It doesn't seem that long ago that we were all preparing for Christmas, but the Church year is gearing itself for moving into the season of Lent, the time of year when we reflect on our own relationships with God. Many of us choose something to give up during Lent, by denying ourselves something, we are able to remind ourselves of all the good things that we are able to enjoy. By giving things up, we are also able to remember that in life we need to focus our attention on spiritual, rather than material, things. Many of us also choose to take something up during Lent instead, such as praying the Lord's Prayer every day, reading the Bible more, or devoting a bit more time in our busy lives to God during the week. Whatever it is that we choose to do, whether we choose to give or take something up, the season of Lent is a good time for us to recharge our spiritual batteries and to reconnect ourselves with God.

In our daily lives, it can sometimes be a struggle to find and make time for God. Much of us have many things to do, whether looking after loved ones and family, or going to work, or whatever it may be. The Church has, for many centuries, encouraged those who feel called to a life of prayer and the religious life to move away from the hectic world to find time to pray and worship from the quietness of the cloister. But we are not all monks and nuns and find ourselves in the midst of busy lives! The calling to a religious life is a special calling, but we can still be inspired by those living the monastic life to devote a small part of our daily lives, however small, to God.

This year, the North Chiltern Group of Churches (of which St. Mary's Eaton Bray and All Saints' Dagnall are a part) is running a Lent Course which will be exploring the world of another kind of spiritual being devoted to the praise and worship of God: the angels. Angels are very dear to my heart. As well as being a priest in the Church of England and an Associate Minister at St. Mary's, I also engage in academic research and the study of angels in Judaism, Christianity and Islam has been a focus of my work for a number of years.

Angels are fascinating creations of God and they appear in many guises: as beings announcing the news of the birth of a special, just as we remembered over Christmas in the appearance of Gabriel to Mary in the story of Jesus's birth; as beings with strange supernatural features worshipping God in heaven, as we can see in the prophecies of Isaiah and Ezekiel; and as beings who explain the mysteries of heaven, which we can see Gabriel doing in the visions of heaven that the prophet Daniel had. During the Lent Course we will be exploring many of these aspects of angels in the Bible, but we will also be exploring the way in which we can model our own spirituality on the life and worship of angels. I am really looking forward to being able to share some of my own insights into the depictions of angels in the Bible.

The course will be running on Tuesdays from 20th February – 19th March 2024 in Kensworth Church Hall, starting at 7.30pm and lasting around 75 minutes. We begin with tea, coffee and biscuits and end with a short period of prayer. Please do consider coming along, it would be great to see you there.

### Speeding in the Parish

Many parishioners have concerns over the speed at which vehicles travel through our villages.

EPC is aware of parishioners concerns and would like to share information about what it is doing to help combat this and what parishioners can do to support EPC and the Parish.

Once a concern has been raised about speeding various things come into play. The escalation procedure is:

- Install a Movable Vehicle Activated Sign (MVAS flashing 30) or a Speed Indicating Device (SID smiley face indicator)
- Speedwatch
- · Police Camera Van
- Re-engineer the road to reduce speed.

A reminder to those that speed. Please do not ignore the MVAS/SID, and/ or Speedwatch camera and/or the Police Camera Van. They are there for a reason.

### **SID (Speed Indicating Device)**

There are two SID devices in the Parish. One in Northall on the Leighton Road as drivers enter the 30mph section of the Leighton Road. The second is located on the Dunstable Road in Dagnall.

The purpose of SID is to educate drivers about the speed limit of the road they are driving on.



This is primarily an educational tool. Apart from advising you of either the speed limit or the speed that you are travelling at, the devices are counting vehicles, their speed, etc. and the statistics can be used by the police to instigate the use of the camera van. No actual data is captured of vehicle registration numbers, etc.

EPC has three MVAS devices that can be used at fourteen approved locations across Edlesborough, Dagnall and Northall. The locations are shown on the next page.





