A new start.

Lots of TV programmes show people wanting to start a new life. Whether it's setting up a new business, moving abroad or learning a new skill, the schedules are full of people trying out something different. The desire to begin again is strong within us. Even in the pattern of the year, the changing seasons bring new life out of drab cold earth as winter turns into spring.

Easter is the most important festival of the Christian calendar for it is the culmination of God's plan of salvation for humankind. We may think that much preparation and planning goes into important events that we undertake. But God's plan of salvation took centuries to come to fruition. The Messiah had been expected for over a thousand years by the time Jesus was born. The one who would come to save his people was foretold by the prophets, but even so Jesus was not quite what people anticipated and failed to live up to many people's expectations. On Good Friday, it seemed that God's plan had all gone disastrously wrong. By the end of the day, Jesus was dead in the tomb, the terrified disciples were locked away in hiding and God's plan of salvation had failed. Or so it seemed.

Then the most awesome event in human history changed their lives forever. On the first Easter Day, Jesus was seen raised from the dead. Not only was he seen, but he spoke with his disciples, ate with them and appeared to a great crowd of people. On the road to Emmaus, he met with Cleopas and his companion and explained to them the sweep of God's purposes. 'Then Jesus said to them, "O how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?" Then beginning with Moses and the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.' (Luke 24 verses 25 to 27). It was not a mistake that Jesus had died on the cross, but part of God's plan for the salvation of humankind.

One of the reasons Christians celebrate Easter is that through Jesus' death and resurrection God offers us new life and a new beginning. And we don't have to go somewhere different to do it! As we come to God and say sorry for things we've done wrong in the past, we can be forgiven.

This is expressed in the following prayer. A penitent's prayer (author unknown)

Lord Jesus Christ, I admit that I am a sinner.

I confess my sins to you, especially those upon my conscience.

I firmly believe that you died for me to bear away my sins.

And now, according to your promise, I open my heart to you.

Come in, Lord Jesus, and be my Saviour and Friend for ever. Amen. With the past behind and a hope to come we can know the joy of a new beginning right here and now.

Grass & Hedge Cutting in the Villages

The Repair Casé Needs You!



Repair Cafés are spreading all across the UK after starting up in Holland a few years ago. As well as fixing just about anything that you can carry into them we are beginning to see shoppers becoming conscious of repairability when buying new.

You may not be aware but you can find a repair score for most phones, tablets and laptops that

you may be thinking of buying. Before buying a new phone it could be worth checking if the battery can be replaced easily, or will require open heart surgery using a scalpel and heating pads to separate the adhesive. Checkout IFIXIT online and search for repair scores then compare your buying options.

Making these repair scores public and displaying them alongside the price tag in stores is apparently mandatory in some European countries. Rather like the Energy rating we see on fridges and washing machines, wouldn't it be good to have the Repairability score when you are about to buy?

Volunteering at our nearest repair café over the last year has shown me that so many manufacturers create deliberate barriers to repairing their products. These range from special screws with non-standard heads to electronic serial numbers that the product will not recognize if changed. That's assuming you can buy the spare parts needed and the manufacturer actually publishes a repair manual.

The good news is that there is so much more information available now on how to repair many products. There are lots of You Tube videos to show you how to test and repair all kinds of faults. These are often amateur videos but when the manufacturer hasn't provided repair data they are invaluable. I'm often frustrated trying to open up some kitchen appliance only to find a secret screw hidden behind a label. Or a series of snap fit catches moulded into the case that require a thin plastic disk inserted into the split line. Somebody on You Tube will have worked it out already.

So what can you do? You could join the campaign for repairability and for public data on repair scores. You should consider it when buying any new product. How long will it last, does it carry a warranty, can the battery be replaced? Can you fix it yourself, can it only be fixed by the manufacturer at great expense. Remember that the Repair Cafe's volunteers are experts who will be able to repair items you would not attempt yourself. You might consider volunteering at the Repair Café. If you have a few tools, the skills

to repair stuff and can spare a half day once a month, let us know or just come along.

