century north chapel and porches. It sits on a natural mound.

There are many listed buildings in Edlesborough, which date to the sixteenth, seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. Charity Farm is particularly interesting as it is a Wealden type house that is more commonly found in Kent. Church Farm has a fifteenth to sixteenth century tithe barn and an eighteenth century dovecote. Ivy Cottage dates to the early nineteenth century but appears to

incorporate a medieval cruck truss. 51 The Green has two medieval bays with a sixteenth to seventeenth century cross-wing.

Dagnall Hamlet was a post-medieval farmstead that is now deserted. At Dagnall Hall Farm a field boundary detected in field survey may date to this period too. The church and mission at Dagnall was built in the nineteenth century and there are surviving post-medieval stocks there as well. There is a record of a nineteenth to twentieth century steam-mill in Edlesborough, as well as an eighteenth to nineteenth century windmill recorded on historic maps and a watermill of similar date near Ivinghoe church. Dagnall Brewery was established in the early twentieth century, though it was demolished in the 1960s/70s.

Seen from a distance, the Magpie (pica pica) appears to be a simple two-tone, black and white bird. However, the black plumage is more subtle in colour than it first appears, with a blue-green iridescent sheen evident at close range. In the open it flies, rising awkwardly, with quick flaps and glides - like a ragged kite. Among trees the species moves confidently, reflecting its agility. On the ground the tail is often held high as the bird 'kangaroo-hops' along. The raucous, cackling, call is given frequently, reflecting the intensely competitive and social nature of this species. Young Magpies have a washed-out appearance and short, stubby tails.

For many people the Magpie is a villain, responsible for the widespread decline of songbirds. Research examining the question of whether Magpies have been responsible for songbird decline has failed to find any evidence to support the notion that they are to blame. It is true that while Magpie numbers have tended to increase, those of many of our songbird species have declined. These increases and decreases have occurred over different time periods and in different parts of the country, which suggests that the general patterns are a coincidence and not cause-and-effect.

At a local level, Magpies can sometimes be a problem for nesting birds; in fact, in many gardens they are probably the second most important predator after the domestic cat. Mind you, in the absence of wild mammals like the Weasel, many garden birds probably may still suffer lower levels of nest predation than they would experience in natural woodlands and farmland hedgerows.

Like other members of the Crow family, Magpies can be very interesting to watch. They are social birds with a degree of intelligence that has enabled them to adapt to a changing environment. You only need look at the number of Magpie nests alongside many of our new road networks to see how they have learned to exploit the carcasses of animals killed by road traffic.



November: The first half of the month was very mild. Following a nine-day unsettled period, we had a short dry spell before it turned unsettled again and cooler. With a high temperature of 16.4° c and a mean temperature of 9.4° c, it was an unusually warm month. It was also the wettest month of the year with rain on 25 days. There was 139.4mm of rainfall, which was 179% of the 14 year average for November. That compares to last year's November total of 23mm.



December: The month started cold and settled. But, on the evening of the 10th, the temperature dropped to below zero and was the start of a very cold snap. It started to snow late on Sunday the 11th, so we woke up on Monday morning to a blanket of snow. The temperature stayed below zero for almost six days and dropped to -10.6°c on the 15th. On the 18th, the thaw had set in with spells of rain. The temperature then rose into the teens, which was warm for December.

The blank columns on the next chart relate to days when the temperature and humidity sensors were giving out spurious readings. They've since been fixed and are back to normal.



2022 Highlights: A year of records. It was a much drier year, starting in January with only 22.4mm of rain which was only 29% of the Dagnall monthly average. The yearly total was 719.8mm, which compares to 811mm in 2021. The summer brought record high temperatures, with a peak of 39.3°c on the 19th of July. December brought us a very cold snap and snow that lasted for more than a week, with a low of -10.6°c. The Met Office says this is likely to become the norm.