Of course, the meanings and traditions associated with flowers have changed over time, and culture also plays a part, with the assigned meanings and messages. Florists understand the language and numbers of flowers. They carefully handcraft displays of the chosen blooms to convey that personal expression. So, for "love" or "admiration " on St. Valentine's Day or other occasions maybe Red Roses are not the only option, as beautiful as they are. ∠Jo Reay

### **Mustard Salmon with Beetroot and Lentils**

Cook a delicious glutenfree dinner in 20 minutes. Our Scandi-style salmon is served with beetroot, lentils, pumpkin seeds. capers, mustard and dill.

### **Ingredients**

2 tbsp olive oil

1 tbsp wholegrain mustard

½ tsp honey

2 salmon fillets

250g pouch ready-cooked puy lentils

250g ready-cooked beetroot, cut into wedges

2 tbsp crème fraîche

1 small pack dill, roughly chopped

1-2 tbsp capers

½ lemon, zested, cut into 2 wedges to serve 2 tbsp pumpkin seeds, toasted

rocket, to serve (optional)



#### Method

Step 1 - Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Mix together 1 tbsp oil, the mustard, honey and some seasoning. Put the salmon fillets on a baking tray and spread the honey and mustard mixture all over. Tip the lentils and beetroot into a casserole

dish, toss with the remaining oil and season well. Put both in the oven for 10 mins until the salmon is cooked through.

Step 2 - Stir the crème fraîche, dill, capers and lemon zest through the lentils. Serve alongside the salmon with the pumpkin seeds scattered over and lemon wedges for squeezing, with a rocket salad on the side, if you like.

### **Self-Saucing Jaffa Pudding**

This intense chocolate orange sponge bake with thick sauce is about as indulgent as a good pudding gets.

### **Ingredients**

100g butter, melted, plus a little extra for the dish

250g self-raising flour

140g caster sugar

50g cocoa

1 tsp baking powder

zest and juice 1 orange

3 eggs

150ml milk

chocolate, broken into chunks

single cream or ice cream, to serve

For the sauce

200g light muscovado sugar

25g cocoa

### Method

Step 1 - Butter a 2-litre baking dish and heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Put the kettle on. Put the flour, caster sugar, 50g

cocoa, baking powder, orange zest and a pinch of salt in a large mixing bowl. Whisk together the orange juice and any pulp left in the juicer, the eggs, melted butter and milk, then pour onto the dry ingredients and mix together until smooth. Stir in the chocolate chunks and scrape everything into the baking dish.

Step 2 - Mix 300ml boiling water from the kettle with the sugar and cocoa for the sauce, then pour this all over the pudding batter don't worry, it will look very strange at this stage! Bake on the middle shelf of the oven 100g orange milk chocolate or milk for 30 mins until the surface looks firm, risen and crisp. As you scoop spoonfuls into

serving bowls, you should find a glossy. rich chocolate underneath sauce sponge. Eat the immediately with vanilla ice cream or single cream.



### Book Review

### The Parisian by Isabella Hammad

You could call Isabella Hammad's 550-page novel a sprawling, sweeping historical epic. It does chart a turbulent period of Palestinian history, from the end of the Ottoman empire and the First World War, through British rule and mass immigration of Jews as the Second World War looms. But this is also a highly personal story, based on Hammad's own great-grandfather. The Parisian of the title is Midhat, whom we meet as a young man travelling to

Montpellier and Paris to train as a doctor, and journey with through to middle age, marriage and familial duty at his family's home town of Nablus in Palestine.

Throughout, Hammad has an exquisite control on her subject: this is precise writing, measured, and careful. It doesn't sprawl; it pins. And it doesn't get swept up in generalisations or making characters mouthpieces for the march of history; rather, her detail makes you feel the homes and cities she takes us to, and the people that inhabit them, are as multifaceted and mysterious as those of real life. Hammad's presentation of a politically contentious time, the after-effects of which are still felt today, is also complex and demandingly layered – as it should be.