If there are enough of us volunteering that the Ivinghoe and Pitstone Café overflows maybe we can set up a local branch in Eaton Bray or Edlesborough? Contact me if you are interested and would like to chat about the possibility.





Help to Improve our Bus Services

I know that buses are vital for residents here in Edlesborough, Northall and Dagnall. People depend on buses for getting to work, school, the shops or to see friends and family.

Lots of people speak to me about their local services. I know that whilst there are some good services, there are many problems that need addressing as well. People across Aylesbury have for too long put up with unacceptable delays, cancellations and scrapped services, including Arriva's decision to end bus services to Oxford and High Wycombe.

I have been pleased with the Government's announcement that it would allocate £6.7m to Buckinghamshire Council to improve bus services, in addition to maintaining a cap on fares. We are



moving fast and taking bold steps to deliver better buses for local communities in Buckinghamshire.

However, I know there is more to be done.

That's why I have recently launched an online survey to help improve bus services in our area. I want to know your views in order to make a stronger case to Buckinghamshire Council and local bus providers.

The survey will be used to help understand how many residents travel by bus, how satisfied they are with the current service, which improvements can be made to improve the passenger experience, and how to increase passenger numbers across Aylesbury and the surrounding villages. I would encourage both regular bus users and people who don't use public transport to take part in the survey. I want to understand your experiences of local bus services, so I can push as your MP for better, more accessible public transport for everyone in our community.





Clis Clis - Edible Dormouse



In appearance, the glis glis is like a small version of the grey squirrel. The head and body are about 150mm (6") long and the bushy tail is about 125mm (5") long. The fur is silvery grey, shading to a light colour underneath and there is a ring of black hair around each eye.

The animal is common in Europe, but is not native to Britain. It was deliberately introduced into Tring

Park in 1902 and has spread into the surrounding area. The extent of the spread is not fully known, but is thought to be no more than about a 30 mile circle from Tring, although there have been unconfirmed reports of sightings at much greater distances. Today, the introduction of new, wild, species is prohibited by environmental laws, but at that time no one had any concern for the long term implications of releasing what is, in effect, a pest into the UK. Glis Glis cause considerable damage to trees and crops, and from the mid 1920's onwards were causing damage in houses, particularly by gnawing woodwork and electric cables.

The common name "edible dormouse" dates from Roman times. The Romans farmed them by keeping them confined and fed a diet to encourage them to become fat. They were then served as an exotic delicacy at banquets. Like many small animals, Glis Glis can appear to be attractive and entertaining. However, they are definitely not to be regarded as a pet or a cuddly toy. They have been described as sulky, standoffish and at times bad tempered. Once fully emerged from hibernation they are very nimble and fast on their feet.

Glis Glis are nocturnal and in houses the first signs of infestation will either be noises heard in the loft at night, or signs of damage in the loft or outbuildings. The animals hibernate for long periods (the German common name for them is "Seven months" because they hibernate for the 7 months October - April)

Only limited research has been done on the life cycle of the UK population. It is thought that Glis Glis emerge from hibernation in May and that a litter of 2 - 5 young are produced in July - August. It is possible that there may be more than one litter each year, but precise information is lacking. By the standards of small rodents, Glis Glis have fairly long lives. It is known that animals in the wild live for 3 - 5 years and there is a record of a Glis Glis in captivity surviving for 8 years. They are rarely found outside the Luton, Beaconsfield and Aylesbury triangle, where they are fairly common. The small litter size and the small number of litters per year, together with action of natural predators mean that Glis Glis do not multiply out of control the way that rats and mice do. However, they are slowly extending the infested area and this will be aided if there is a tendency to warmer spring and summer weather.

As Glis Glis are regarded as pests, it is illegal for householders to release them back into the wild.

There are very strict laws about how Glis Glis must be caught and dispatched, everyone involved must work under strict Government license terms. Do not be tempted to control Glis Glis without recourse to a licence or a company working under such licence terms. Otherwise you may commit a criminal offence.