All of which would be an achievement for any novelist, but for a debut by a 27-year-old, it's quite remarkable. The Parisian is not flashy or splashy: indeed, at times it can feel too staid, taking its time to tell the story with a rather unfashionable 19th-century realism. But there's a tremendous assurance to it; you do really believe this story, these people.

The Parisian is also – crucially, thankfully – a love story. In Montpellier, the graceful Midhat falls for Jeanette, the daughter of his host. This early section is utterly lovely in its tracing of the trembling anticipation, tenderness and insecurity of a first romantic encounter, and occasional moments of high emotional intensity crash through the otherwise even pacing, leaving you clutching your own heart. The desire for Midhat and Jeannette to be together veins painfully through the rest of the book.

Hammad's real concern, however, is how Midhat is torn between two cultures: "He was always marked by his difference." The imprint of imperialism may trouble individual identity as much as national identity. In France, Midhat brutally realises that he will always be seen as the outsider, the other. The less "civilised". Yet in his own culture, his European sheen makes him extra refined. The fact that he's adopted the ways of a country that is a colonial oppressor in their region becomes prickly, however. And having fallen in love with France's personal and intellectual freedoms, Midhat also struggles against the more rigid, prescribed familial and cultural expectations in Palestine.

The Parisian considers how a preoccupation with the self occurs even in the most dramatic of historical occasions: while his country convulses, Midhat undergoes his own internal revolt. He must work out who he is, come to terms with the shape and limits of his life. The novel also allows a wistful look at how life rarely works out as we hope, how the past may cloud and colour the present. Time is even more difficult to traverse than geographical distance. And there's no going back.

Much of the pleasure of the book is to be found in Hammad's often strikingly clear, original imagery: umbrellas "sprouted" in the rain and orange zest "spat at his dust-covered hands"; women in a steam bath reveal fat that "draped down over the hips in thick rolls like layers of cream". She also provides many canny shifts in focus, from a cinematic, establishing wide-shots of a location, deftly sketched, to zooming in on the tiniest, most intimate detail (I loved the description of a hole in a petticoat "with its little harp of exposed fibres"). It is Hammad's sustaining of both perspectives, the minutiae that make up an individual life and the macro political upheavals that change a country forever, that makes The Parisian so impressive.

### Down the Lane

As I write this at the beginning of January the garden is waterlogged so the only place to work is in the greenhouse when the sun is out.

There is a surprising amount of colour in the garden – cyclamen with their beautiful pink flowers and variegated leaves, several evergreen shrubs, lots of self-sown hardy annual seedlings and winter jasmine which was in flower before Christmas. This needs pruning when the flowers have finished, in spring, as the new growth produces next year's flowers. This also prevents a build-up of old woody growth which just looks untidy. It's a very easy plant to propagate – just bend a stem down to the ground and peg it or cover part of it with soil and it will root itself. I often find shoots that have rooted themselves when they reach the soil.

I think the wet autumn encouraged lots of fungi to grow. I have two pictures of ones I found in the garden. Some small white mushrooms came up in the grass. They were not edible field mushrooms because they had white gills. As you can see in the picture some creature had been nibbling it; I have no idea what the creature was!

The other fungi were large brown flat ones which pushed up the stones in the gravel as they grew. I think that they are part of a large organism that is mostly below the surface of the drive. These appear every year.

I couldn't identify either species. There is a free app called Champignouf which you can put on

your phone. My photos weren't good enough to identify the species but the app explains how to get the detail needed for identification. The app has lots of warnings about not poisoning yourself!

### One, Zoo, Three

Zookeepers at Whipsnade Zoo kicked off the New Year by counting every mammal, bird, reptile, fish and invertebrate in January, as part of the conservation zoo's Annual Stocktake. There are more than 245 species of animals at the UK's largest zoo.