Please note that the terms of the licence is to kill the animals caught by specific means - it is illegal to remove them and release them alive in another area. It is thought that some of the spread of Glis Glis to other areas has been caused by well-meaning householders who have trapped Glis Glis and then, out of a mistaken sense of humane disposal have released them. Not only is this illegal but all this does is present the problem to someone else.

For advice from the regulatory body on edible dormice contact Natural England on 0854 6003078, or at www.naturalengland.org.uk.They will either assist you directly or put you in touch with your local Wildlife Management Adviser. Advisers can offer guidance to you over the telephone to ensure you do not contravene any legal methods of control.

Easter Traybake

Prep 20 mins, Cook 35 mins, Servies 12 Make this easy Easter-themed traybake with the kids. It features a chocolate sponge covered in fudge icing then decorated with Easter sweets and treats.

Ingredients

150ml sunflower oil plus extra for the tin 165g golden caster sugar 2 eggs

150ml milk

165g self-raising flour

3 tbsp cocoa powder

1 tsp bicarbonate of soda

For the chocolate fudge icing

100g milk or dark chocolate, chopped (either a chocolate bar or Easter egg, broken up)

100g butter, softened

100g icing sugar

100g Easter treats (chocolate eggs, sweets, chocolate bar pieces)

Method

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Oil and line a traybake tin, about 20 x 30cm, and 5cm deep. Put the oil, sugar, eggs and milk in a bowl and whisk until well combined. Sieve over the flour, cocoa and bicarb, and stir briefly until combined. Pour the mixture

into the tin, and bake for 20-25 mins until the cake is well risen and springs back when pressed. Transfer to a wire rack and leave to cool completely.

Melt the chocolate in a bowl set over a pan of simmering water, ensuring the bowl doesn't touch the water, or in short blasts in the microwave until melted. Leave to cool for a few minutes.

Beat the butter and icing sugar together until pale and fluffy, then drizzle in the chocolate and beat again until smooth and uniform in colour. Swirl the icing over the top of the cake, with a few peaks and swirls to decorate. Scatter with the Easter treats to serve.

Icing - This makes a thin layer of icing but you can double or triple the quantities if you'd like a more generous amount.



Easter Hot Chocolate

Ingredients

200ml milk

½ tbsp cocoa powder

100g hollow chocolate egg, (milk or dark), broken into small pieces

2 tbsp whipped or squirty cream

25g mini chocolate eggs

sugar-coated chocolate buttons or beans, or more chocolate egg, broken into small pieces 1 tbsp mini marshmallows

Method

Pour boiling water from the kettle into a heatproof mug to warm it up. Heat the milk and cocoa in a small pan, or in blasts in the microwave, until steaming. Discard the hot

water in the mug, and tip in the chocolate egg pieces. Pour over the hot milk. Stir for 30 seconds or until the chocolate has melted. Top with the cream, sprinkle over the mini eggs or broken egg pieces and marshmallows to serve. (serves 1)

What to do in the Carden in April



April's here and spring has sprung at last! As the weather warms up and early flowers start to bloom, all of a sudden there's a load of jobs to do outside.

This month, there's plenty to sow and grow in your garden and greenhouse. But there's lots more to do besides sowing and planting out. Here are your main garden jobs this April:

Timely Tips

Start with these four garden tasks this month:

- Order annual plants like geraniums, begonias and petunias online now for summer bedding and hanging basket displays - it's your last chance!
- 2. Give your greenhouse a thorough scrub (if you haven't already) with hot soapy water. This will get rid of pests and diseases and let in more light.
- 3. Prepare beds for the growing season. Dig in a 5cm (or more) layer of compost or well-rotted manure. You can also work in a general-purpose fertiliser, such as pelleted chicken manure, or fish, blood and bone.
- 4. Check your patio plants aren't drying out. The warmer weather will quickly affect soil moisture levels - try mixing water storing granules with compost to improve water retention in containers.