2023 saw the arrival of many new animals to the conservation zoo including Sabre, a male scimitar horned oryx. Also being counted for the first time were otter pups Dali, Cahya and Lalita by zookeeper James Ford. They were the second set of otter pups born to Mum Carole and Dad Emie in 2023. The species are threatened in the wild by habitat loss and pollution. Zookeeper Thomas Maunders made sure every Mangarahara cichlid in the aquarium was added to the list, while the African lions' tally-board was turned into a fun enrichment toy – scented with spices to stimulate the big cats' strong sense of smell.

The annual stocktake is a requirement of the Whipsnade Zoo license. Following the count, the ZSL conservation zoo will share the final numbers with zoos and aquariums around the world via Species360, an international database which helps conservationists to manage important breeding programmes for endangered species.





#### The Plough Public House: corner of Harling Road and Tring Road, Eaton Bray

The former Plough stands a long way from the village of Eaton Bray on Tring Road, also known as Icknield Way, in an area known as Valance End. According to the countywide licensing register of 1876 the Plough first opened in 1830. It is certainly not listed in the earliest surviving countywide registers which date from 1822 to 1828. It probably started as a beerhouse because it is first listed by name in a directory of 1864, those of 1847, 1852, 1853 and 1862 do not list it – directories at this date listed public houses by name and beerhouses simply by the name of the proprietor with the listing "beer retailer" or "beer seller". As there were a number of beerhouses in Eaton Bray at the time it is not possible to say who the licensee was before 1864. If the Plough is not listed by name in 1862 but is listed in 1864 this suggests that it became a fully licensed public house in one of those years or in 1863.

The owner in 1876 was Ivinghoe brewer Roberts and Wilson. They were still the owner listed in the countywide register of 1891 but were then leasing the Plough to Dunstable brewer Benjamin Bennett, for  $\pounds 22/9$ -per annum. The publican, the appropriately named John Farmer, was evidently the sub-tenant.

By the time of the countywide register of 1903 Roberts and Wilson were leasing the Plough directly to the publican again and the rent was £12 per annum. The place was, according to the register, "clean and in fairly good repair". It was 1 mile, 352 yards to the nest licensed premises and the pub had one front and one back door with a side gate to a yard.

In 1922 Frances Wilson of Belmont Lodge, Stanmore, Middlesex, widow [of Roberts and Wilson] surrendered 31 perches of land in Street Furlong. The description of the land, which cannot have changed for over half a century, still refers to the Plough as a beerhouse and states that it was "formerly erected by John Varney" and had been formerly in the occupation of John Scott junior, then Joseph Wallace then James Pratt. Pratt was the licensee in 1876. We might infer from this that Varney was the first licensee but, of course, he may have built the premises which only became a public house at a later date.

The Rating and Valuation Act 1925 specified that every building and piece of land in the country was to be assessed to determine its rateable value. Eaton Bray, like most of the county was assessed in 1927. The valuer visiting the Plough found it still owned by Roberts and Wilson. He commented: "Rough cast. Kept exceptionally attractive". The brick and slate building comprised a tap room ("very nice"), living room and smoke room combined, a kitchen and pantry. Three bedrooms lay upstairs. Outside stood a brick and slate shelter by the house ("can be closed as store) as well as a stable for two horses ("disused"). There were also three weather-boarded and slated barns used as stores and a large weather-boarded and corrugated iron barn used for lumber. The landlord also rented two grass fields – of 1.5 acres and 4.002 acres and an orchard of 3.994 acres.

The valuer commented: "Takings everything"; they amounted to £20 per week in summer but very little in the winter. Sales were a barrel and a half of beer per week in summer and about one per month in winter. Nine dozen half pint bottles of beer a week were also sold in summer along with twelve dozen bottles of minerals. Sixteen gallon of spirits were sold in the year 1926-1927 along with eighteen gallons of port. The valuer commented: "Takings include quite a lot of teas, minerals etc." and "No village trade – all trade in summer from motorists etc."

The landlord had "Been here just a year, working up a connection and Lounge. Tap room has only just been altered to its present state. A later valuer noted: "Now a tea place. No trade in winter. Lawn set up with tables, sheds for cycles".

Benskins Watford Brewery took over Roberts and Wilson during 1927 and Benskins was, itself, taken over by Ind Coope of Burton-on-Trent, Staffordshire in 1957 when the Watford brewery closed. In 1961 Ind Coope merged with Ansells of Birmingham, Warwickshire and Tetley Walker of Leeds, Yorkshire to form Allied Breweries.

By 2008 the Plough had closed and become, like any number of pubs in the county, a restaurant. In this case the restaurant is Indian and called Elachi, the name being a type of spice. Later it became the New York Diner which after it closed was gutted by a fire. It is now the Floss and Smile dentist.



### <u>What to do in the Carden in Februar</u>

February feels like a turning point in the garden. It's still cold outside, but there are signs of spring's imminent arrival everywhere you look. Bulbs are slowly emerging from the ground, and the days are getting longer at last.

This month's garden jobs are mostly about getting things ready for the spring. But there are also some early sowing and growing tasks to do - if you want to get a head start...

**Timely Tips** 



- 1. Prepare your seed beds. As long as the ground isn't frozen, you can cultivate beds and start to warm up the soil, with fleece, polythene or cloches, in preparation for sowing in the coming months.
- 2. Organise this year's seeds by sowing date. Get hold of a box with dividers, and file your seed packets by the month they need to be sown in. You'll be so glad of this effort in the weeks to come.
- 3. Check your tools are sound and your garden machinery is working. Give your tools and equipment the once over and apply a little TLC to anything that needs it. While you're at it, tidy your shed ahead of the imminent planting & sowing season - you'll thank yourself for a clean & tidy space later!
- 4. Blitz perennial weeds in your beds and kitchen garden. Dig them up, roots and all, to get a head start on the blighters before the weather warms up.

### In the flower garden

summer side-shoots to 2 or 3 buds.

- There's still plenty of time to prune your rhododendron while they're in their dormant stage.
- Take notice of your climbers, as some may need pruning before the end of the month (such as group 2 clematis.)
- Cut back shrubs, such as cornus and salix cultivars (grown for their colourful winter stems), down to their bases.
- summer-flowering Prune clematis towards the end of the month, before active growth begins.
- Cut back the old foliage from ornamental grasses before growth begins. Clip them to within a few centimetres of the ground.
- Prune overwintered fuchsias back to one or two buds on each shoot.
- winter-flowering Prune jasmine (Jasminum nudiflorum) after flowering, to encourage new growth for next year's blooms. Cut back the previous year's growth to 5cm from the old wood.
- Trim winter-flowering heathers as the flowers disappear, to prevent plants becoming leggy.
- Prune winter-flowering shrubs such as mahonia and viburnum x bodnantense once their colourful display has finished.
- Remove faded flowers from winter pansies to stop them setting seed. This will encourage a flush of new flowers when the weather warms up.
- Lift and divide snowdrops still 'in the green', if you want to move them or create more plants.



• Prune wisteria now, cutting back • Move any deciduous trees or shrubs that need repositioning now, provided the soil is not frozen or waterlogged.

• Look out for hellebore leaf spot (rounded brown spots on the leaves) and remove any leaves that are affected.

### In the vegetable garden



- Start chitting early potatoes stand them on end in a module tray or egg box and place them in a bright, cool, frostfree place.
- Mulch perennial vegetables such as asparagus and artichokes with wellrotted manure or garden compost.
- Build raised beds now, before the growing season gets underway. Raised beds allow you to make an early start in the garden; the soil warms up faster and raised beds drain quickly too, so they're a great way to deal with clay soils.
- Prepare vegetable seed beds by removing all weeds and forking in plenty of compost. Cover prepared soil with sheets of black plastic to keep it drier and warmer in preparation for spring planting.
- · Rake lime into acid soils.
- Continue controlling against slugs.
- Remove yellowing leaves from brassicas, including Brussels sprouts, to prevent brassica downy mildew and grey mould from spreading.
- Tidy up vegetable plots, removing any remaining plant debris.