In the flower garden



Here's what to be getting on with in the flower garden this month:

• Lift and divide established border perennial plants now, like Hostas, to improve vigour

- and create new plants for your garden.
- Pinch out the tips of fuchsia plants and sweet pea plant shoots, to encourage bushy growth this summer.
- Divide primroses once they have finished flowering.
- Plant rhododendron bushes once the threat of frost has passed, and the ground is moist.
- Move evergreen trees and shrubsnow, provided the soil isn't frozen or waterlogged.
- Feed trees, shrubs and hedges with a balanced, slow-release fertiliser, by lightly forking it into the soil surface. Roses, in particular, are greedy plants and will greatly benefit from feeding as they come into growth.
- Tie in climbing roses.
- Check any tree stakes and ties to make sure they're not cutting into the trunk. Loosen any that are tight, to allow the trunk some room to expand.
- Prune your penstemons now cut back all the old shoots to the base, provided there is new growth at the bottom of the plant. If there are no new shoots at the base, cut just above the lowest set of leaves.
- Finish cutting back any dead foliage on perennials and ornamental grass plants (if you haven't done so already), to make way for new growth.
- Prune Forsythia as soon as they have finished flowering, cutting back to strong, young shoots.
- Trim winter-flowering heathers as the flowers disappear, to prevent plants becoming leggy.
- Tie in new honeysuckle and clematis stems.
 These plants will be putting on growth now, and you'll need to train them along their supports.
- Continue to remove faded flowers from winter pansies to stop them setting seed.
 This will encourage flushes of new flowers throughout the spring.
- · Deadhead daffodils and tulips as the flowers

- finish, but leave foliage intact, allowing it to die back naturally.
- Apply a layer of mulch around your perennials and biennial plants, trees and shrubs before the hot weather arrives. Use organic matter such as well-rotted manure.

In the vegetable garden



Get busy with these vegetable garden tasks this April:

- Prepare vegetable seed beds by removing all weeds.
- Dig a 5-cm (or more) layer of compost, wellrotted manure or green waste into beds.
- Cover prepared soil with sheets of black plastic to keep it drier and warmer in preparation for planting.
- Build raised beds to take the bending out of growing vegetables.
- Harvest asparagus spears when they're no more than 18 cm tall.
- Support pea and bean plants now. For quick and easy pea supports, push some twiggy sticks around your plants.
- Thin carrot seedlings to achieve good-sized carrots; do this in the evening when fewer carrot flies are around.

In the fruit garden



Here's what to do in the fruit garden this month:

- Protect fruit blossom from late frosts by covering them with horticultural fleece on cold nights.
- Spray the emerging leaves of peach and nectarine trees to prevent peach leaf curl.
 Sheltering your plants from the rain will also help reduce the risk of peach leaf curl.

- Mulch fruit trees with well-rotted manure or garden compost, taking care not to mound mulch up around the trunk.
- Top-dress patio fruit-trees with fresh compost and a slow-release fertiliser.
- Feed raspberry canes, fruit bushes and fruit trees to encourage good crops this season.
 Apply a slow-release fertiliser around their base.
- Try hand pollinating peaches and nectarines with a soft-bristled paint brush for better crops this year.

Looking after your lawn

These are your lawn-care jobs for April:

- Sow lawn seed now on well-prepared soil and keep the soil moist while it germinates.
- For an instant lawn, lay new turf this month, and keep it moist until it's established.
- Repair any bare patches in your lawn try sowing lawn repair grass seed.
- Apply a high-nitrogen fertiliser to your lawn, for a boost at the start of the season.
- Apply specialist lawn weed killer to your lawn wherever moss and weeds are a problem.
- Brush away any worm casts on dry days.
- Mow your lawn more regularly, as required.
 Lower your mower blades towards the end of the month.
- Recut lawn edges to straighten them up.
- Install lawn edging to make future maintenance easier.
- Aerate compacted areas of lawn, by spiking it with a garden fork.

The White Horse Public House, The Green, Eaton Bray (courtesy of the Bedfordshire Archives)

The White Horse was the oldest known licensed premises in Eaton Bray. The earliest record of it is in 1810 when it was the venue for a court held by the Manor of Eaton Bray with the Members. The building was listed by the former Department of Environment in September 1980 as Grade II, of special interest. The department dated the construction to the early 19th century, raising the interesting possibility that it was purpose built as a public house. The building is clad in colourwashed roughcast and has a hipped slate roof. It has been extended to the rear.