### In the fruit garden

 Prune raspberry canes. It's your last chance to cut autumn-fruiting raspberry canes to the ground to stimulate new canes to fruit in the autumn. Cut the tips of summer-fruiting raspberry canes that have grown beyond the top of their supports; cut just above a bud.

- Prune blackcurrant bushes, gooseberries and redcurrants to maintain a productive framework.
- Mulch fruit trees with well-rotted manure or garden compost, taking care not to mound mulch up around the trunk.
- Winter prune apple trees and pear trees while they're still dormant. This is your last chance to do so.
- Leave plum trees, cherry trees and apricots until the summer as pruning these fruit trees now will make them susceptible to Silver Leaf disease.
- Protect blossoms on apricots, nectarines and peaches from frost, but make sure pollinating insects can still reach the flowers.



- Force rhubarb plants for an early crop.
- Cover outdoor strawberries with cloches to encourage an earlier crop.
- Top dress fruit bushes with a slowrelease, potassium-rich fertiliser to feed plants for the forthcoming season.
- Check stored fruit and remove any rotten fruit.

### TIPS FOR DRIVING ON IGY ROADS

When driving in icy or snowy weather:

- drive with care, even if the roads have been treated
- keep well back from the road user in front as stopping distances can be ten times greater than on dry roads
- take care when overtaking vehicles spreading salt or other de-icer, particularly if you are riding a motorcycle or cycle
- watch out for snowploughs which may throw out snow on either side. Do not overtake them unless the lane you intend to use has been cleared
- be prepared for the road conditions to change over relatively short distances
- listen to travel bulletins and take note of variable message signs that may provide information about weather, road and traffic conditions ahead.

Drive extremely carefully when the roads are icy. Avoid sudden actions as these could cause loss of control. You should:

- drive at a slow speed in as high a gear as possible; accelerate and brake very gently
- drive particularly slowly on bends where loss of control is more likely. Brake progressively on the straight before you reach a bend. Having slowed down, steer smoothly round the bend, avoiding sudden actions
- check your grip on the road surface when there is snow or ice by choosing a safe place to brake gently. If the steering feels unresponsive this may indicate ice and your vehicle losing its grip on the road. When travelling on ice, tyres make virtually no noise.

Winter can be a difficult time for wildlife. Temperatures plummet and food becomes difficult to find. Insect-eating birds turn to alternative foods, some species travel far and wide, and foraging behaviour adapts, but we can lend a helping hand by providing a welcome source of extra food for birds to turn to in leaner times.

#### What to feed

Different birds are attracted to certain foods, often reflecting their special adaptations for natural food types. Offer a variety of tempting morsels to maximise your bird table's wow factor.

- Goldfinch, siskin, redpoll smaller seeds like nyjer
- Greenfinch, tits sunflower hearts
- Sparrows, woodpigeon, collared dove large grains
- Woodpeckers, tits, starling fat balls and peanuts
- Robin, thrushes mealworms and live foods
- Thrushes, waxwing windfall fruit

#### Where to feed

It's not only the types of food that tickle particular birds' fancies, but also where they're fed. You may have noticed that dunnocks and wrens shy away from bird tables and hanging feeders.

Sprinkle crumbled fat balls and seed beneath shrubs for secretive and ground feeding birds. Smear fat mixtures into the cracks and crevices of branches or bark for treecreepers, nuthatches and woodpeckers. And don't forget to clear feeders and feeding areas of snow after fresh falls as smaller birds can struggle to get through it.