The White Horse played a minor role in a felony. In 1832 Samuel Heley of Edlesborough and George Woodcraft of Eaton Bray were accused of stealing ducks from Eaton Bray farmer William Rollings. He went to Heley's house and found one and a half ducks there, he also found two ducks at Woodcraft's house. He then went to the White Horse where he saw two ducks' heads, one of which he identified because it had a blemish on the top of the eye, though the eye had been knocked out. 30 year old Heley and 25 year old Woodcraft were both sentenced to six months' hard labour. Woodcraft seems to have stayed on the right side of the law but Heley went to prison twice more – in 1845 for stealing apples and pears, when he received fourteen days' hard labour and in 1876 when he served fourteen days' for breaching the Factory Acts. The countywide licensing register of 1876 states that the owner was Annie Macnamara of Caddington, Lady of the Manor, She leased the property to Dunstable brewer Benjamin

Caddington, Lady of the Manor, She leased the property to Dunstable brewer Benjamin Bennett, meaning that the publican, James Bird, was the sub-tenant. By the time of the 1891 licensing register the pub was a free house, though still owned by the Macnamaras.

In 1898 the public house was put up for sale by auction by Arthur Macnamara. The sale particulars read as follows:

THE FULLY-LICENSED PUBLIC HOUSE

Known as

"THE WHITE HORSE"

Situate at the junction of the High Roads in the centre of EATON BRAY VILLAGE and within four miles of the towns of LEIGHTON BUZZARD and DUNSTABLE

Comprising

SUBSTANTIALLY-BUILT HOUSE,

containing

BAR, PARLOUR, CLUB ROOM, TAP ROOM AND EIGHT BED ROOMS:

Connected by covered way are

KITCHEN, WASH-HOUSE AND STORE;

THE OUTBUILDINGS

Include

Stabling for Seven Horses and Barn, And in field

PIGGERY AND HEN-HOUSE

Together with

GARDEN AND PADDOCK

Let on a Yearly Michaelmas tenancy to Mr. HENRY SELLS at the low Rent of £30 per annum. THE POSITION OF THIS HOUSE RENDERS IT CAPABLE OF DOING A LARGE TRADE.

The particulars are annotated to show that the White Horse was bought by Berkhamsted brewers Lock & Smith for £2,000. Perhaps the rent was not as low as the sale particulars suggested because in 1901 the publican, Henry Sells, became insolvent and his possessions were sold at auction. The pub was a favourite place for auction sales for the best part of a century, from at least 1858 until at least 1944.

The countywide licensing register of 1903 duly shows the White Horse owned by Lock & Smith. It is described as: "clean and in good repair" and was just 44 yards from the next licensed premises (The Five Bells); the property had one front, one side and one rear door.

The Rating and Valuation Act 1925 specified that every building and piece of land in the country was to be assessed to determine its rateable value. Like most of the county, Eaton Bray was assessed in 1927 and the valuer visiting the White Horse found that it was now owned and occupied by George Walter Shiers. The valuer commented: "Nice attractive looking place but looks larger outside than inside"

The property comprised a public bar ("good"), a tap room ("rather small"), a club room ("good, brick floor"), a kitchen, a sitting room and a large lobby with six bedrooms ("one a letting bedroom"), a dining room and a bathroom upstairs. A brick, weather-boarded and slated washhouse, a coal shed and a WC stood outside along with three brick, stone and slated stables ("disused") and a weather-boarded and sheet iron two bay open shed.

The takings were said to be £12 per week in winter and £18 in summer. Trade consisted of four barrels of beer per week, eight to twelve dozen bottles of beer per week, six gallons of spirits per year and eighteen gallons of wine per year. The valuer observed: "Good stock in cellar. Been here just over a year". Evidently there was some uncertainty over the level of trade because another hand has written: "Mrs. Shiers says five barrels per month. Mr. Shiers in bed" and another person has written: "I think above trade rather underestimated". The observation was made: "House faces small green, good position. Five Bells practically adjoins".

The owner also had an orchard of just over half an acre ("few trees") and a small plot with a weather-boarded and tiled meal house and store. In the orchard stood two weather-boarded and tiled piggeries and a weather-boarded and felt hen house ("good").

The White Horse was the only public house left in Eaton Bray and sadly closed on Sunday 2nd March 2025, the rest having closed and either been demolished, become private houses or, in the case of the Hope and Anchor an Indian restaurant and the Plough currently a dentist practice.



The Edlesborough Rose Brass

If you are new to Edlesborough Parish or indeed even if you have lived here for some time, you may not know about the Edlesborough Rose. You will, no doubt, have seen its image atop our village sign on the Green.

The Edlesborough Rose is a unique medieval memorial brass which has been associated with the history of Edlesborough Church for many centuries. It has travelled a bit in its time having had stays in both Pitstone Church and Ashridge House chapel during the



19th & early 20th centuries, and more recently it languished for 33 years in a bank vault in Bedford where it was taken for safekeeping after the theft of another brass from the church.



As those 33 years ticked by, the memories of those who had been active in the church at that time, grew dim, and when the newly formed Friends of the Church on the Hill, started to ask questions, there was no clear answer concerning the whereabouts of the Rose Brass. Hence there began a four year quest to rediscover this precious artifact. There were many twists and turns, with

hopes being raised and dashed in those four years. But ultimately, documents were found in the Churches Conservation Trust archives which proved where the brass had been lodged, and finally in January 2017 it was possible to reclaim it. The brass came back to the church briefly later that year for a celebration of its return; it is now with the CCT awaiting conservation, and the Friends are working on a plan to commission a replica for the church.

The brass is unique and precious because there are no other known examples of a brass in the form of a rose. There are ancient records of a very similar brass in St Peter's, St Albans, but this was lost in the early nineteenth century, probably during a time of restoration of the church.

The Latin text on the rose brass is:

'Quod expendi, habui: Quod donavi, habeo: Quod negavi, punio: Quod servavi, perdidi'

A modern translation would be 'What I have spent, I have had: What I have given away, I still have; What I refused to give, I am punished for; What I kept for myself, I have lost.

It is therefore what is known as a 'Memento Mori', a reminder that we must all die,

and an encouragement to do good in this life in order to obtain benefits in the next. In particular, it urges the reader to be generous and share with others whatever we are fortunate enough to possess.

The brass has long been associated with an inscription in the church to John Killingworth who died in 1412. This view is expressed by several important 19th & 20th century commentaries on Edlesborough Church, (although no doubt they would have used each other as sources). More recent however, learned opinion suggests that the Rose has no connection with John Killingworth but belongs to another memorial brass, now lost - and furthermore, it may not originally have been made for Edlesborough Church. And so our well-loved Rose brass continues to throw up more mysteries to be solved!

VICAR IN TITHE SHOCK HORROR!

All inhabitants of the parish of St. Mary's, Eaton Bray, could be in for an unwelcome surprise if plans, currently under consideration, to restore the ancient tithe system go ahead. Unrepealed legislation dating back at least 600 years gives the priest of the parish the right to exact a tithe of 10% of annual gross income from each parishioner to pay for the upkeep of the church. The last time this tithe was collected, most parishioners would have contributed a chicken or two, or perhaps a sheep, but in modern times the Vicar, the Rev. Brian Moore, expects to 'clean up'. "We're on to a goldmine," he told Focus. For another, I intend to have recordings of my sermons played back continuously through a public-address system for the whole five days - what you could call the ultimate deterrent!" so, in case there are hardy souls willing to put up with this fearful ordeal in order to cling to their money, we understand that space in the church is to be allotted by ticket, obtainable from the churchwardens at an as yet undisclosed price.