If you can, it's also worth moving bird tables and feeders around the garden every now and then. Not only does this reduce the build up of mess, it can also help prevent ambush predators like cats and sparrowhawks from becoming too familiar with the likely location of unwary prey.

#### Planting for birds

One of the most satisfying and hassle-free ways to feed birds in winter is to plan ahead and let nature provide.

Rowan produces a lasting crop of berries that in bumper

years can see birds through for several months. They're a favourite of mistle thrushes which will guard them jealously from other hungry visitors. Ivy is also a good plant to encourage, its late-ripening berries offering food through the colder months and its evergreen leaves provide the perfect larder for wrens to search out hibernating insects. Blackbirds, fieldfares and redwings appreciate windfall apples left for them and will turn to crab apples and other hard fruits too. Lucky gardeners may even tempt waxwings. Fruits can also be an important winter food for blackcaps – warblers which usually migrate to warmer climes, but which are increasingly overwintering in southern parts of the UK.

A range of ornamental shrubs also provide berries into early winter, and don't discount the value of nectar. Small birds such as blue tits and even blackcaps seek out these energy boosts from early or late-flowering mahonia – a firm favourite.

### **Keep them watered**

Providing clean, fresh water alongside food is very important, particularly for seed specialists such as finches. They need to drink regularly to counterbalance their dry diet – all that seed grinding is thirsty work.

Sub-zero temperatures are of course a problem in winter and limit all wildlife's access to sources of water. Help keep bird baths and ponds ice free by floating a small football on the surface to disturb the formation of ice sheets. Or in really cold weather, fill a metal or ceramic dish with water and set it on bricks over a tea light candle.

#### Keep it up

Once you start feeding birds, try to keep regular in your topping up habits. While most visitors will adapt and move to new feeding grounds when natural food gradually runs out, a sudden drop off in feeding puts them on the hop. In winter when alternative food sources are already scarce, this could mean the difference between life and death for some.



#### Keep things clean

While feeding birds in your garden can help see them through the winter, it also has its down sides. We're encouraging large numbers of birds to share the same small area, putting them at higher risk of passing disease to one another. Trichomonosis for example, a nasty bug that can be fatal for finches and pigeons, is passed from bird to bird through saliva. Sick birds have difficulty feeding and will regurgitate food, contaminating feeding stations and spreading the contagion.

Scrub your bird feeders regularly with hot soapy water and give them a good rinse. Sweep away any accumulations of droppings or spilled seeds and keep feeders free of wet or mouldy foods.

The beauty of making your own feeders from recycled cartons is that they're cheap and easy to replace when they get mucky.

### **Bird Cake**

This quick and easy treat is packed full of energy to keep birds going, especially important in cold weather. Design your own recipe or use whatever's to hand.

### **Ideal ingredients**

sunflower hearts
peanut pieces and other bird seed mixes
dried fruits softened with water
crumbled or grated cheese
cooked rice and other leftovers
breadcrumbs

#### Things to avoid

uncooked rice salted nuts or other foods whole nuts or fruit which could choke

#### Method

Combine your chosen ingredients in a bowl and add softened lard or dripping.

Mix together into a firm paste.

Make a hole in the bottom of a yoghurt pot and thread through a length of twine or string, then pack the pot with your warm fat mixture, to make fat balls.

Place your fat balls in the fridge overnight to set, then cut through the pot and and peel it away. Tie a big knot at one end of the twine to secure the ball.

Hang the fat ball in a tree or shrub and wait for the birds to come and feast.







December was wet and windy but mostly mild. The first few days were calm, then the rain began with Atlantic depression after Atlantic depression bringing generally mild weather with very wet and windy conditions. We recorded rain on 27 days totalling 115.4mm 150% of the 16 year average for December with the wettest day being 31st with 16.41mm. The temperatures were much higher than the December norm reaching 14.1°c on Christmas eve. The only frosts were on the 1st and 2nd and then it only went down to -2.5°c. It was also a very windy month with an average 8.2.