Where did the Vicar get the idea for this amazing scheme? "I've been thinking for a long time that we needed some entrepreneurial skills around here," said Mr Moore, flicking ash from his large cigar over our reporter. "With the first haul of readies I'm going to install a computer system in the Vicarage - it'll write sermons, check the tithes, keep tabs on parishioners and even produce Focus once a month - you monkeys are all going to be redundant." So saying, he polished his signed photograph of Rupert Murdoch with his silk handkerchief and announced that the interview was at an end.



Better Backs for Cardeners

Spring has finally sprung and there are many gardening jobs facing us! Although gardening can be good for the mind, it can play havoc with your body. Follow these tips for better backs and don't let an injury spoil your fun.

- · Before doing any physical exercise, warm up first with a walk and some gentle stretching.
- Take regular breaks and change position between jobs to avoid tiredness, overuse and injury.
- Keep your back straight when lifting and use your knees, thighs and arms to help. Don't try to lift too much at one time particularly those bags of compost!
- When digging, avoid twisting and straining and don't forget to take regular breaks.
- Use kneeler seats or mats when planting and don't overstretch by working too far in front of you.
- · Mow a little at a time, keeping upright.
- Avoid overstretching when pruning by using long-handled shears and use secateurs with a cut and hold action.
- If using electric hedge trimmers don't hold them too far in front of you.
- Consider the planning of your garden raised flower beds may save you twinges in the long run.
- Consider your core and the benefit of being fit for task. Many of my Pilates clients tell me how
 much better their backs are after gardening, or how much more they can do in a gardening
 session now, than they could do before taking up Pilates with me

Bears at Whipsnade Zoo awaken from hibernation and play in spring sunshine

Whipsnade Zoo's four European Brown bears Mana, Minnie, Naya and Cinderella, have woke in February after three months of deep slumber, signalling the start of spring at the UK's largest zoo. The foursome were



spotted frolicking through their woodland home and splashing in their pool in the February sunshine.

Whipsnade Zoo's predators section manager Sarah McGregor said: "It's so lovely to have our four bears out and about again at Whipsnade Zoo. Every year when they emerge from hibernation, we know that spring has finally arrived!

"While they were a little sluggish at first, our four girls have now well and truly woken up – especially after a dip in the cold water! They've been busy exploring their woodland home, taking in the smells and sights, climbing the trees, and causing a commotion playfighting in the water."

Wild bears enter hibernation, a survival skill they've learned to preserve energy when food availability is scarce, every winter.

Sarah explained: "Although food is plentiful here at the zoo, the bears are still driven by innate instincts to forage, and so we adapt what they are fed to match their behaviour."

"Every year we devise a personalised nutrition plan for our brown bears to make sure they get enough calories, and ensure they bulk up during the autumn, ready for a nice long, deep sleep."

"They've had a good long snooze, but now that they are ready to be active again they'll be getting a range of meat, seasonal veg and other nutrient-rich foods which will increase their muscle mass after hibernation."

Whipsnade Zoo's trio of Northern African lion cubs had their first health check at 11-week-old, allowing their excited keepers to finally learn the sexes of the conservation zoo's newest arrivals.

The zoo's expert vet team and keepers carried out the cubs' medical exam in the familiar surroundings of their indoor den, to keep the cubs as relaxed as possible. The team worked quickly to get all three lions checked,



vaccinated, and sexed as fast as possible meaning they were done in just 15 minutes.

Whipsnade Zoo's senior veterinary officer Dr Taina Strike began by determining the sexes of the cubs, announcing that Winta was the proud mother of two males and one female. The check-up included administering vaccines, fitting microchips, listening to their hearts, and inspecting their tiny paws and ears. The vets also took the opportunity to thoroughly check the progress of the cub who hadn't been walking as expected, and were happy to report that his leg is faring much better now.

However, during the examination, a heart murmur was detected in the second male cub, who will now be under close veterinary observation for the next few weeks.

next issue. Paul Rabbits gave us "A History of The Royal Parks".


All our meetings are held at 7.30pm at St Giles Church Hall, Church Road, Totternhoe.

We particularly loved reading stories with Emily the dog, from Appledown.






One of the most popular activities was our 'books for breakfast' where parents came in to
